Associate Chief Nurse proud to be Luna CC graduate

Cassandra Duran, Associate Chief Nurse— MHA, BSN, RN has had an outstanding career

Cassandra A. Duran has several degrees and certificates on her office wall at the New Mexico Department of Veterans Affairs, Hospital in Albuquerque. And the first one you see is the one she earned at Luna Community College in 1987. It proudly displays that Duran graduated as a Licensed Practical Nurse, (LPN). That was just the beginning.

Since then, Ms. Duran has earned an Associate Degree in Nursing ADN, an Associate Degree in Science from New Mexico Highlands University, a Bachelor's of Science in Nursing, BSN from the University of New Mexico and a Master of Health Administration, MHA from the University of Phoenix. It may not end there. Duran is

contemplating earning a degree in Doctor Nursing Practice (DNP). So how did all this get started?

"I wasn't someone who wanted to be a nurse," says Ms. Duran. "I was working at Russell's Super Save in Las Vegas and I attended a career fair at Highlands University. Luna Community College had a

booth there and what motivated me was a sign that said you could be a nurse in two years. Once I became a nurse, early in my career I realized that I was good at managing people and resources."

Ms. Duran is currently an Associate Chief, Nurse of Ambulatory Care at the New Mexico VA Health Care System—Veterans Affairs

Hospital. She manages all nursing staff in Albuquerque (22 providers) and nine Community Based Clinics across the state and southern Colorado.

"I like the mission, vision, and values of the V.A.," says Ms. Duran. "When people come to work here, we work for the veterans—it's a mission-driven service."

Duran's 26-year career in the medical profession spans many arenas, including stints at Northeastern Regional Hospital in Las Vegas, St. Vincent's Hospital in Santa Fe and working for the New Mexico Department of Health, Public Health Division out of Santa Fe. During her tenure at the Department of Health, Duran helped address law and legislation at the state level and represented New Mexico at the CDC, and Washington D.C., leading New Mexico in emergency preparedness and bio-terrorism training events in post 911. She says that the highlight of her career is when she helped bring primary care and public health models together across rural health in New Mexico.

"Nursing is the No. 1 most trusted profession," says Duran. "When you look at the data, kids trust their school nurse more than anyone. A nurse has to be right, honest, and live a good lifestyle. It is a career of integrity and accountability. A nurse's duty does not begin or end at work. You're always a nurse 24 hours a day, seven days a week. Your community will always call you for advice."

Duran has had her share of adversity to go along with triumphs.

"I was raised in a household of 18 foster children and five brothers, and I am a single parent with three kids," says Duran. "After the death of my parents, I worked two jobs and went to college. I always felt an internal struggle and I often would ask myself if school is worth it. Does it interfere with the limited time I had to be with my kids. So, to

make that transition I chose to make my children part of my schooling. They would help me study; they felt they had ownership of my degrees. When I received my master's degree, my kids encouraged me to walk the graduating line and they were right there cheering me on in the audience. When I looked out at them—there was Devyn and Robert."

With an already busy schedule, Duran fits in teaching at Grand Canyon University. She currently teaches public health to BSN level students. She wants to do the same at Luna Community College.

"I would like to pay forward to the community of nursing and teach at Luna," says Duran. "Nursing school takes a lot out of you. It will pass—do your best. When it comes to nursing school, it's not for the weak of heart; it's for those that endure—it takes courage. If you don't get a good grade, try again. Go back. Grades do not define success. All it takes is one caring adult in nursing school to keep you on task—find a mentor for those times when nursing school makes you feel vulnerable."

By the way, during her master's program, Duran had a 3.95 grade point average.

"I always tell the people I manage 'what are you going to do for your patients today," says Duran. "Don't get caught up in a lot of things, focus on your patients. Always keep your patients up front in your decision."

Although Duran's career has been stellar, one of her goals is to position herself for a Chief Nurse position.

"I tell everyone I earned my degree from Luna Community College," says Duran. "And it's a been a great degree and a really rewarding career."

