The program recruits high motivated high school juniors and seniors who can matriculate to Luna Community College. Along with college course enrollment (refer to web-site for course listing), students also participate in academic advancement seminars. The seminars provide academic support for student success.

Who is eligible?

High School students who are classified as a Junior or Senior for the 2010-2011 academic school year.

How do I apply?

The first step in applying for the SAAI Program is to fill out an application at the LCC Dual-Credit Office located within the Technologies Building in Room TE-144.

The second step is to complete the LCC COMPASS Assessment with the LCC ACCESS Center in the Student Services Building if COMPASS has not yet been completed or student has not taken the ACT.

The third step is to bring in a copy of your LCC COMPASS Assessment or recent copy of ACT scores and meet with LCC Dual-Credit staff to complete career cluster survey and advisement.

Each student who is accepted in the SAAI Program will receive an Educational Care Package (ECP) that includes:

- Book Fee Waiver
 - \$150 Stipend
 - Each student will be assigned to a College Success Mentor.

Summer extracurricular activities will also be available for students participating in the SAAI Program.



Every Thursday evening at Luna Community College's Springer campus in room 106, the Luna "Ladies Night Out" quilting class, set to work finishing individual projects. At times peals of laughter can be heard down the halls as the ladies share funny stories and anecdotes with each other. Yet at other times, groans float through the air after a mistake is discovered and the nifty ripper, a quilter's best friend, is taken in hand.

The quilting class, in its third semester, has several ladies who have returned to take the class again, either to finish a project started in an earlier class, or to learn more advanced quilting techniques. The original quilting class, which was offered in the spring semester of 2009, was aimed at teaching beginning piecing techniques while making a sampler quilt.

The fall 2009 semester built on those techniques and offered a few

more advanced techniques to the students, focusing on assembly line piecing while making Log Cabin quilts. The spring 2010 class, comprised of mostly the same students, with a few new additions, has challenged the students with machine and hand appliquéd, kaleidoscope blocks, and quilt-as-you-go. In addition, curved piecing will be introduced in the upcoming weeks, specifically for construction of the Double Wedding Ring.

Laura Brewer, the quilting instructor, is a former quilt shop owner, who has a real passion for quilting, and loves sharing her knowledge with her students. She will be teaching two quilting classes in fall 2010 at the Springer campus: Beginning Quilting on Monday and Tuesday evenings, and Advanced Sewing and Quilting will continue on Thursday evenings. Students must complete the Beginning Quilting class in order to enroll in the advanced class.
