YouthBuild at LCC to build youth *Grant to help students age 16-24*

Luna Community College's exciting new program, YouthBuild, is a highly successful alternative education program that will assist local area youth ages 16-24 obtain their GED and pursue post-secondary education. Likewise, program participants will earn construction industry-related job skills by renovating or building affordable housing in our community.

YouthBuild students will participate in leadership development activities, all while earning college credit and nationally-recognized credentials through the Na-

tional Center for Construction Education and Research (NCCER). Additionally, YouthBuild will provide career placement opportunities and case management services to its participants.

All costs incurred for college tuition, lab fees, textbooks, and tools of the trade will be paid for by YouthBuild. Participants will also receive monetary incentives totaling \$2,000. Specifically, a \$1,000 stipend will be given for completing either a renovation or construction project and a \$1,000 graduation stipend will also be awarded. Moreover, students

who successfully pass their GED with a score of 530 (or higher) automatically qualify for the New Mexico Lottery Scholarship.

The LCC YouthBuild program has two local operational partners. The City of Las Vegas and Habitat for Humanity will be directly involved in the actual renovation or construction phases of the program. Additionally, Luna has referring partners and supportive partners who will continuously provide services to YouthBuild and its participants.

The following excerpts are taken from random students enrolled in the course: English, Grammar and Usage, 095 during the fall, 2012 semester. Listed are a few of the learning/outcomes for this course. Final writings must meet these objectives with 70 percent or better in order to pass the course satisfactorily.

Assignment: Students are provided a choice of three topics to arrange and write a 'Descriptive' Essay or a 'Cause and Effect' Essay. Students finalized their final essay after submitting a clustering format, formal outline, a draft copy with edits, and a final essay. The following are excerpts of this assignment:

LEARNING OUTCOMES/OBJECTIVES OF THE COURSE:

- Demonstrate competence in the writing process by editing final product for grammar, language conventions and format.
- Demonstrate the use of strategies in the writing process, utilizing persuasive writing, autobiographical writing, essays that speculate on cause and effect.
- Demonstrate proficiency in creation of narrative texts to engage the reader by establishing a context.
- Demonstrate proficiency in variety of compositions utilizing multiple source's primary sources.
- Plan and write informal outlines by taking notes and producing pre-written documents.
- Gather relevant information for research topic from a variety of print and electronic sources.

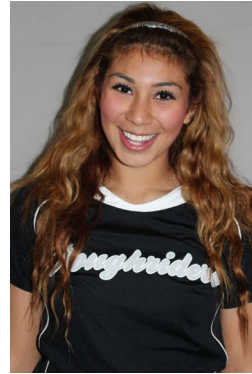

Credentials and reputation lead to success

Have you heard the term, all I need to do is get my foot in the door? My experiences as a supervisor and employer in the private and public sectors for the past four decades have taught me a lot about human nature. I've had individuals tell me - before they were hired - things like: I need a job, I have the experience, I'll work for minimum wage and do what needs to get done! Then, almost immediately after I've hired that person, he or she has said, "I'm not being paid enough to do what you want me to do. Fire me! Anyway, I'll collect unemployment." Or, if a person was not hired for a job, he or she became upset and began to tell others, "He promised me a job" and then that person spreads falsehoods to get even because he or she did not get the job. Lao Tze, philosopher of ancient China, said, "Watch your thoughts; they become words. Watch your words; they become actions. Watch your actions; they become habits. Watch your habits; they become character. **Watch your character; it becomes your destiny.**"

During my career, I've applied for many jobs such as the associate superintendent for support services with the Las Vegas City Schools. During the hiring process, I was not one of the top choices. I remember thanking the superintendent at the time for allowing me the opportunity to compete for the job. The unexpected chain of events that followed - which included the top choice being hired and then declining the position - led to the opportunity for me to be hired. I was later told it was my positive attitude, credentials, reputation and professional persistence that convinced those who would approve my employment to give me a chance. I also applied twice for the presidency at New Mexico Highlands University. I was not hired, but I thanked the committees and regents that made the recommendations and selections and left the documents I prepared for my interviews - which laid out my plans for the university's future - as idea pieces for university leaders.

I share part of my story with you because employers look at many things when they are considering hiring you. They look at - among other things - your **credentials** (do you qualify for the job), your **demeanor** (how you present yourself, are you a good fit and do you have potential), your **reputation** (are you known as a positive, trustworthy and hardworking person) and your **respect for yourself and others**. Colin Powell, an American statesman and retired four-star general in the United States Army, said, "There are no secrets to success. It is the result of preparation, hard work and learning from failure."

YouthBuild Director Eddie King has over 32 years as a professional educator

King says program will convey perseverance, courage and vision

Celebrating over 32 years as a professional educator, YouthBuild Director Eddie King is a former high school principal and past high school Acting Principal and Assistant Principal. Prior to holding his public school administrative posts, King taught at the middle school and high school levels. Moreover, he has been a member of the adjunct faculty at New Mexico Highlands University and Luna Community College.

King was conferred BA and MA degrees from NMHU and is credentialed in English, Spanish, bilingual education, secondary education and educational leadership. He holds professional licensure, a Level Three-A Instructional Leader License and a Level Three-B School Administrative License, from the New Mexico Public Education Department.

During his tenure as a public school administrator, King served as project coordinator of various school/community workforce curricula, including School-to-Work Externship Programs and Learn and Serve America service learning projects. He has administered high school work study programs and further, has managed work release programs where he oversaw students' job performance. Similarly, King has served as a school/community liaison with the New Mexico State Department of Workforce Solutions, having worked alongside state personnel in the development and implementation of various youth employment initiatives.

Regarding his pivotal role as Director of one of LCC's exciting new programs, King said: "At YouthBuild, the three most important things we will impart to our students is perseverance, courage and vision. It takes practice for a person to get better at anything.