The Luna Community College Softball Team set several goals at the beginning of its season. One of the goals was to make the postseason. They did this by qualifying as the sixth seed in the Western

Junior College Athletic Conference Tournament.

The top six teams in the regular season advanced to the post-season. It is the first time in the team's five-year history that they participated in post-season play.

"This was the biggest goal of the year," said LCC Interim Head Coach Nathan Trujillo. "We talked about it since day one. During our first workout in the fall, we discussed being in the conference tournament."

Perhaps what makes this even more impressive, is that the Lady

Rough Riders are in their first year as members of the WJCAA.

The Lady Rough Riders finished 18-34 on the year and 9-19 in conformation.

"Being that it was our first year as a conference member, we surprised a lot of teams,"—Nathan Trujillo.

"We did an excellent job coming together as a team," said Trujillo. "I think a lot of our opponents felt we weren't going to be as good as we were. Being that it was our first year as a conference



Limited liability company's (LLC)are they for you?

By the LCC Small Business Development Center What is a limited liability company (LLC)?

An LLC is a form of business entity that offers its members limited liability along with partnership taxation, also known as flow-through taxation. LLCs combine the best of both corporate and partnership structures: protection of personal assets and tax advantages respectively.

What is limited liability?

Say an LLC contracts with a supplier and is unable or unwilling to pay that supplier. The members of the LLC will not be sued personally, nor will their personal assets be at risk solely because they are a member of the LLC. However, members' investments in the LLC will be at risk, but that is the limit. (There are exceptions to almost every generalization, depending on the facts.)

What is partnership or flow-through taxation?

One of the major characteristics of partnership tax treatment is that partnerships (or LLCs) are not taxed at the entity level; corporations, by contrast, are taxed on profit, and then shareholders are taxed on income distributed to them. Other tax planning opportunities may be available, depending on the LLC and members' overall pictures.

What types of businesses are using the LLC form?

Almost all types. Family-owned businesses, which may want to take

advantage of some estate planning flexibility available to LLCs, are using this form as are professional practice groups, such as accountants, architects, lawyers, and physicians. Joint ventures, where two or more independent entities want to join in a single enterprise, which prior to the advent of LLCs would have been done as a partnership, can also benefit from forming LLCs.

What if we have been operating as a partnership - can we con-

Yes. And from a liability perspective, you should consider doing so. Any entity can become an LLC, including a sole proprietorship. Business owners, together with their accountants and lawyers, should add limited liability companies to the list of considerations when structuring a business.

What if I don't have any partners, can I still form an LLC?

Yes. In the state of New Mexico you can form what is called a single member LLC. The process is the same and the benefits are the

He and his wife want to open up a shop

Andrew Garcia starting cutting his own hair when he was a junior in high school. To-day, Garcia has a client list reaching three figures.

"They're not all faithful, but they all have come back," says Garcia a freshman barbering student at Luna Community.

Garcia is quickly gaining a reputation of being one of the top amateur barbers around. He proved this when he took second at the BARBA National Barber Competition in Albuquerque where he took second place. His competitors were from New Mexico, California, Colorado and Texas.

He probably should have won his category (fastest fade); however, he was docked some points. His four-minute fade hair cut was the fastest. It included a line up.

"Part of participating in this competition was that I was able to see a lot of talented people from across the country," says Garcia.

Participants included students and licensed barbers.

"I've always liked to cut hair as a hobby," says Garcia. "I look at it as an art form. One day my friends starting asking me to cut theirs. I want to learn as much as I can in this profession."

Part of the program allows students to do hair cuts as part of the learning process. And it is not uncommon to see Garcia busy from the start of the day to the end.

