- The Financial Aid Office will be taking a snap shot of all class schedules on Jan. 25, 2013 to process aid for the spring semester. Make sure that your class schedule is finalized by this date (Including 8-week courses). Classes added after Jan. 25, 2013 may not be considered for financial aid purposes.

CONSORTIUM AGREEMENT


