



# Regaining and keeping each other's trust is vital to recovery in consumer confidence

As consumers, we drive the economy and our economic activity is monitored through the United States Consumer Confidence Index (CCI). This indicator is designed to measure consumer confidence, which is a reflection of the degree of optimism of the state of the economy that consumers are expressing through their activities of saving and spending.

When the public hears or reads a message from anyone who is granted a venue to disseminate information, they process and may be guided by what is said or written. When repeated enough, this information influences consumer behavior. That is what we are experiencing today. Throughout the past several years we have heard that consumer confidence is low. When repeated enough that message sinks in, and the general public then adjusts their spending and saving habits.

Hesitation then sets in, long-term borrowing for homes and vehicles declines, purchasing bare essentials occurs and if possible, personal earnings are saved. What does this do to the global, national, state and local economies? It has a domino effect. Large companies cut back on production and consumers make-do with what they have and postpone or reconsider making purchases, spending on leisure items and trips, limit or eliminate contributions to worthy community organizations and put-off preventive and essential health care.

What else happens? Jobs are lost, unemployment benefits rise, more dependency is placed on government subsidized food and health services, people are under higher levels of stress, there is less respect for each other (personal survival instincts emerge) and theft, domestic

violence and illegal and prescribed drug and alcohol abuse rises.

What can we do to improve the conditions of our local economy? It starts with a positive attitude, respect for each other and a wholehearted commitment to go beyond our daily routine and give in some additional way to boost consumer confidence. When we understand and address the roots of our economic woes, then our support of each other grows and we lessen the ill effects of a soft economy.

Consider the following scenario: The New Mexico State Legislature is closely evaluating ways to adjust the state budget during the upcoming special session scheduled for the middle of October because of a projected \$550-\$700 million shortfall. This means governmental services are going to be reduced and more economic pressure will be placed on our

communities. A potential outcome: if we genuinely support each other, find ways to help those who are going through extraordinary tough times and spend as much of our earnings as possible at home, we may not live like we are accustomed to, but we will survive these trying times.

The other key ingredient to our quality of life is the expression of our faith. When we have hope and rejuvenate our friendships, our hearts become lighter, we feel better about each other, and laughter instead of blame dominates our daily living. This is the foundation for transformational change. Once this is realized and practiced we can then focus on efficiencies and accountability. That includes: revisiting our master and strategic plans; and make necessary sacrifices like absorbing more duties, so we don't lose jobs.

# Luna Community College explores development of new film program

Luna Community College President Pete Campos and other Luna staff met Monday with New Mexico Film Office Director Lisa Strout to discuss the possibility of developing a new film studies and training program at Luna. Film and media are among the fastest growing industries in New Mexico. The investigation into the development of a "film school" is part of Luna's ongoing efforts to create the curricula, education, and training programs that will equip students for the new jobs and career opportunities of the 21st century.

In 2007, film production activities in New Mexico created 2,220 direct jobs. These 2,220 direct jobs created 1,609 additional jobs in other

industries, resulting in a total employment impact of 3,829 jobs. If the film industry is to continue to expand and settle in New Mexico and New Mexicans are to take advantage of the new employment opportunities, a qualified and trained workforce will be needed. Luna hopes to play a major role in providing this training to students in northern and eastern New Mexico.

Within the next two weeks, the College will also be meeting with Jon Hendry, Business Manager of local film technicians union, the International Alliance of Theatrical Stage Employees (IATSE), to discuss implementing the Film Technicians' Training Program at Luna. The Program provides hands-on, academic

training to New Mexico residents interested in entering the film industry. Students choose a specific craft and work on actual short-form productions (public service announcements, commercials, etc.). The final semester is spent working on larger projects such as shorts and independents under the supervision of experienced crew members.

Luna is already offering a class one beginning film making through its Mass Media Communications Program. Depending on the outcome of the feasibility analysis and the level of student interest, the new and expanded film studies and training program could be available by the fall of 2010.

The Route 66 Restaurant has been serving the travelers of Route 66 and the community of Santa Rosa for the past 27 years serving a wide variety of foods, from the traditional northern N.M. foods to the all-American burger. The business has kept the tradition of the 50s style décor both inside and outside of the restaurant. They offer Taco Tuesdays and Burger Thursdays and most people agree that they have the best tacos and burgers in town. They also offer daily specials, but the busiest days are the Taco Tuesdays and Burger Thursdays. They also offer breakfast in addition to lunch and dinner with free refills on coffee. They are open from 6 a.m. to 10 p.m. seven days a week. The Velasquez family is big on family

and tradition. When you dine in their restaurant, they make you feel at home with a friendly welcome and service beyond compare.

The business was started by Pat Velasquez in 1982 and they leased the building that they have been in for the past 27 years. After the death of Pat Velasquez, the Patriarch of the family, Mary, Patricia and Jennifer Velasquez took over as owners of the Route 66 Restaurant in honor of the husband, father, and grandfather of the three women. The road to opportunity has not always been easy for the Velasquez family but when the three women were presented an opportunity to purchase the land and building that they have been leasing since 1982, something that Pat Velasquez had always dreamed of when he first

started the business, they finally realized that their opportunity had finally arrived.

The Velasquez family contacted the Las Vegas Small Business Development Center in May of 2007 for help with a business plan and loan package. The SBDC has been instrumental in helping the

Velasquez family gain the confidence to move forward with the loan and present their business plan to the bank. Community First Bank was their bank of choice and Ernesto Salazar was the lending officer who helped the Velasquez family with their loan.

"The SBDC was so important in helping us with our business plan. They provided so much guidance and help for us and we were able to complete a plan and some financial projections," said Jennifer Velasquez.

"We are so thankful to them and we

know that they will always be there when we need them," said Patricia.

The Velasquez family has built a solid business on hard work and tradition. The purchase of the building has fulfilled a lifelong dream for the family and they are excited to have something to hand down to their children. The Velasquez family plans on making some much needed improvements to the building, but still keeping the traditional décor of the 1950's. "We are excited for the future of our business and our family," says Jennifer.
