Luna Community College will sponsor a symposium on "Improving Student Learning for Career-Technical Programs" on Monday, Aug. 2 and Tuesday Aug. 3 at the Plaza Hotel in Las Vegas, N.M. LCC Computer Center and Information Technologies Director Mike Adams is directing the symposium.

For one LCC employee, hope is carrying her through the hard times

A Different Perspective

It's safe to say that life over the last three years or so hasn't been easy for Luna Community College employee Jeanette Nolan.

Nolan, a humanities instructor for the college, has had more than her share of downturns. Some may say we all have. Perhaps this is true. But to truly understand Nolan's life today, we have to look closer at the journey.

On Sept. 18, 2008 Nolan was told something that we all dread—her father had suffered a severe heart attack. A month later he died. Five months later her mom was diagnosed with cancer. Five weeks after this, she passed away.

This past July 14, Nolan's apartment caught on fire. She was still recovering from the loss of her most precious possessions—her parents—today she finds herself trying to figure out how to recover from losing material things such as clothes, food, furniture which she has taken a huge financial hit.

But throughout this, Nolan still finds a way to smile. Not to give up. To still have hope.

"When my parents passed away, I didn't really react. I didn't have time to react—I was in a state of shock. This past spring I had time to deal with it," she says.



Jeanette Nolan says that although her life hasn't been easy over the last few years, she still has hope for a better future.

Her parents lacked proper health insurance and she was left with the majority of the medical responsibility.

"I have to buy food, dishes, glasses, silverware. All my clothes are in storage (they are smoked damaged). I have renter's insurance to worry about," she says.

Nolan knows that her book isn't on its final chapter.

"I can't stop. My parents dying was difficult on me. I was helping them financially, but I gained independence from that. I looked at it as a new beginning—a rebirth. My apartment burning was another eye-opening experience. I have to budget even better," she says.

Part of the rebirth she has experienced is there are times in life to slow down, but never to put the brakes on a permanent basis.

"I still have a lot of goals. When my parents died my goals didn't die. It's just sad to talk about it," she says.

With her latest tragedy, she has found that people, in general, have goodness in their heart.

"Many individuals have stepped up and helped me out. I'm not one to cry, but I feel very blessed and I want those people that have helped me to be blessed 100 times over," she says. "I want to say thank you everyone that has helped me so far and thank everyone that will help."

ACCESS Center encourages students to take COMPASS test early

The fall 2010 semester at Luna Community College is fast approaching, with this being said, LCC would like to encourage high school juniors and seniors to take the COMPASS Test at LCC now during the summer. Taking this test during the summer will eliminate the last minute rush and the pressures that come with it.

COMPASS Testing can be done from 8 a.m. to 3:30 p.m. Monday through Friday at the main campus at Luna Community College or any of the many satellite offices in the surrounding areas. Study guides are

also available for students to pick up at the ACCESS Center in Student Services Building. The test should be taken seriously as the scores will determine class placement. The first time the test is administered it is free and thereafter the cost is \$5 per section or \$10 for the full battery. Please be advised that students can only take the test one time per semester. For this reason, we strongly encourage students to take advantage of early testing. If students test now and don't place where they hoped to they have enough time to get tutoring and retake the test during fall semester.