The following is a column written by Luna Community College nursing student Inez Bolivar. Bolivar would like to share her opinion with fellow students, staff, faculty and the community of the life of a nursing student. This is the fifth in a series

My name is Inez Bolivar and I am currently a second year, second semester nursing student at Luna Community College (LCC). I have had wonderful experiences during my time in the nursing program. Caring for a precipitous labor and delivery female patient and completing my first indwelling male catheter for an older male patient with congestive heart failure are amongst my most prized memories from nursing school thus far. I have cared for (with nursing instructor supervision) patients at every stage of life, from birth to those gravely ill living their last months of life. Providing care and comfort to someone dying is unexplainably special and being present and supportive for a joyous event in a family's life is my privilege. These moments have changed my life and have molded me for a fulfilling future in health care. Last year, I began writing articles for **The Luna Light** to tell my amazing stories, while still maintaining patient privacy and patient dig-

nity. It will be my continuing pleasure to continue sharing my moments and interpretations regarding my educational experience while I am a LCC nursing student. (The stories and experiences of my classmates could perhaps be included.)

Week four through 13

These last weeks have consisted of reading text books, writing pa-

pers and test taking. A typical evening was spent studying for the next day's class discussions and the tests and quizzes in all classes. Two APA style research papers, and three demanding classes, with weekly tests and quizzes and weekly clinical visitations, with assigned clinical paper work, have been the final semester activities of LCC 2013 RN class. Completing the required Kaplan and ATI tests and Evolve Case Studies took discipline and meticulousness to meet all the deadlines and are regarded as highly beneficial for the students. If one was missed, the electronic supplements could not be reopened; meaning the student missed out on those valuable points, and in nursing school, every point achievable is important.

During week ten, I was fortunate to shadow and assist a wound specialist nurse. As we began our day together, I was able to observe and assist in wound care for interesting medical cases. The most memorable case consisted of wound care for multiple amputations to various digits and limbs, caused by calciphalaxis due to kidney deficiency, for which the patient underwent peritoneal dialysis. Calciphalaxis pathophysiology and etiology is currently not fully understood. However, the best explanation for this outcome was contributed to calciphalaxis. The patient suffered horrific kidney disturbances, which contribute to excess vitamin D and calcium in the blood and the tissues, which then calcified in the vascular system and caused thrombosis

causing necrosis of those tissues. My day's mentor, explained assessment of the wounds and then changed the dressings. The patient was in constant pain, even though medicated, during this time. The prognosis was poor; the patient was eventually discharged home and referred to hospice for comfort care. I was humbled by the moment and noted that even during the most abject circumstances, nurses provide care and comfort meas-

After all finals, our last class clinical requirement was to attend the

New Mexico State Board of Nursing Disciplinary Hearings. This activity solidified the phrase "To Err is Human" (Institute of Medicine, 1998), and despite some nurses angelic ambiance; even the loveliest and kind nurse is human after all. As a class, we were exposed to the disciplinary action nurses undergo when accusations and adequate evidence supporting

charges are filed. This clinical appropriately concluded my educational experiences at LCC. It also brought realness to my hopes for my nursing future. Despite ones greatest intentions, unscrupulous events can still occur and the best and brightest of nurses may still be infallible. However; as a future nurse, I was pleased to see nurses defending and uplifting one another, for professional reasons and patient safety.

Some of my classmates have worked through nursing school to provide for their families. As previously expressed, I have deep respect for the demands of the nursing program and caring for a family. I suppose, the aforementioned multitasking, precociously prepares one for the actual rigors of nursing. Efficacious nurses brilliantly juggle many thoughts and tasks at one time. (Perhaps multitasking parents have a natural knack for the nursing profession?)

In conclusion, as I reflect on my educational demands, I realize how demanding it all was. As I endured and successfully navigated these last two years, I approached my nursing program demands week-by-week with euphoric optimism. If I had taken the time to grasp the enormous amount of work ahead of me when I first started, I would have been frightened. (Who has time for anxieties when one is being molded for a future in healthcare?) We in the nursing program have dared to be great, and thankfully have succeeded, despite little or no time to grasp the magnitude of our undertaking.

The Sanchez' intend to take a break this summer and take another furniture course in the fall.


"Even though we're both retired, we're still learning," says Rita. "We made some mistakes along the way, but with Robert's help we were able to fix it."

