LCC Lady Rough Riders 7-1 in conference

The Luna Community College Lady Rough Rider softball team continues to impress in conference play as they took three of four games from Clarendon Junior College over the weekend.

After dropping the first game 7-2, the Lady Rough Riders bounced back to win 13-8, 16-4 and 18-10.

Earlier in the week, LCC lost to Adams State JV 6-4 and 15-5.

They are now 11-12 overall and more importantly, 7-1 in Western Junior College Athletic Conference play.

"Being 7-1 in conference is a great start for the year; there is still a lot of work to do, however," said LCC Head Coach Nathan Trujillo. "We are starting to come together as a team. It's nice to see that they are playing the way we knew they could play. The team is understanding what we are trying to do here."

West Las Vegas graduate Larissa Gallegos hit two home runs for LCC. Alexis Murillo got five hits for the Lady Rough Riders on Saturday, two of them home runs. Marissa Valencia got six hits on seven at bats on Saturday.

"We had a 3-5 start in conference a year ago, so this is much better," said Trujillo. "We have 20 more games in conference."

LCC will travel to Borger, Texas to take on Frank Phillips College this Friday and Sat-

One-on-one with LCC's Joseph Montoya

The following is a one-on-one interview with LCC Building Technologies Instructor Joseph Montoya.

Tell us about your professional experience and educational background.

I have 27 years of work experience in the construction industry as a business owner and journeyman. I am owner of Safety Zone Credentialing LLC. an educational training provider for the state of New Mexico, providing safety training state wide and nationally. I am also a nationally certified instructor in apprenticeship training through the department of labor, following the *Code of Federal Regulations (CFR)* 29:29 and CFR 29:30 for the following disciplines.

Describe your teaching style or teaching philosophy.

Learning is how we acquire information and use the knowledge that we have gained from that information. Students fall into three general styles of learning: Visual, auditory, and tactile or hands on. That is why my teaching style incorporates a mix of modalities and methods of learning to meet the needs of students. I try to facilitate their learning by showing them the significance of the subject being taught is relevant to their work lives. Students want to learn information that is practical rather than abstract and prefer doing types of learning to telling.

What is your favorite part of your current job and why is it your favorite part?

The favorite part of my current job is when students gain the confidence and mastery of newly acquired skills. Students want application for their learning and learn best when they realize how the learning can be used to make them more competent and improve

their professional skills.

What are one or two of your proudest professional accomplishments?

One of my proudest professional accomplishments is attaining national certification as an authorized OSHA outreach trainer for the United States Department of Labor. The next in line would be becoming a Master Trainer and Construction Site Safety Master Trainer through the National Center for Construction Education (NCCER).

How does your background and experiences strengthen academics at LCC?

My background and experience strengthen academics at LCC by improving standardized training for the industry in practical applications and curricula. This initiative opens standardized training to meet the challenge of an impending labor shortage crisis. By focusing on the skills needed to get the job done, standardized training programs are setting the craft-training standards for quality and economy.

Congressman to LCC students: "Finish strong"

Congressman Ben Ray Lujan was at Luna Community College on Tuesday visiting the college's YouthBuild Program. And his message to the students was short and simple.

"Do well in this program; your performance opens doors for someone else," Lujan said. "Your success will determine the success of future programs."

Lujan said he will take what he learned here on Tuesday back to Washington D.C. and share it with the president and the secretary of labor.

"This is an important program that is creating opportunities across America," said Lujan. "This is changing lives in communities."

Lujan said that one of the aspects he is taking back to Washington D.C.is the difference between larger communities and smaller areas such as Las Vegas.

"From a grant perspective, I'm an advocate for more rural programs," said Lujan.

YouthBuild, is an alternative education program that assists local area youth ages 16-24 obtain their GED and pursue post-secondary education.

"We succeed on how we work with each other," said Lujan.

Lujan asked the students to share their ideas on the program.

"Your time is valuable," Lujan told the students. "Thank you for what you are doing; it takes a lot of work. I encourage you to have a conversation with the leadership team. Graduate from this program and someday you can buy a home and raise a family."

Up to this point, 10 program participants have passed their high school diploma equivalency assessments.

"On behalf of the administration, staff and students of YouthBuild, I express our sincere appreciation to Congressman Lujan for taking time out of his busy schedule to hear our stories about our genuine care and commitment to our program," said LCC YouthBuild Program Director Eddie King. "Additionally, we appreciate the Congressman's support of YouthBuild and his acknowledgment of the countless possibilities of success all within our students' reach."


