First draft of Luna CC school song released to the public; opinions on tune, lyrics differ

- *Taba has to go, lyrics are good.*
- *The song needs some tweaking.*
- *The song is fine, but the tune needs to be catchier.*
- *There needs to be more fight in the song.*
- *It wasn't what I thought it should be.*
- *The school should open it up to a contest and then everyone should be able to vote on it.*

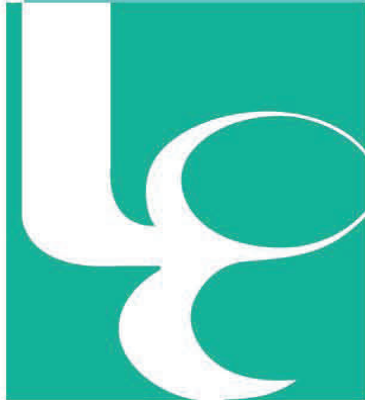

The educators

Boxing is one of the oldest contact sports known to humankind. Evidence that boxing existed in ancient times is evidenced in the archaeological findings of the Egyptians, Greek and Mediterranean civilizations. The origin of boxing is dated as early as 3000 BC.

There is a vast difference between the boxing of today and ancient boxing. Ancient boxers did not have access to boxing gloves and head gear and boxing was not referred to as boxing. In ancient Greek and Roman times, the sport of bashing up the teeth of your opponent during fist fighting *was called pugilism which eventually evolved into boxing.*

The rules of ancient boxing were quite different from today. The fights were not divided into rounds and there was no split or unanimous decision. The winner of the match would be judged only by Knock-Out and in extreme cases, death.

Ancient boxing was more brutal than today's boxing. Ancient boxers usually had strips of leather around their fists and fingers or gloves with spikes which would provoke more lethal blows than today's boxing.

Today's boxing is much more different than ancient boxing. The rules, regulations and enhancements in sports entertainment have greatly reduced the chances of grave injury to a boxer. Now, it is necessary for a boxer to wear protective gear and padded gloves and the rules no longer allow for a lethal match. In amateur boxing headgear is also used.

Today, there are two kinds of boxing, *amateur and professional.* Amateur boxing is mainly found at the secondary education or college level and in the Olympics. Professional boxing is much more serious and many safety restrictions are removed.

That leads us to the bouts. *These professionals are the educators!* They have worked extremely hard to get in shape both mentally and physically. Many of them have shared their life stories with others and have emphasized *Education* as the wave of the future and the way out of poverty or making a living through boxing.

Wow! There definitely are role models in the ring! Think about it. **Mr. Lenny Fresquez and Mr. David Martinez** have put together a boxing card with true notables and role models. Let's learn of their dedication in the ring and respect them for their role in society as these great fighters promote a philosophy of staying in school, achieving never before imagined levels of education and experiences and always putting our heart, soul and intellect at the forefront of making our lives better.

Distinguished boxers, thank you for being positive role models for our children. Remember, it is about love, admiration, respect and competition. These anchors will make "all of us" better at what we do! *When thunder roars, lightning strikes and atmospheric systems clash, the storm begins! Let's get ready for a night of boxing in Las Vegas!*

Six ways to build a top staff
