Luna CC's Daniel Martinez leading nation in home runs


Luna Community College softball team 14th in batting average

Luna Community College sophomore baseball player Daniel Martinez is leading the nation in home runs. Martinez, a pitcher and catcher from Carlsbad, has 10 home runs to lead all junior college baseball players in Division II.

The statistics show Martinez with 10 home runs in 101 at bats.

Also in the national rankings is LCC freshman softball player Eve-

lyn Caballero. Caballero, a first baseman from Española, is ranked 21st in batting average. She is hitting at a .442 clip. Caballero is also ranked 22nd in on base percentage at .500.

Luna Community College is providing a Student Advancement Academic Institute in summer 2011 to students classified a junior or senior for the August 2011-May 2012 academic year. Students can take college courses free of cost including waivers for LCC student ids, textbooks, distance learning fees, and access codes. If students receive an acceptable passing grade, students will be eligible to receive a \$100.00 stipend if they are registered for at least one academic or vocational course.

Casey Martinez may be gone, but he certainly isn't forgotten

This is the sixth of a series of articles written on oldschool athletics by Luna Community College sports performance instructor Henry Sanchez.

Arthur S. Martinez, better known as "Casey", was born in La Madera, N.M., a small village just outside of Española on Oct. 23, 1933. He had a full and rewarding life that ended at the age of 70 on Dec. 26, 2003. I would like to share his life's journey with you.

He attended the Española Public Schools from first through 8th grades and graduated from New Mexico Normal High in El Rito where he was student body president and a great athlete in all sports.

1952-55

In 1952, after graduating from high school, he signed a professional baseball contract with the San Francisco Giants. He played for the Giants' farm clubs (at the time was the New York Giants) in class D for the Sooner League in Muskogee, Okla., in class C for the Lake Charles, La. team and in class AA for the Eastern League in Springfield, Mass.

In a great article written by Jesse Gallegos many years ago, Casey in AA ball, roomed with the great Hall of Famer Roberto Clemente and was a close friend of San Francisco Giants Manager Felipe Alou.

1955-57


Casey served two years with the U.S. Army during the Korean Conflict where he was honorably discharged. He served in the fields of communication and artillery (Air/ground forward observer—155 Howitzer Battalion).

1957-60

He returned to Las Vegas and enrolled at New Mexico Highlands University, earning a BA in three years. Casey majored in biology and health/physical education. He was also elected as senior class president. A friend and fellow classmate of Casey's said. "Casey was a very gifted man, exceptional athlete, intelligent, and classroom work, especially biology and anatomy came easy to him. In baseball, he was a gifted shortstop that made everything look easy."

1960-63

He accepted a teaching and coaching position at St. Peter's High in Roswell. He worked at St. Peter's for three years and in 1963, his basketball team made it to the state tournament losing to the

Bernalillo Spartans 64-62, a team that was coached by NMHU graduate Dave Rostro.

1963-65

He took a teaching and coaching position at Santa Cruz High in Santa Cruz, N.M. where he remained for two years. In 1964, Casey coached George Maes who signed and played for the New Mexico Lobos. On Nov. 21, 1964 Maes scored 81 points in a game against Coronado High which is still the all-time single game scoring record for one individual. The irony is that record he broke belonged to Nick "The Stick" Pino from St. Michael's High who on Jan. 12, 1963 scored 80 points against El Rito High, the same school that Casey graduated from in 1952.

1965

During the summer he was selected to attend the prestigious foundation for National Science at the University of Oklahoma.

1965-69

He accepted a position to teach and coach at Española High.

1968-70

He attended The Ford Foundation Leadership Development Program for rural educators at Stanford University.

1970-71

He earned his master's degree from Stanford and worked on his doctorate in education administration. During this time he was the dean of students at Mountain View and Awalt High in Los Altos, Calif.; he was the assistant superintendent of minority affairs and staff development in Los Altos School District in Mountain View, Calif.

1971-72

Casey came back to New Mexico and worked for the Pueblo of Pojoaque as a personnel director

1972-80

Casey accepted a position at NMHU to teach and coach the men's basketball team. It's amazing that during his tenure at NMHU he became the athletic director, head of the P.E. department, taught a full load and coached the basketball team all during the same year. Imagine what we would have to pay in today's world for doing all these jobs?

In 1974-75, his team won 20 games and lost eight, but is best remembered for defeating Grand Canyon College 73-72 which went on to win the NAIA championship that year.

1980-86

He left the teaching and coaching at NMHU and became the Pecos School District superintendent. He was very well prepared to take on this challenge and the Pecos School District benefited.

1987-91

The records show that Casey was superintendent of Pojoaque Schools from July 1, 1987 to June 26, 1991. Everyone I talked to in the Pojoaque area remembers Casey with fond memories and total respect.

Casey retired and moved to Conchas, N.M. and taught a few classes at NMHU as a visiting professor in exercise science. He also taught graduate classes in school administration, curriculum development, school law, research methods, educational classes and supervised student teachers.

Casey was survived by his loving wife Onofre, three daughters, Elena, Christin and Lea, two sons Daryl and Barry. His two brothers are Andres and Fernando. His three sisters are Nora, Cora and Henrietta.

Casey went to see his maker on Dec. 26, 2003 at the age of 70. He knew he had a terminal illness, yet he never told his friends and lived his life without worrying or bothering anyone. Casey left the way he lived his life, that of always being in control.

Casey you have been gone for eight years, but you are not forgotten.

Transforming employee thinking

How can Luna Community College continue to transform? In the past few months Luna Community College has been involved in institutional evaluation, program evaluation, and employee evaluation.

This week I was approached by an employee asking why the human resources department was questioning competencies within their job description. After sitting down with the supervisor and the employee, gaps in the job description were noted. The supervisor asked who is responsible for changing or addressing the gaps in the job description. LCC policy states that the supervisor must review the job description during the annual evaluation and note any additional job duties as assigned. Why should job descriptions be reviewed and if they change how do they impact the college? If the job description does not reflect the function of the position an employee's job begins to shift. This may cause competencies with the department to erode.

The college is changing all the time. Changes occur when department services, programs, or functions are modified, increased, or realigned. Each department is established on structure, description of work, and processes conducted as part of the institution. Each employee position within the department is established as a function within that structure, description of work, and process. An employee position is a component of the department function, designed through a job description which consists of competencies consisting of skills,

knowledge requirements (credentials), characteristics, and behaviors, if followed by the employee the results are usually successful job performance. It is very important that department directors understand performance based management, and when institutional transformation occurs department directors must also understand competency based management which incorporates collaboration with the human resources department as a participant familiarized with the departments strategic planning goals.

Department strategic plans are conducted so that all employees within the department understand how the department will achieve goals and objectives through shared vision. When a department makes an effort to align competencies with a strategic planning process positive results occur. The department will ultimately focus on students. Students are provided better service, better instruction, and more opportunity for success.

The continued transformation of LCC will take place as department leadership focus on the functions of their department in the college and department leaders ensure department employees understand their role and function in the department.

From 9 to 11 a.m. on Thursday, March 31 a director training provided by the human resource department will focus on institutional governance, leadership responsibility, performance and competency management.