During the last five years Luna Community College weathered a deep recession where over \$ 591,300 in funds (claw backs) were cut from LCC's budget by the State of New Mexico because the funds were not available. During this time, we have maintained our mission (to serve students), vision (to build the

student programs possible) and values (to maintain institutional rigor and integrity) to provide our students with quality and affordable education, college personnel (without layoffs or furloughs) and area residents with access to education that will lead to good paying jobs.

We have entered into and maintained over 200 Memorandums of Understandings

(MOU's) with other entities to build our college relationships with other agencies that provide support services to our students, updated our Board of Trustee policies to comply with State Statutes and the Community College Act, developed a chain of command that provides clear leadership and are completing an update to our strategic plan to guide us towards the goals that will make LCC premier.

We have earned a record number of accreditations, recognitions and accolades for our academic, athletic, vocational and extra-curricular programs. For example: For the first time we earned: 1] National Accreditation for our nursing program. We have developed and maintained the best educational programs possible to provide the most effective learning and teaching environments so students would comprehend, benefit and prepare for their futures. We've aligned our curriculum, expanded our in-class, on-line and hybrid class offerings.

Now, we are preparing for reaffirmation of accreditation and after receiving the Quality New Mexico Piñon Award, we are now pursuing the Roadrunner Award. simultaneously leads to students potentially entering the post-secondary system as a University Junior.






Students working hard at LCC ACE Lab



Establishing a culture of completion

Based on research findings showing a decline in American education where the United States dropped from No. 1 in the world to

No.17, along with the alarmingly high number of unfilled jobs requiring skilled and credentialed individuals, in 2010 President Obama initiated a White House Summit calling for increasing graduation rates by at least 50 percent by 2020. This spurred Phi Theta Kappa and five other prestigious higher education associations to jointly initiate "Democracy's Colleges - Call to Action" and the College Completion Challenge, pledging to support community college completion.

As the largest and most active honor society in post-secondary education, the more than 1,280 Phi Theta Kappa chapters accepted the challenge to assist in college completion through the establishment of

the C4 Community College Completion Corps. The C4 initiative's foundation is supported by the concept of students helping students. First, each honor student is asked to make a commitment to complete their certificate or associate degree. Next, honor students are asked to each reach out to help at least one other student complete their credential by being a support system for that student, whether by serving as a mentor, by offering tutoring or by serving as a peer resource link to other needed services. Here at LCC, the Beta Mu Nu Chapter of Phi Theta Kappa has held signing day events on several occasions since November, 2011. Chapter officers and members have provided students, faculty and staff with pertinent statistics and information highlighting the importance of college completion. Since last November we have acquired nearly 700 student signatures, demonstrating their commitment toward completion.

In the fall of 2012, Beta Mu Nu Chapter extended the challenge to administrators, faculty and staff to commit to support student completion. A pledge and banner to support student completion was unveiled

during a presentation to faculty and staff held Friday, Aug.17, 2012 at the Allied Health Auditorium. The presenter, Executive Director of Phi Theta Kappa Dr. Rod Risley, visited LCC's campus to discuss the imperative necessity for supporting C4 by establishing a culture of completion. Not only has our chapter asked students to make the commitment to graduate from LCC, but we also asked the campus community to change the predominant culture from students having a right to fail, to providing requisite support and services to help students complete their community college credentials. As advisors of Phi Theta Kappa, Dr Twila Quintana and I are working alongside the Beta Mu Nu Chapter officers and mem-

bers to actively engage the campus community in realizing the need to support college completion. Our goal is to assist in opening the channels of communication by bringing key leaders, on campus and in the community, together to discuss and develop improved ways of helping students succeed. We understand the future of our national, state and local economic security is at stake if we do not begin to embrace a culture of completion.

Quote: "We are all stakeholders in ensuring students are provided every opportunity and the support required to succeed in acquiring a certificate and/or associate degree. We are all affected by recruitment, retention and specifically, completion. I take supporting student completion personally and I challenge every LCC employee to actively and purposefully take it personally as well!"
