Victor Ramirez:"I want to help others"

Victor Ramirez was asked a simple question the other day. And he gave a simple answer.

survive," he said.

"When I take something on, I

give it my all," says Ramirez. "I have a drive inside myself to do things to the best of my ability."

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As a non-traditional student, Ramirez has done and experienced many things. And he brings the wealth of his wisdom to the table on a daily basis.

"I came back to school at age 43, I was looking for something to do; I had a lot of free time," said Ramirez.

Although a successful restaurant owner and a smile and attitude that is contagious, Ramirez has had his share of troubles and tribulations.

"I was a heavy drinker to the point that a year before coming back to school I entered a treatment program. I recognized I had a problem and I knew I couldn't do anything on my own. I can't say what led me to drinking, I did it since high school," said Ramirez who earned a business administration degree from Luna CC in December.

"If anyone thinks they have a drinking problem, look in the mirror and admit it," said Ramirez. "I believe no one can tell you that you have a drinking problem; you have to admit it yourself. Once you admit it, it's a lot easier. You will know once something

"Things happen in life and you have to be consistently making choices," said Ramirez. "I don't even like the smell of it (alcohol). And I don't even like being around people that drink. To be at a party when people start getting drunk; I don't want to be around. I can be around it and have no desire to drink. I'm one of the lucky ones. Deep down inside I didn't want to be around it anymore." Ramirez said that self reflection is a major component to overcoming addiction.

Ramirez a lot as well.

"I started at the restaurant in 2000. As a firefighter I was working 10 days a month so I had time to help my mother. I was one employee that will be there forever," said Ramirez who mostly cooks and waits on tables. "It's a tough business; to succeed you have to cater to people. Everyone has different needs. I know the majority of my customers. I can have their orders ready for them before they can get their drinks"

So how does Ramirez handle a job, school and being president of the LCC Student Senate?

"I have learned not to go home and stress," said Ramirez. "I've learned that at a certain point, you have to just drop it. Here at Luna I like seeing things get accomplished and see actual progress. The toughest part is seeing that progress does not come as fast as

> you would like it. There is red tape, but that is part of the process."

For Ramirez, just the fact that he returned to college after so many years is a victory in itself. "One of the main reasons was always hearing negative things from people about drug addicts

starts to affect your life or the life of your family—it's self diagnosis. I want to help others."

And helping others is what he is doing.

In a short time as the student leader, Ramirez led a successful coat drive that helped out hundreds of local resident. He, along with student government, helped raise money for SkillsUSA with a very successful hunted house during Halloween.

"One of our goals this semester that we will try to get done is to have a homecoming for our baseball and softball teams," said Ramirez. "We have to realize that athletics are a part of the college. In order to promote and build student enrollment, these programs are important and not having them would put us at a bigger disadvantage. Luna is a great community college. It is a great resource for surrounding communities. If Luna didn't exist many students wouldn't seek a higher education."

Through his experience in different fields, Ramirez has learned that even with good intentions not everything goes well all the time. He saw this when he was a firefighter and paramedic in Santa Fe.

"I remember working on someone and not bringing them back to life," said Ramirez. "It is very difficult when you have to tell their loved ones that there is nothing else you can do. I think when people look at TV and reality, it is totally different. It's not that easy. I have learned a lot about compassion."

Working at El Sombrero Restaurant for many years has taught

and alcoholics never being able to change, "said Ramirez. "I believe that this tends to make the person believe that they can't ever change. My goal is to show others, that change can be made if it's the desire of the individual. Just like quitting drinking or using drugs, the individual has to make that decision themselves. Once a person believes in themselves, then the sky's the limit. Only their mind can limit them."

Ramirez says that there are certain elements that are needed to succeed not only in school, but in life.

"When some of us leave high school in pursuit of higher education we do it because we have been given an ultimatum to either work or go to school," said Ramirez. "We do it, but sometimes halfheartedly. We don't go into it with enthusiasm and we make choices which we don't realize will impact us later in life. Twentyseven years ago I attended NMHU and ended dropping out after three years, at the time I was failing classes and withdrawing from some at the end of the semester."

For Ramirez perseverance and fortitude has been the key.

"No matter what cards you are dealt in life, you can always throw them away and start with a new deck," said Ramirez. "All it takes is a little motivation, dedication, sacrifice, and a great support network."

So where does Ramirez want to be in 10 years.

"I'm always going to be here; Las Vegas is my home," he said.
