Someday Romero wants to teach at Luna Community College

Luna Community College student Sequoia Romero says that one day he would like to teach science and engineering at this college. He may have taken an important step to one of his goals recently when he built a tornado machine.

The tornado machine is currently placed at the LCC Physics Lab where other LCC students can view it.

“It took me about one month to build,” said Romero a native of Pecos. “This machine shows the forces you would see in a tornado. There is so much forces that go into a tornado. By sharing this with students, I’m hoping this enhances the program here at Luna Community College.”

Romero, who has an electronic engineering degree from ITT Tech in Albuquerque, is taking pre-requisite classes in computer engineering at LCC.

“This tornado machine represents a physical example of a real tornado. It is run by a 2.5 horsepower engine,” said Romero who has worked at Boeing Research Labs. “Someday I want to teach here. There’s something about this place that I like.”

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Luna brings northeastern N.M. together





Robertson baseball team looking good in early part of season

The Robertson High School baseball team is looking to compete for the district title and will make a good run at state. Robertson has 12 lettermen returning who earned quite a bit of varsity experience—eight of those lettermen were starters.

Robertson is returning one senior, five juniors, and six sophomores who earned a win in versus Sandia Prep in the two out of three series. For the 2010 season, the Cardinals look to have approximately 18 players vying for a starting position.

As of March 20, the Cardinals are 6-1 on the season.

Robertson's early season assessment is that we have a lot of speed on the base paths and have deep pitching staff of 10 players.

Currently, Robertson's weakness is the

execution of the fundamentals. Covering throws while on defense and discipline at the plate. I am confident that the players will grasp the importance of playing fundamentally sound baseball.

For the 2010 season, Robertson is returning their three top pitchers from last year. These three pitchers will be the foundation for success at Robertson High School. The pitchers are Nicholas Aragón, Fabian Montoya and Adrian Jaramillo. Mike Martinez, Girard Maestas, Antonio Arguello will also be seeing a lot of mound time this season. Nick Archuleta will be doing most of the catching assignments this season.

Robertson has strong core of hitters. Mike Martinez, Girard Maestas, Nicholas Aragon, Peter Campos, and Fabian Montoya have shown a lot of promise as contact hitters. Adrian Jaramillo, Nick Archuleta and

Antonio Arguello have the ability to provide long ball power.

Adrian Jaramillo is the lone senior to watch for the Cardinals and his leadership will be relied on to guide this team. His potential to succeed will be shown by his effort to get there.

With the supporting cast of Nicholas Aragon and Fabian Montoya, Robertson will have three proven players, providing leadership throughout the 2010 season. Other varsity players are who will be earning playing time are Dalan Abreu, Luke Aragon, Justin Bustos, Dominic Yara, Estevan Montoya and Curtis Lucero.

Shannon Aragon is the first year head coach. Mike Salazar is the assistant varsity and pitching coach. Mark Ortega, Kenneth Sandoval and Ryan Klassen are this year's assistant coaches.

Who is eligible?

High School students who are classified as a Junior or Senior for the 2010-2011 academic school year.

How do I apply?

The **first step** in applying for the SAAI Program is to fill out an application at the LCC Dual-Credit Office located within the Technologies Building in Room TE-144.

The **second step** is to complete the LCC COMPASS Assessment with the LCC ACCESS Center in the Student Services Building if COMPASS has not yet been completed or student has not taken the ACT.

The **third step** is to bring in a copy of your LCC COMPASS Assessment or recent copy of ACT scores and meet with LCC Dual-Credit staff to complete career cluster survey and advisement.

Each student who is accepted in the SAAI Program will receive an Educational Care Package (ECP) that includes:

- Book Fee Waiver
 - \$150 Stipend
 - Each student will be assigned to a College Success Mentor.

Summer extracurricular activities will also be available for students participating in the SAAI Program.

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Luna Continues Classic Film Series with “Butch Cassidy and the Sundance Kid”

Luna Community College continues its classic film series this month with a showing of “Butch Cassidy and the Sundance Kid” at 5:30 p.m. on Thursday, March 25 at the Luna Learning Resource Center. The movie is free to the public. Seating is limited, so reservations are recommended.

“Butch Cassidy and the Sundance Kid” is an essential Western classic starring Paul Newman and Robert Redford. The film won three Academy Awards: Cinematography, Burt Bacharach’s Score and Song “Raindrops Keep Fallin’ on My Head”, and William Goldman’s story and screenplay.

The movie is based on historical events. Butch and Sundance lead the hole-in-the-wall gang, who make their living robbing trains until their success leads to the formation of a special posse formed specifically to catch or kill the bandits. Realizing that the super-posse is not

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going away, Cassidy and Sundance decide to move to Bolivia. They take their lady friend, Etta Place (Katharine Ross) with them. But old habits die hard and they start robbing banks again until the film's climactic finale.

Made in 1969, "Butch Cassidy and the Sundance Kid" was a huge box office success. Raking in over \$30 million, it was the highest grossing western movie ever released at that time. Today (accounting for inflation), it is still one of biggest selling films ever made.

"We chose this movie for our second showing for a couple of reasons," said Rand Kennedy, director of Luna's new mass media communications program. "First, it is among the most entertaining and enjoy-

able Westerns ever made. With a great storyline, outstanding performances and an award-winning soundtrack, "Butch Cassidy and the Sundance Kid" is a classic film that is not to be missed. Second, we wanted to acquaint younger audiences with the work of Robert Redford, who was catapulted to stardom by the film." Redford recently announced the launching of the Milagro at Los Luceros in New Mexico, a training venue for Hispanic and Native American filmmakers. Modeled after the Sundance Institute founded by Redford in Utah, Milagro will offer free directing, acting and screenwriting workshops.
