The new mass media communications program and associate of arts degree was initiated last fall and is part of Luna's ongoing efforts to create the curricula, education, and training programs that will equip students for the new jobs and career opportunities of the 21st century. The main mission of the program is to provide quality education and training that will enable students to obtain entry level employment related to mass media communications and/or to pursue continued education regarding the various forms, and methods of mass media communication in institutions of higher education.

A secondary and complementary mission of the Program is to use its expertise to assist in the development of the area and its citizens by increasing the ability to identify, transmit, analyze, and create or enhance mass media communication services and products that will encourage economic growth and improve the quality of life.

Luna is committed to developing a state-of the-art media education and training program. The construction of a \$7.2 million media arts center is underway, and Gov. Richardson recently provided \$150,000 to equip the new mass media program. This fall the program will be expanding to include the Film Technician Training Program. In partnership with the New Mexico Film Technicians Union, the new certificate program will train students for the wide variety of film technician jobs such as make-up artists, grips, and set construction in the growing and thriving New Mexico film industry.

Mass media communication is an important component of almost every business and industry, and new career and job opportunities in mass media communications are being developed nearly every day. The mission of the LCC Sports Performance Program is to provide quality education and training in the area of sports performance and related fields which will enable students to gain meaningful employment. The associate of applied science degree in sports performance is designed for students whose primary interest is in individual sporting careers, coaching, or officiating. The curriculum will provide a foundation to develop skills required for employment in the sports performance fields and/or advanced degree opportunities. Transfer credits are determined by the receiving institution on a course-by-course basis. The program follows National Standards for Sport Coaches.

The program is structured to provide training in accordance with the eight National Standards for Coaches. These are:

 Philosophy and ethics - clearly articulate the importance of an athletecentered coaching philosophy and

- professional accountability for fair play for all.
- Safety and Injury Prevention maintains the core standards of coach responsibility for providing safe conditions and appropriate actions when emergencies arise.

The program is structured to provide training in accordance with the eight National Standards for Coaches.

- Physical conditioning is a description of coaching responsibilities in the areas of psychological training, nutrition education, and maintaining healthy environments.
- Growth and development maintains the coach's responsibility in creating an inclusive learning environment that

- leads all athletes to feel welcome and supported to have experiences that foster leadership skills.
- Teaching and communication focuses on identifying standards for sound instructional strategies and interpersonal behavior of the coach.
- Sport skills and tactics is focuses on the need for coaches to have basic sport knowledge and to be able to apply it to the competitive environment.
- Organization and administration identifies how the coach provides resources in the daily operation and management of the sport program.
- Evaluation teaches numerous assessment skills necessary to be an effective coach.

Diversity in the Luna CC GED Program

The Adult Basic Education Program offers classes to a diverse population of learners both on campus and in the community. Diversity defines our program. The population of students that we serve is of all shapes, sizes, colors, abilities and capabilities, economic backgrounds, disabilities, and aspirations. For many students, the reasons they've selected the GED path are varied. Many students have failed to successfully acquire their high school diploma either because they have dropped out of school or because school was not for them. For many, it is the lack of self confidence or their poor academic performance in an educational setting. For some, financial responsibilities became more of a priority than an education; so many students left school to seek employment to help the family.

Others are academically gifted and are bored in a regular learning

environment. A major component of our ABE family is the at-risk students, those students that have been adjudicated by the courts to attend the program to acquire their GED as conditions of their probation. Many adult students are embarrassed to return to school because of their long absence from education and feared they lacked the skills to succeed. Our student population seems to get younger with every passing year, and because of our young population (70 percent of our student population are ages 16 to 24) and the maturity level of this particular population, the ability to retain students for longer periods of time becomes more difficult which affects their perseverance towards improving on their skills, and consequently, acquiring their GED.

Because of the diversity of our students, the ABE student may face more challenges as opposed to a student who acquired their high

school diploma. Financial burdens, poorly developed academic skills, lack of child care, low-level confidence, problems with the courts, dropping out at a very young age, immaturity, transportation, and housing may make academic success more difficult to achieve. These challenges have placed more of a burden on the programs who are trying to meet the goals of developing higher-level skills, acquiring a GED, transitioning students to a post-secondary institution, and

finally entering the work force to function effectively as a member of society. Our high number of graduates (47) for the fiscal year 2009-2010 confirms that many students do learn to overcome these adversities. Many GED graduates are first-generation or first-time college students who learn to navigate the higher education system. Through their persistence, commitment, and hard work, these graduates have overcome barriers to learn, to become successful, and to meet today's academic and economic challenges.

Liberal Arts Degree and General Education Certificate Student Learning Outcomes Assessment

College-Wide Abilities

Emphasizing core abilities provides a consistent educational focus that encourages students to develop knowledge, habits and skills for life-long learning. Students experience many opportunities across the curriculum to develop and apply college-wide abilities in preparation for their roles in an increasingly diverse, technologically complex, information-driven society.

Critical Thinking: Graduates receiving AA as well as certificates of 35 credits or more have the opportunity to examine and evaluate their own and others' thinking. The development of these skills requires that students learn to:

- Apply, analyze, synthesize and evaluate information;
- Identify arguments, evaluate claims and sources, consider multiple perspectives, and form conclusions based on sound reasoning and verifiable evidence;
- Recognize when additional information is necessary and locate it, using a variety of oral, print and electronic/web-based sources;
- Demonstrate logical, disciplined thinking habits while examining ideas and solving problems;
- When applicable/required, recognize cultural variations in reasoning processes.

