Fortitude, dedication equals success for Santa Rosa Satellite's Nadine Wade

Bachelor's, master's from UNM next on list

Six years ago Nadine Wade walked into the Luna Community College Santa Rosa Satellite inquiring about GED classes. Last week, Wade submitted a petition to graduate with an associate's in teacher education.

It took perseverance, dedication and fortitude, but for Wade it has all been worth it. And a two-year degree is not where it stops. Wade intends to enroll at the University of New Mexico and begin earning a bachelor's. Wade has not ruled out on earning a master's degree as well.

"When I first started college, I was kind of scared," says Wade. "I don't do well with a lot of people. The instructors at Luna have helped me out a lot. They have been very considerate every

step of the way."

Wade moved to Santa Rosa from Palm Springs before she graduated from high school.

"If I would still be living in California there would be no way I would have gone to college," says Wade.

After earning her GED, Wade found out she had cervical cancer.

"I was treated for it and doctor's told me I couldn't have kids," said Wade. "My boyfriend and I were thinking of adopting. In April, 2010 I found out I was pregnant."

Her daughter Amillia will turn one later this month.

"She's the best thing that ever happened to me," says Wade. "Having her makes me want to continue to go to school."

Wade began her education program in 2009 taking most of her classes online or via ITV.

"I like Luna; instructors work with you," says Wade. "They have always understood my circumstances; they didn't hold it against me."

Today Wade inches closer to her career dream—becoming an art teacher.

"I like drawing; I really enjoy it," says Wade. "I want to have my own classroom and having art classes and offer art classes on the weekend. Eventually, I want to develop a portfolio and open an art gallery."

Santa Rosa and Luna Community College may have just been the answer for Wade.

"Growing up for me was a little rough,"

says Wade. "Coming here has changed my life dramatically. I'm doing things I never thought I was going to do. My family is so proud of what I've done."

Wade says she has close to a 3.4 grade point average.

"Nadine is a classic example of a success story," says longtime Santa Rosa Satellite Director Albert Campos. "You see a lot of people come and go. She took the initiative to

finish what she started. She has been able to multi-task and succeed in completing the first part of her education."

Wade knows that this is just the beginning.

"I'm very, very happy," says Wade. "I'm happy for what I've been able to accomplish up to this point and I feel confident I can do anything I want to do. I won't let anything stop me. No matter what happens in

Pecos' Antonio Varela: the best in the state

When Antonio Varela runs, his lone companion is the wind.

The Pecos High senior is coming off back-to-back-to-back state championships in AA.

"I do a lot of training," says Varela. "The past five years, every summer I push myself to the limit."

Although he has received several offers from several colleges, Varela says he is leaning toward running in the Air Force.

Although Pecos is a small high school (in New Mexico there are five divisions), Varela is considered the second best runner in the entire state. Only Cleveland High's Luis Martinez gets the nod over Varela.

Varela's best time of the year was running 3.1 miles in 15:17.

"During the season I run anywhere from 50 to 60 miles a week," says Varela. "I also watch what I eat and I don't drink sodas. I drink mostly water."

So why has Varela dominated running in the state for the last three seasons?

"It's because of all the effort I put into it," says Varela. "I also give a lot of credit to all my coaches."

Top 10 Reasons for Completing Community College

1. You'll earn more! Students who complete their associate degree or certificate can expect to earn as much as \$8,000 more per year and about \$400,000 more in a lifetime than a high school graduate.¹
2. You'll be prepared! People change jobs up to 10 times in their working lives – and when you are job-hunting, a college credential will always give you an edge.²
3. Credential holders also are more likely to retain jobs. Unemployment for community college graduates is typically 30 percent lower than for high school grads.³
4. You'll encounter fewer barriers to transfer! Many state college systems have articulation agreements that guarantee transfer of community college credits when associate degree students enter state universities. 
