Armijo receives PTK Distinguished Regional Coordinator Award

Luna Community College's Criminal Justice Faculty member and Phi Theta Kappa Chapter Advisor Cindy Armijo recently received one of the most prestigious awards given by Phi Theta Kappa International Honor Society, the 2014 Distinguished Regional Coordinator Award. The Distinguished Regional Coordinator Award is selected by the Society's executive staff.

Selection is based on coordinators': (1) encouragement, fellowship and continuity provided to chapters within the region; (2) assistance provided in planning and implementing regional meetings; (3) facilitation of attendance at international meetings by chapters in their region; and (4) orientation, motivation and direction provided to chapter advisors and regional officers. Each recipient must have served the Society as a coordinator for a minimum of five years.

Armijo has served as Regional Coordinator for the New Mexico Region since 2007 when she was appointed by the Executive Director of Phi Theta Kappa, Dr. Rod Risley. The New Mexico Region has garnered International awards and recognition under Armijo's guidance including two Regional Milestone Awards, several Distinguished Regional Officer Team Awards and numerous Distinguished Regional Officer Awards. One-on-one with LCC's Sequoia Romero

The following is an interview with Sequoia Romero who teaches in the LCC STEM Department.

Tell us about your professional experience and educational background.

I have been serving the technology industry since I was 15 years old first starting with metal work machining and welding. I later went to college for a degree in electronic engineering and graduated from ITT-Technical Institute with my degree in applied science in 2007. Since then I have served several telecommunications companies, Blizzard Entertainment and two years of R&D for the Department of Defense under a contract for Boeing Aerospace studying effects and development of directed energy weapons. I currently serve the New Mexico Army National Guard as an instructor for Chemical Biological and Radiological Warfare (CBRN) as well as do general management at our local video game and electronics store here in town.

Describe your teaching style or teaching philosophy.

I believe that we have to have a solid reason to learn things. Its not good enough when someone says its important because I said so. As a life student myself I remember when I learned and when I didn't. I use this to help others grasp a concept. I like to address everyone's natural learning style. The hardest part is not the math or science its getting to know the learning side of yourself. In other words I teach the student how to learn, and learn how to learn with a visual and mentally stimulating class. The only way to do this is have lots of fun doing the hands-on experiments and really explore what we are seeing. My goal is to help students achieve a permanent altered perception of their world and how to explore it. I believe my approach to study helps a student get to their peak tempo and their isn't a test or technical challenge they can fail at that point.

What is your favorite part of your current job and why is it your favorite part?

I like a technical or learning challenge and like my students and customers feel I excel most when my mind is being challenged. Whether an advanced circuit, a data trend, or new discovery, these all equally inspire me.

What are one or two of your proudest professional accomplishments?

My most developed professional accomplishment is my leadership and my technical prowess. I have been trained and have experienced high intensity situations whether military, civilian, or just for fun. I have designed several electronic and weapon systems as well as programmed many data demonstration and acquisition modules. The project I most enjoyed and am proud of so far has been my homemade Plasma magneto toroid cannon.

How does your background and experiences strengthen academics at LCC?



I have worked myself to the high places students want to go I can guide them there too. I can train people and I train them well. In my many professional walks, civilian, government, and military I want them to be better at the subject than I am and enjoy themselves doing it.

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



The following is information on VA-Work Study Program. For more information, contact Melissa Lopez at 505/454-5357.

What is the Work-Study Allowance Program?

The Work-Study Allowance Program offers an additional nontaxable allowance to students in return for performing VA-related activities. It serves as a supplemental VA education benefit and often provides the additional funding that allows a student to pursue and accomplish educational goals.

Work-Study students earn an hourly wage equal to the federal minimum wage, or the state minimum wage, whichever is greater.

Who is eligible to participate in the Work-Study Allowance

To participate in the Work-Study Allowance Program, the student must be receiving benefits under one of the following education programs:

- Title 38, U.S.C., Chapter 30: The Montgomery GI Bill
- Title 38, U.S.C., Chapter 31: Vocational Rehabilitation
- Title 38, U.S.C., Chapter 32: The Post-Vietnam Era Veterans' Educational Assistance Program
- Title 38, U.S.C., Chapter 33: The Post-9/11 GI Bill / Fry Scholar-

- Title 38, U.S.C., Chapter 35: Dependents' Educational Assistance Program
- Title 10, U.S.C., Chapter 1606: The Montgomery GI Bill Selected Reserve
- Title 10, U.S.C., Chapter 1607: The Reserve Educational Assistance Program
- VOW/VRAP benefits are not eligible for the Work-Study Allowance Program

A student must be enrolled in and pursuing an approved college degree, vocational or professional program of education at a rate of 3/4 time or greater.

NOTE: Neither federal employees nor students receiving VA education benefits, while participating in an internship program at a VA facility, are eligible to participate in the Work-Study Allowance Program simultaneously at a VA facility.

Apprenticeships and internships available

Luna Community College has built a collaboration with Sandia National Labs. Through this collaboration, LCC students will be eligible for apprentice programs as well as internship programs. Please acquire more information at the ACCESS Center. Additional information will be forthcoming on the LCC Website.

"Dr. Rita Surdi teaches trigonometry and calculus here and she took her own personal time to tutor me. Math is the foundation of science and technology," said Hernandez. "To be honest with you, in high school I was a failure in math. I took alternative math. To me math is a big deal. Dr. Surdi is the most patient lady I've ever met. If there was anybody meant to teach it, it was her. She deserves to be teacher of the year or maybe teacher of the century."

Before attending Luna Community College, Hernandez worked as a carpenter and musician.

"I want to get somewhere," says Hernandez. "Having two or three jobs and being in a band is not easy. The bottom line is that you have to take responsibility for your own education," says Hernandez. "You can learn; it's up to the person."

Another professor that made a big difference to Hernandez was Dr. Elizabeth Juarros.

"She is a wonderful lady," said Hernandez. "She is the one that got me into the AMP (Alliance Minority Participation) program. She was always encouraging me. Overall, this is a great place to start. I haven't met a bad person-not a faculty member or a student that was bad to me. I'm glad I came to school here. I would not have succeeded going into a four-year university. Luna has prepared me well. There's a lot of doors open for me."

Hernandez says that in few years he would like to have one good full-time job.

"This isn't the end," says Hernandez. "This is the beginning, I have to keep going."
