Luna Community College student Shalena Bailey was recently named to the New Mexico All-State Academic Team and now awaits selection notification from the nationally competitive All-USA Academic Team.

Bailey was recognized Friday, Feb. 6 during a ceremony at the State Capitol Roundhouse where legislators, two-year college presidents and top education officials acknowledged the students for their academic achievements and contributions to their communities. In addition to the recognition, she will receive a scholarship to attend any state university she chooses.

"It was a great honor to represent Luna Community College, Phi Theta Kappa and the nursing department. I am especially thankful for the support and encouragement I received from my Phi Theta Kappa Advisors, Cindy Armijo and Dr. Twila Quintana. I felt so privileged to have Dr. (Pete) Campos take time away from his busy legislative schedule to attend the ceremony and place the medallion over my head. I also want to thank Donna Flores-Medina, Mary Ward and Elaine Luna for attending the ceremony and supporting my academic achievements," said Bailey.

A veteran of the United States Navy and mother of two

daughters, 5-year-old Briana and 4-year-old Olivia, Bailey will earn an Associate of Science degree in nursing from Luna Community College this spring. She intends to continue her education at the University of New Mexico.

Luna Community College: Building the foundation to better northeastern N.M.

During the past eight months, the time I have spent as President, I have observed the Board of Trustees and the entire Luna staff coming together for a common goal. That focus has been to provide the best teaching and learning environment possible for young adults, adult learners and hobby enthusiasts.

It has taken a bold vision and straightforward decisions to solidify this direction. There has been much idea sharing, daily interaction and key adjustments in the way we deliver services to students that have brought us to where we are now.

We have initiated: policy changes; rigorous academic program development; efficient infrastructure and facility planning for ADA accessibility, replacement of outdated equipment, building remodeling and essential new construction; and, plans for more extensive outreach within our existing service area and if other areas not within our current service area wish to be served we will work closely with them to gain Higher Education Department and voter approval to provide strong academic and vocational educational programs.

Using the theme "Downtown Luna" we are improving our presence and services in every community we serve. Our main campus in Las Vegas is slated to be the home of the Luna Learning Center and a badly needed

vocational trades area remodel, El Valle is scheduled for a vocational trade center, Springer will have much needed improvements made to its center, Mora is scheduled to have a vocational trades facility built and equipped, vocational equipment upgrades are earmarked for Wagon Mound and a vocational trades facility and wellness center are scheduled for construction and equipping in Santa Rosa.

Memorandums of Understanding have already or soon will be entered into between community leaders and LCC to provide technology centers - used for on-line education - in the towns of Anton Chico and Watrous. The newly constructed library and community center constructed in these communities where these centers will be housed were paid for by almost \$700 thousand in direct legislative appropriations.

A key factor in our future success depends on the bond issue before our constituency. During my 19 years in the legislature and when I became President of LCC, I have heard and been told by leaders of the legislature, legislative finance committee and the higher education department that "we must help ourselves if we expect help from others to improve our facilities at Luna." I have also been told by Chief Executive Officers of major companies that we must have properly credentialed programs to train certifiable students before they will hire them for good
