## The Story of the *Titanic* and Its Survivors

The *Titanic* was the world's largest ship ever made. It was 883 feet long and weighed 52,310 tons. It cost 7.5 million dollars to build back in 1912. It was the largest ship ever, and was supposed to be unsinkable. On April 10, 1912, it set sail from Ireland and was supposed to go to New York. It carried on board 2,240 passengers and crew members. The ship hit an iceberg and began to sink on April 14, 1912 around 11:30 pm. A little after an hour of the incident is when they started evacuation. The rules to the evacuation were women and children first. Even though this was the rule, a majority of the people found dead were women and children.



## Ron Gonzales wears many hats at Luna Community College

This is the second in a series of interviews with department leaders at Luna Community College. The following interview is with Physical Plant and Athletic Director Ron Gonzales.

#### What departments do you oversee? Departments under my supervision in-

- Maintenance, Custodial, Technical Maintenance, Transportation, Life/ Safety, Security, Capital Projects, Facility Usage
- Athletics which includes Baseball and Softball
- Learning Resource Center
- Mora Area Liaison

#### How long have you worked at LCC? In what capacity?

I began my career at LCC in 1995 as Technical Maintenance Supervisor. In 1999, I became the Physical Plant Director. In 2001, I was assigned to be the Trades Director. In 2004, I was reassigned back to the Physical Plant as Director of Facilities. In 2010 I assumed oversight of the Learning Resource Center, Mora Area Liaison and became Athletic Director while still being Director of Facilities, these still remains in place to date.

#### What is your typical day like?

With this position there really is not a typical day. There are routine duties that are performed every day but every day has different situations or events that we deal with.

#### What are your primary duties?

The position I hold oversees all mainte-Physical Plant which includes: General nance programs and facilities of the college and satellites. Along with the duties of the athletic director which is to oversee all athletic activities of the LCC sports programs, which includes visits with other colleagues from other institutions, coaches, students, parents, media and the public in general.

#### Where do you see yourself and your departments in five years?

There are various goals that we at the departments have set and look forward to attaining in the next five years. These goals are attainable if all of us work together as a team. The department s that I oversee are only successful as a team not as one individual, which also entails working with every one of the LCC

#### What is the best part of your job?

Seeing when our students needs are being met whether through their education or other activities, working with others to attain the

greater good for everyone at LCC. Seeing our students succeed.

#### What is the toughest part of your job?

The toughest part of the job is the decision making, some times this is not the most popular decision. The decisions have to be made. They had sixteen rafts and four Engelhard collapsible; with the capability of holding 65 people, yet some were only filled with 28. Even though the *Titanic* managed to stay afloat for three hours, it was not long enough to help most of the people in it. That night of April 15 took more than 1,500 souls.

Aboard this ship was a famous tennis player that was one of the survivors of the *Titanic*. His name was Richard Norris Williams; he was traveling in first class with his father Charles Duane Williams. Richard told his story to a family member, and as he recalled the event he said they watched as people were filling the lifeboats. As the water reached their waists, Richard saw the ship's funnel fall on top of his dad. A rush of water from the funnel pushed him toward collapsible A, where they waited to be rescued. Once he was rescued, doctors recommended the

amputation of his legs and Richard refused. He ended up healing well and continued to win multiple tennis championships.

## The Sinking of the *Titanic*

On April 10, 1911, the *Titanic* set sail for New York from Ireland and there were about 2,240 passengers on board that ship. The ship was built with the best technology they had at that time, and they

thought it would never sink. When they were going along they hit a big iceberg and it made a hole in the ship and water started pouring in. They started evacuating the women and children first. There were some boats that were under filled with people and some that had too many. There were also people who chose to stay on the ship. They say that this could have been prevented if they weren't going as fast as they were. There were many conspiracies about the sinking of the *Titanic*. Some people even thought the captain hit the iceberg on purpose to help out another boat for insurance purposes. The *Titanic* finally went under water at 2:20 am.

## The *Titanic*By Joyce Romero

The history of the *Titanic* is a rich landscape of triumph, tragedy, and mystery with artifacts and information still surfacing even after nearly 100 years since the event. No other vessel in history has drawn as much attention as the history of the *Titanic*, and as a result, many books, films, and other forms of media have been released in order to recount the events of April 14, 1912 and offer new facts and insight into the tragedy. Titanic construction began in March 31, 1909 in Belfast, Ireland and was the project of White Star Liners. It was built at

the Harland & Wolff shipyard. It took three years to build the *Titanic* and cost nearly \$7.5 million to build. A technological marvel of its time, the *Titanic* contained eighteen water tight compartments. This line of cruisers was designed to be the sturdiest and most luxurious ships of their time. She was ready to sail on her maiden voyage on April 10, 1912. Of the 2,223 passengers on the *Titanic*, only 706 survived leaving 1,517 dead. The largest percentage of survivors was first class passengers, followed by second class, and finally third class. Most of the deaths were due to hypothermia in the freezing water, which would cause death in less than 15 minutes. Six out of seven children in first class survived. All of the children in second class survived, whereas only 34 percent were saved in third class. Four first class women died, 86 percent women survived in second class and less than half survived in third class. Overall, only 20 percent of the men survived, compared

to nearly 75 percent of the women.

Lillian Asplundh was the last Swedish/American survivor of the sinking of the *Titanic*. She was five years old at the time, and she had actual memories of the sinking. Her family was third class passengers when they boarded the *Titanic* on April 10, 1912. She remembered that the *Titanic* was very big and it had been freshly painted. She said that she did not like the smell of the paint. She passed away on May 6, 2006, at the age of

#### A Titanic Survivor

Mrs. Eleanor Widener was 50 years old the day she boarded the RMS Titanic in Cherbourg. She was a First Class Passenger from Philadelphia, Pennsylvania. She was taking the trip with her husband George, their son Harry and two servants. Mrs. Widener and her maid Amalie Gieger were rescued on lifeboat #4 after waiting for more than an hour. They were taken on the *Carpathia* to New York City and then got on a train back to Pennsylvania. Her husband and son were not rescued and perished with the ship.

After the loss of her son and husband, she performed lots of charity work. She also made a large donation to the Harvard Library which was named after her son Harry. She made two stipulations with the donation. One was that no stone be touched as long as the library stands and the second was that every Harvard graduate must pass a swimming test. She felt that her son would have survived if he had known how to swim. Both rules still stand today.

Later in life she married the geographer and explorer Dr. Alexander Hamilton Rice of New York. She accompanied him on many of his travels. Mrs. Widener died on July 13, 1937 of an embolism.
