“La Noche de las Luminarias” is a free event, however, canned goods or non perishable food items that will be given



A new practice to take place in 2010

Effective July 1, 2010 institutions receiving federal funds must disclose, on the institution's Internet course schedule, the International Standard Book Number (ISBN) and retail price information of required and recommended textbooks and supplemental materials for each course listed. Mathew Bowie

will be developing a training video to assist you with implementing this requirement. More than likely, this process will be tied into the textbook orders for each course offered. Ron Duran will be communicating with those individuals in charge of submitting book orders. Keep in mind that this process will only allow students to view textbook charges/ISBN, they will still purchase their books directly from the bookstore if they choose to do so.

Smaller learning communities are best

I didn't expect to write this short article, but how I was personally touched during my attendance at the funeral service for three term Governor Bruce King, what my gut level instincts tell me, what the results of the recent LFC report released concerning the five school districts highlighted and the unique educational environment we have in Northeastern New Mexico spurred me to share my passionate sentiments with you.

First of all, there is no question, we have a fiscal dilemma that must be addressed; 2] the general public relies on their elected and appointed officials **to lead at all times** and provide a safe, invigorating and genuinely hopeful (sigh of relief) pathway so each of us maintains our highest level of confidence in the vision, integrity and sincere investment in people put forth; 3] bold leadership is expected, like never before, to pull us out of this fiscal downturn that could lead to a never-ending whirlpool; 4] our Governor, legislature, local elected and appointed government and educational leaders and statewide public and private sector leaders must put aside personal missions and look at the big picture for New Mexico's overall future; and, 5] we must look for and support, draft if necessary, those leaders who will unify us, bring forth a positive economic picture for all New Mexicans and stop the bickering, grandstanding and polarization.

Time is quickly ticking away and available resources are dwindling! While we (for example: the chief executive and legislature) are looking at levels of efficiency, smaller learning communities are absorbing the brunt of criticism and financial cuts. It is not right! Although the purchases we have made, that generate gross receipts taxes (GRT's),

and consumer confidence have declined, it is not because the general populace does not support education or other governmental services; rather, it is because employees keep hearing that jobs are being sent overseas, consumer products (vehicles, tools, machinery, cereal cartons, etc.) are being manufactured right across the border and United States workers are being furloughed and laid-off from what they believed to be safe and permanent jobs.

It is time to reverse the trend and place a stronger emphasis on our smaller learning communities to succeed. We can control our own destiny and make it positive, but *it is going to take us working collectively and reestablishing trust in each other.*

To let the ideology of a few dictate the decline of a society is like allowing the gates of a slaughter house to be opened and we all blindly follow. This cannot happen!

Coordinating and supporting smaller learning communities is not a self serving approach, instead, it is a way of coordinating many existing programs that facilitate student achievement, connect students-to-schools and strengthens relevant and newly implemented programs that will complement student-based initiatives. Supporting smaller learning communities is an effort to connect every student-to-school so they are prepared and able to achieve to the best of their ability.

We can preserve the rich and diverse culture of New Mexico if we keep our school districts and charter schools small and community colleges and universities efficient, yet challenging and inspiring, so each person who chooses this pathway as a guided direction for learning may ultimately experience success in the job market. *Our students and their families are depending on our leadership to provide them with the avenue to attain the success they are sacrificing to reach and the future paychecks they expect.*

Luna Community College will offer five quilting and sewing classes in spring 2010. Instructors Liz Isbell and Lin Chibante encourage quilters and sewers from beginners to advanced to hobbyists, to register for the upcoming classes. *Quilting and Sewing III* will meet Tuesday and Thursday mornings, *Foundation Piecing* will meet Tuesday and Thursday afternoons, with *Introduction to Quilting and Sewing* meeting Tuesday and Thursday evenings. Two Saturday classes will be offered as well – *Quick Rotary Cut Quilts* Saturday morning and *Quilting and Sewing II* Saturday afternoon. All classes meet in Room 104 in the LCC Trades Building.

Students interested in fabric arts, whether experienced or not, are encouraged to develop their creativity and skills in these classes. Demonstration and lessons involve new techniques and review basic sewing skills. Lab sessions allow for hands on work on Janome sewing ma-