Written and Oral Communication: Graduates receiving AA as well as certificates of 35 credits or more have the opportunity to express themselves in oral and written Standard English. The development of these skills requires that students learn to:

- Write and speak in a clear, logically organized manner, using appropriate supporting evidence;
- Employ effective delivery techniques in oral presentations; When required, use computer technology and/or media resources

to develop written documents as well as to generate and/or deliver oral presentations;

- Adapt writing and speaking to the forms, standards, requirements and audiences of individual programs/disciplines and contexts;
- When applicable/required, recognized cultural variations in writing and speaking styles.

Group Interaction: Graduates receiving AA as well as certificates of 35 credits or more have the opportunity to work productively in groups. The development of these skills requires that students learn to:

- Identify, practice, demonstrate and assess group interaction skills;
- Facilitate effective interaction and mutual understanding among group members for the purpose of working on a task, participating in a class discussion, or making a group presentation:
- When applicable/required, recognized cultural variations in communication and personal-interaction styles.

The LCC Department of Humanities works holistically and with individual instructors on the following:

- 1.) Explaining the uses and benefits of assessment rubrics; 2.) Developing assessment rubrics that reflect assignment outcomes and course objectives; 3.) Refining or creating departmental objectives;
- 4.) Aligning assignment design with course and program objectives;
- 5.) Building consistent instructional and assessment practices among full and part-time faculty.

SMET program at LCC rocks

The Luna Community College Department of Science, Math, & Engineering Technology (SMET) has witnessed many changes over the past year, all to the benefit of our students. The department faculty and staff are excited and enthusiastic because the changes have led to a better environment for learning.

In the past year the department received money from the state to support programs with the purchase of new equipment. The physics and geology laboratory now has up-to-date experimental equipment for physics to help reinforce topics discussed in lecture including several computers with software for physics experiments. The state allocation also provided for new computers in the computer science lab.

The alternative and sustainable energy program (ASEP) has purchased equipment for student hands-on learning. We have installed a hybrid wind and solar powered system on the roof with the controls in the SM&ET lobby area. Students can use the wind and sun generated power to plug in their laptops in the lobby and use the Wi-Fi internet access. The ASEP is building a solar powered trailer for demonstration and laboratory use which can provide power in locations without electricity and will contain demonstration experiments to highlight the benefits and uses of alternative energy.

LCC in conjunction with New Mexico Highlands University was awarded a federal grant to institute the Bridging Careers for Success (BCS) program aimed at science, math, and engineering students. The overall purpose of the grant was to align science and math courses for a seamless transition from the community college to the university. In addition, the grant also provided money for improved learning environments at both schools. At LCC the SM&ET department underwent renovations to classrooms and built a brand new computer and tutor lab for students. The department has a new computer science lab, a conference room with instructional television (ITV) capabilities, and an updated video game computer lab.

The BCS program hires tutors and student instructional leaders (S.I.L.) that help students with traditionally difficult classes such as physics and calculus. Students who wish to become a tutor or S.I.L. get paid for their efforts and become better students in the process. The BCS program also provides money for exceptional students to work as an intern with various agencies. The department is dedicated to providing a

solid educational foundation to students and the BCS program has provided many additional opportunities.

The department has several new programs that came into effect with the LCC 2009-2012 Catalogue. The video game design and development (VGDD) associates of applied science had five graduates this past May and also hosted a video game tournament in March, 2010. The VGDD program will be hosting tournaments on a regular basis with cash prizes and fund raising for the GAMERZ Club.

The math, physical science, and life science associate of science degrees are articulated with NMHU (and all other state schools) so that students may easily transfer from LCC to NMHU or other universities in the bachelor of science programs. If you are math challenged, LCC faculty and

staff can help you succeed with friendly faculty and tutors available in the Academic Center for Excellence Computer Lab.

The computer science program has undergone revisions to curriculum to keep up with ever-changing technology. Instructors have received additional training in the state of the art Recording Studio, which allows them to record their lectures so that students can view the lectures online. This provides remediation and reinforcement of the skills the students are learning while taking their courses. Online courses-an easier fit for busy schedules!

Another plus in what the Title V program provides is that the students who are taking online courses are called by our administrative assistant, Michelle Bencomo, in assisting students with any issues they may be experiencing researching other avenues for stabilizing what while taking an online course. The students are Title V has accomplished so far.

given names and phone numbers of the "Online Help Desk" in order to experience success with their courses. In the summer of 2010, 230 students were taking an online class for eight weeks! Students now have the convenience of registering for classes at Luna Community College without leaving their homes. Students from remote locations can now register for their classes online. Springer, one of LCC's satellites, has been provided with a Student Smart Lab that consists of 12 computers, a printer and a scanner. Students, who need to use the lab for their online courses, now have a lab that provides the state of art in technology

in this area. In Pecos, a Student Smart Lab is still under construction, but will provide the same effectiveness for the students and the community in the area.

Finally, the Title V staff, Michelle Bencomo, Rick Roybal, Larry Paiz, John Tiernan and Lorraine Martinez, will be going to the University of New Mexico in Albuquerque to get training in writing grants to continue the sustainability of providing Distance Learning services for students.
