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LCC's Martinez honored at Capitol

Luna Community College's Montana Martinez was among 40 students statewide that were honored at the State Capitol on Wednesday after earning a spot on the All-State Academic Team.

Martinez, a 2011 West Las Vegas High graduate, earned a tuition scholarship to a four-year New Mexico University of her choice.

"She is a phenomenal individual who is accelerating academically and athletically," said LCC President Dr. Pete Campos. "She is a positive role model for the students of our college and the entire state of New Mexico."

Gov. Susana Martinez proclaimed Jan. 29 Community College Day. The proclamation was read by New Mexico Secretary of Higher Education Dr. Jose Garcia.

"She is an inspiration to student-athletes," said LCC Humanities Instructor and Phi Theta Kappa Advisor Cindy Armijo. "She gives credence to the phrase student athlete. She represents Luna Community College in many different levels both as a scholar and athlete."

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Armijo was also one of the guest speakers at the event. She is Phi Theta Kappa's New Mexico Regional Coordinator. Armijo talked about the importance of getting students to graduate.

"All of you may agree with me that our nation has been suffering economically for quite a long time," said Armijo. "President Obama in 2010 set forth a call to action. He said that our nation's prosperity is dependent on its education of its citizenry."

Armijo emphasized the importance of Phi Theta Kappa's C-4 initiative where community college graduation rates increase.

"We need to extend ourselves to help students complete," said Armijo. "We have seen an increase of our graduation rates at our college."

Sen. Stuart Ingle was also a guest speaker.

"I appreciate what community colleges have done for all of New Mexico," he said. "Community colleges have done wonderful things—the job getting potential is great."

Dr. Dan Lopez, president of New Mexico Tech, told the 40 students in attendance that it is no longer enough to pass a course, but to master it.

Martinez will be competing for a position in the All-USA Academic Team and other scholarships.

"Today was a great experience for me," said Martinez. "Luna Community College is a great place to get started."

Martinez said she plans to either attend UNM or Highlands University. She will walk on to play softball at both schools.



He said, "Support the mil levy, tell people it is a good school, encourage them to take classes there and always speak positive of the institute." That was about 45 years ago when I was a teenager! I have never forgotten that advice!

Now, the message I wish to share with you is similar, but I would like to add, "Luna Community College is also known in higher education circles for its institutional integrity and educational quality." We have progressed to the point that other two-year institutions inquire about our concurrent enrollment, core offerings, program rigor and processes used to seek nationally recognized certifications and accreditations. The latest effort to seek accreditation for one of our departments is led by Dr. Vidal Martinez and the valued personnel of our College of Business. Our self-study was submitted in January and the anticipated site visit is scheduled for March. A few, but not all, of the accreditation benefits to LCC, our College of Business, students, faculty, staff and community include: 1] reinforcement of our commitment to continuous improvement, innovation and scholarship; 2] providing prestige and credibility when seeking funding resources from donors, foundations and government; 3] creating greater visibility in the world of business and attracts top recruiters seeking to employ our students; 4] promoting an outcomes assessment process linking goals, activities and outcomes; 5] the ability to serve students by assuring a focus on quality programming and performance; 6] faculty experiencing a boost of self-esteem when teaching in an accredited business program; and, 7] creating the impetus for relevancy and currency of faculty, programs, and courses to best serve employers.

Buy-in from our College of Business personnel in this accreditation process is another indicator of our commitment to institutional integrity and educational quality. Taking this approach to strive for academic excellence is another landmark initiative proving we are serious about and fully committed to the overall reaffirmation of accreditation through the Higher Learning Commission.

We won't give up! We'll continue to move ahead and earn the recognition of being among the best two-year colleges in the country! Our students deserve the best education possible and we're dedicated to that goal!
