## Several attain Bridge to Success Scholarship

Our Adult Education Program would like to announce our 2013 fall semester graduates. These students were put on the fast track to attaining their high school diploma because of the significant changes that will be taking place this year: a more rigorous test that will be aligned with Common Core Standards; this test will only be offered on computer: it will be more costly (doubling), and the students will have to travel to Santa Fe or Albuquerque to test, no local testing center. This will no doubt hurt our low-income students.

Some of our students are still awaiting their scores because Pearson Vue has been bombarded with students who have rushed to complete this exam before the end of the year and the total revamping of the test in January.

Audree was a 2011 graduate of Robertson High.



Reaffirmation of accreditation by the Higher Learning Commission would permit us to continue providing accredited educational services to the public. As a team; we have improved, aligned and focused on the rigor and quality of our program and course offerings. Our efforts have been to review global employment trends and adjust our training and educational offerings to meet current and future demands.
