LCC named as one of the top Hispanic-friendly programs in U.S.

Statistics indicate that the need for Hispanic nurses in America is increasing. According to PracticalNursing.org, Luna Community College is doing its share to help this shortage. Luna Community College was named the 21st ranked Hispanic-friendly Licensed Practical Nursing (LPN) Program in the United States by PracticalNursing.org.

Accelerate program achieves significant improvement in college graduation rates

The first three years of the Accelerate Technical Training and Job Placement program show significant increases in persistence and graduation rates. In a July 15 filing, the Regional Development Corporation (RDC) of Española reported that evaluation metrics proved northern New Mexico college students participating in the A ccelerate program are achieving greater success in comparison with the general student population.

The program announced that 124 of its 380 participating students to date have earned at least one certificate or two -year technical degree. Eighty-seven students are continuing their education by transferring to fouryear degree programs. With an average student

age of 29, *Accelerate* focuses on transitional workers with re-training needs and non-traditional students enrolled in certificate and two-year technical degree programs.

National rankings place New Mexico last in the percentage increase of college graduates between 1990 and 2010. The average graduation rate of Accelerate program participants increased to 39 percent versus the average reported rate of the participating school's general population of 28 percent.

Persistence, an indicator of the desire and action of a student to stay within the system of higher education, is measured by calculating the rate of full-time, first-time, degree-seeking students enrolled in their initial fall semester who are retained through the following spring semester. The average persistence rate (fall to spring) of *A ccel*-

changes in the state's new performance-based funding formula that will reward them for achieving higher persistence rates and increasing numbers of certificates and degrees awarded – especially to at-risk students and to those in science, technology, engineering, mathematics and health (STEMH) fields.

Accelerate, a program of the RDC in collaboration with Santa Fe Community College, Luna Community College, New Mexico Highlands University, Northern New Mexico College, the University of New Mexico-Taos, and the University of New Mexico-Los Alamos, is funded by a five-year grant from the Department of Energy/Office of Environmental Management, the RDC, participating colleges and regional employers.

erate program participants was 86 percent versus the average reported rate of the general population among the six participating institutions of higher education of 75 percent .

According to Dr. Cedric Page, Accelerate Advisory Committee member and Professor of Geography at UNM-Los Alamos, "These metrics clearly indicate that the A ccelerate program is succeeding in its goals to increase persistence and graduation rates in northern New Mexico. At UNM-LA, we are committed to institutionalizing components of the program and we believe the success of the A ccelerate model to date indicates it should be incorporated at a statewide level."

By participating in the *Accelerate* program, northern New Mexico's colleges are better positioned for proposed

• The programs were ranked in order of the percent of total students that were Hispanic

Most recently Luna Community College had 25 LPN graduates. In 2013, the college had 32 graduates.

In 2012, the LCC LPN Program had a 63.6 Hispanic enrollment. In 2013, LCC LPN students had a 100 percent pass rate in their National Council Licensure Examination (NCLEX). In 2012 it was 93.8 percent and in 2011 it was 85 percent. In 2010 and 2009 it was 100 percent and 96.4 percent, respectively. LCC's pass rate, over the course of the last 11 years reached 100 percent in 2006, 2003 and 2002.

"We're very proud to have such a large Hispanic student population," said LCC Nursing Director Conni Reichert. "We're glad to be part of this kind of recognition that solidifies our mission to prepare high quality nurses for our community."

According to PracticalNursing.com, demographics show that certain states have higher populations of Hispanics than others. Along with New Mexico, Texas, California, Florida and Arizona have the highest percentage of population that is of Hispanic or Latino descent. They go on to say that Hispanic LPN's in the healthcare workforce is important because they are often bilingual and can more easily provide and translate complex medical instructions to patients who speak only Spanish.
