Luna CC Student Senate candidates answer questions

Elections to be held on Thursday, Sept. 20

In the fall of 2010, five people ran for Luna Community College Student Government. This fall, there are 11. The outgoing student government is beyond ecstatic to see this growth and to see our students getting involved in their school. We are pleased to introduce you to those students running for election for 2012-2013.

Running for president are: Amanda Leora Martinez (AM), Cosmetology; Vickie Sands (VS), Nursing; and Francine Vigil (FV), Cosmetology*.

Running for vice-president are: Chris Castellano (CC), Auto body Collision Repair; and Julie Townsend (JT), Nursing.

Running for Secretary and Treasurer are: Adam Saiz (AS), Criminal Justice and Victoria Penix (VP), Nursing, respectively.

And running for senatorial positions are Nicolette Gonzales (NG), Dual-Credit; Mikaela Hughes (MH), Culinary Arts; Julie Silva (JS), Dental Assisting; and Angel Torres (AT), Cosmetology.

As part of the election process, we had the opportunity to ask the candidates several questions. Their answers** are as follows (in alphabetical order):

1. How do you think your involvement in student government will benefit other students?

AM: I will listen to the students' wants and needs for LCC; I will make a difference.

AS: I am here for the students.

AT: I will help bring issues to the S.Gov't body and hold internal agencies accountable.

CC: I will make sure that S.Gov't is behind the needs of the students.

VS: I finish a job once I have started. I fight for what is right and what I believe in.

2. What three things would you try to change if elected?

AM: A recycling program, financial aid assistance, and social activities for the student community.

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LCC employees, departments working on several areas to help retention

SMET Department

SM&ET invests in student retention through individual attention to students by faculty.

The department also runs the Academic Center for Excellence- The ACE Lab to help with student retention by providing peer mentoring and tutoring. The ACE Lab also provides supplemental instructional leaders (SIL's) for gateway courses – those courses where traditionally students have trouble.

The department also works on retention through the ACCELERATE program and the efforts of the Technical Training and Job Placement Career Technical Advisor Diane Moore.—**Dr. Andrew Feldman, SMET Director.**

Adult Basic Education Department

Persistence research indicates that student orientation is an important aspect in promoting retention. An effective student orientation includes program staff gaining an understanding of the whole student, which includes determining his/her goals, supports and barriers to participation in the Adult Education program, as well as assessing academic skills and what schedule of participation (short term intensive, long term, once per week, etc) will best suit the student.

We make every effort to ensure that students understand the program options that are available to them, the requirements of the program they enter, the likely process and time frame for students' reaching their goals. The depth, breadth, and intensity of orientation allows a student to ease into participation in a program through getting to know the culture and procedures of the organization and interacting with other students, without the immediate pressure of performance.

The program and student invest in each other before class starts, so that the student is better prepared to take on the challenge of learning. So an in-depth orientation period is adhered to; 12 hours of mandatory orientation per student must be met prior to being classified as a student. Such an in-depth orientation might seem a hindrance to enrollment as it is time-consuming, but the payoff in retention makes it more than worthwhile.—Geraldine Romero, ABE Director.

LCC Mora Site

Student retention is difficult for any college or university because of the unpredictability of circumstance for any college student. Many factors contribute to their decision and may range from affordability, to relocation, to career change or to downright unhappiness with a par-

ticular institution.

Today, students are fortunate for the many choices they now have regarding college options. However, the constant rise of tuition costs as well as the recent downfall of the economy has limited these options for them. Fortunately, Luna Community College has many conveniences that benefit the students and the communities in which it serves.

In Mora, actually having a site in the center of town serves as both a recruitment and retention tool. It is a constant reminder that a quality higher education is possible, can be affordable and is within reach both on site and online. Additionally, with programs of study with degrees and certificates, students can transfer to a university or get hired by potential employers.

Currently, most of the students are enrolled in core curriculum courses which will be needed in any future program of study; thus enabling them to stay home and "test the waters" of higher education. Since retention is difficult, providing the educational needs of our students, especially in rural communities, allows them to finish and receive either a certificate or an associate's degree.—**Wanda Martinez, LCC Mora Site Director.**

AHEC Department

In response to your request, below are some of the areas that our department supports retention efforts at Luna Community College.

- Support for LCC Nursing & Dental Students in Clinical Training:
 - MdN AHEC reimbursed students for their mileage expenses to attend their clinical rotations in Santa Fe, Albuquerque, Las Vegas, Pecos, Taos and Mora.
 - Fall 2011: 8 nursing students, Total Support: \$3,009.12
 - Spring 2012: 13 nursing and 5 dental students, Total Support: \$3,481.92
 - Summer 2012: 3 dental students, Total Support: \$588.80
- Total Nursing & Dental Students Supported = 29
Total Amount of Support Provided = \$7,979.84*
- MdN AHEC offers educational opportunities for LCC students on health, wellness and prevention. Last semester we partnered with Joanna Tsyitee, President, LCC Student Government to provide a training for all students on Substance Abuse Prevention.
 - Assist students with health resources in the community (El Centro Family Health Center for health and dental health care).

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

- Encourage nursing and dental students to participate in local health fairs and provide them with the tools (BP Cuffs, Ear Thermometers, etc..) and community resources necessary to be successful.
- Assist students with resumes and portfolio's at their request.
- Collaborate with the nursing department on shot clinics with NM Public Health Department.
- Participate as a member of the LCC Nursing Department Advisory Board. —**Elaine Luna, LCC AHEC Director .**
