LCC/Santa Rosa High creating opportunities for students

Building technology classes going well in early part of semester

At the end of the fall semester Santa Rosa High student Zeke Sena may be the leading rusher in the state. And by the end of the semester Sena will also have a better understanding of building technology.

The senior is one of several students taking advantage of a partnership between Luna Community College and Santa Rosa High that allows them to take building technology courses.

"I love this class," said Sena last Wednesday. "It gives us hands-on experience. I'm real excited to see what we're going to learn for the rest of the semester. It's a very beneficial class; I've been waiting to take this class for a long time."

In June, the LCC Board of Trustees approved the partnership. The cost to the college is right about \$19,800. Students at Santa Rosa High take this course on a concurrent basis, meaning that credits are counted at both the high school and college level.

"It's providing opportunities for kids," said Santa Rosa High Principal Richard Perea. "In addition for our stu-

dents learning skills in this area, they are also building relevance and reinforcing their math. By taking this class, students

will use trigonometry, geometry, estimating and construction surveying.

Currently, students are taking classes in the welding shop. Perea said that an exclusive classroom for building trades is currently under renovation and should be ready by the end of October.

David Flores, the instructor of the class, says that early on things are working well.

"It's a very exciting time for Santa Rosa High," said Flores. "It's a good thing for both Luna Community College and the high school bringing back this program. Right now, the students are learning safety in the workshop. It's important to teach them about all the hazards. Many students already have many projects in mind such as tables, rocking chairs and other practical, nice useful things. I believe that as word of these classes gets around, there will be more students interested in taking it."

In addition to three classes taught at the high school, Flores teaches two evening classes for community members.

"Our community is very happy about these courses," said LCC Santa Rosa Satellite Director Albert Campos. "It's a proven fact that there is gainful employment from building technology."

Campos said that building technology courses haven't been offered in Santa Rosa since the late 80s.

E] Constantly revisit, review and revise (when necessary) to ensure that financial and organizational resources are better aligned with student success. F] Align our college and regional goals with the education and workforce needs of the area. Overall, we must continue to restructure our college system to provide students with more structure and guidance to encourage better career choices and increase their probability of success.
