Varela wants another shot at nationals *LCC student restores Mustang Convertible*

Back in 1995, after he graduated from high school, Varela came across a 1988 Ford Mustang Convertible GT. It had one major problem—no motor. Perhaps two major problems—the body of the car needed work.

Last Thursday Varela, a second-year Luna Community College Auto Collision student, culminated his 16-year project. He restored it to almost-mint condition which included a new motor, transmission, an upgraded rear-end and an outstanding electric blue paint job covered by candy oriental blue with a blue pearl.

“I love it,” says Varela. “I am a car enthusiast. Whether it be an old car or a new car, I love working on vehicles.”

Varela first attended Luna Community College last year after finding out that New Mexico Law was leaning toward mandating that collision companies have certified technicians before releasing insurance premiums on cars that needed repair work.
