Focusing on a culture of completion

Last Friday, I along with several other Luna Community College students and employees, had the opportunity to attend a seminar led by Phi Theta Kappa

Executive Director Dr. Rod Risley. Risley, by the way, has headed this organization since 1985.

His talk was focused on the importance of community colleges doing everything they possibly can to make sure that students complete their education and are able to enter the workforce or go on to a four-year institution.

Although he had many interesting insights on why many students don't complete their degree or certification program, one in particular stuck with me.

I am paraphrasing his statements. Dr. Risley said that sometimes the simple things that colleges do or don't do makes a dramatic impact on students—especially new students. Something as simple as an instructor not talking to a student when they meet up with one another in a hallway can be a deterrent. Basic simple human goodness does count after all.

Many students are intimidated by being in a higher education setting and

little things to us could very well be big things to them.

He emphasized that community colleges need to push more into moving toward a culture that provides support. And support could mean anything from a classroom setting being comfortable to the college making sure a student has proper resources.

Here at LCC, the college has grown in filling the gaps to help students succeed—many of our programs are nationally accredited, making these programs stronger. With that, the college has improved in its outreach, collaboration and articulation agreements.

In addition to this, the college has been working diligently on a strategic plan.

"LCC is planning many changes that will improve the graduation rate," says LCC Director of Institutional Research and Development and Effectiveness John Tiernan.

"The new LCC strategic plan (in development) has many objectives specifically geared toward maintaining high levels of student satisfaction and providing quality education. The majority of strategic objectives are geared toward improving the student experience at LCC and this will definitely have a positive impact on student graduation rates."

LCC has joined many colleges across the nation in Phi Theta Kappa's C4 Community College Completion Challenge initiative.

"We are all stakeholders in ensuring students are provided every opportunity and the support required to succeed in acquiring a certificate and/or associate degree," says LCC faculty member and Phi Theta Kappa Advisor Cindy Armijo. "We are all affected by recruitment, retention and specifically, completion. I take supporting student completion personally and I challenge every LCC employee to actively and purposefully take it personally as well!"

Among Risley's comments were:

- Students needs are different now than before.
 - Support needs to be very visible
 - Students have to be engaged outside the classroom.
 - Share frequent feedback with students
 - Students need validation such as good job or how is it going?
- The goal of the Completion Challenge is to increase graduates by 5 million by 2020.

Risley said jobs are out there (600,000 jobs in manufacturing and 500,000

jobs in health care are unfilled).

With LCC continuing to move forward, our graduates will help fill some of this void.

Engaging the campus community

Based on research findings showing a decline in American education where the United States dropped from No. 1 in the world to No. 17, along with the alarmingly high number of unfilled jobs requiring skilled and credentialed individuals, in 2010 President Obama initiated a White House Summit calling for increasing graduation rates by at least 50 percent by 2020. This spurred Phi Theta Kappa and five other

prestigious higher education associations to jointly initiate "Democracy's Colleges – Call to Action" and the College Completion Challenge, pledging to support community college completion.

As the largest and most active honor society in post-secondary education, the more than 1,280 Phi Theta Kappa chapters accepted the challenge to assist in college completion through the establishment of the C4 Community College Completion Corps. The C4 initia-

tive's foundation is supported by the concept of students helping students. First, each honor student is asked to make a commitment to complete their certificate or associate degree. Next, honor students are asked to each reach out to help at least one other student complete

Recently, we extended the challenge to administrators, faculty and staff to commit to support student completion. A pledge and


