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HLC Show-Cause Order, the basis for improvement

Following a Higher **Learning Commission (HLC)** Show-Cause Order issued to the Cause Order Report which is college, the Luna Community College administration went to work quickly on addressing the action and implications of the order. Luna Community College **Interim President Ricky Serna** met with students, employees and community members during four forums and also appeared in two radio shows addressing concerns and answering questions.

In addition, several

committees have been chartered to prepare the Showdue to the HLC by Thursday, Feb. 1. The College will then host an on-campus Show-Cause Evaluation Visit conducted by HLC peer reviewers no later than March 2018. The peer review team will seek to validate whether Luna Community College meets all HLC's requirements.

"It's amazing to see the energy and expertise that has emerged from the work being

done to prepare the Report," said Serna. "The input of students, faculty staff and community members has the campus busting at the seams with talent."

Five committees have been assembled to address each of the criterion for accreditation. Two additional committees will address shared governance policy, and ensure accurate and timely communication is delivered to all stakeholders throughout the process.

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Mares, Trujillo thankful for **Luna Community College education**

In May, 2018 Brittney Mares and JaMarcus Trujillo will be earning a bachelor of science degree in biology from New Mexico Highlands University. Both are thankful for the start they got from Luna Community College.

Show-Cause Order...

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A link has been set up to provide the general public with access to documents provided to the college by the Higher Learning Commission and documents being used to prepare the Show-Cause Order report including drafts of the report itself. The link can be found on the front page of the Luna Community College Website.

A HLC action letter communicating the Board's decision to Luna Community College Interim President, Ricky Serna on Wednesday, Nov. 8 indicates that a Show-Cause Order is a procedural order that requires an institution to present its case as to why accreditation should not be withdrawn. The HLC Board of Trustees issued the Show-Cause Order based on its findings of non-compliance following a Higher Learning Commission Advisory Visit to the College in June.

A Show-Cause Order shifts the burden to the institution to demonstrate that it is in compliance with all requirements associated with its HLC accreditation. If Luna Community College cannot demonstrate that it is, in fact, in compliance with all Criterion for Accreditation, its Assumed Practices, and the Federal Compliance requirements expected of all HLC-member institutions, the Commission will withdraw Luna Community College's accreditation.

In June 2018, the Higher Learning Commission's Board of Trustees will determine whether the institution

has successfully demonstrated that it is now in compliance with the aforementioned accreditation requirements and whether the Show-Cause Order can be removed.

"We respect the Higher Learning Commission's Show-Cause Order and we are working on a plan of action that will include: administration, faculty, staff, students and community members," said Serna. "The immediate response from employees is that we will stand together to successfully overcome this challenge on behalf of the students we serve."

A letter from Serna addressing the Higher Learning Commission's Show-Cause Order was sent via e-mail to Luna Community College students on Saturday, Nov. 11. Serna addressed Luna Community College employees in two separate forums on Friday, Nov. 10.

While on Show-Cause, Luna Community College remains accredited.

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Mares said she is looking at attending medical school at either the University of New Mexico, Denver University or Burrell College of Osteopathic Medicine.

"I take it one day at a time," said Mares. "If I work hard now, it will pay off in the end."

Trujillo also earned an associate of science degree from Luna Community College in fall of 2016.

"I'm looking at either working in the teaching field or working in a chemistry or biology lab," said Trujillo. "Eventually I would like to earn a master's degree in ecology or organic chemistry. I didn't think I was going to make it this far. It was a learning experience that we took together."

Mares and Trujillo have a

daughter together, Zaishah, age 4.

"Having a child gave me a purpose," says Trujillo. "Our daughter wasn't born in the best of health, but I'm happy to say she's very healthy now."

Six Luna Community College Science, Technology, Engineering and Math students attended the Los Alamos National Laboratory (LANL) Regional Community Leader's Update at Northern New Mexico College in Española recently. Luna Community College students were invited as part of a collaborative effort between both entities, to promote understanding and interest in Los Alamos National Laboratory opportunities.

Luna Community College students who attended the Leaders' Update were Timothy Goetsch from Las Vegas, Manuel Salmeron from Las Vegas, Stephen Urioste from Las Vegas, Richard Trujillo from Mora, Jessica Weber from Golondrinas and Tyler Johnson from Roy. Goetsch, Salmeron, Urioste and Johnson are computer science majors. Trujillo and Weber are General Science majors. All six are expected to graduate in May and go on to four year institutions.
