III. STATEMENT OF PHILOSOPHY

MISSION:

The M ission of t he L una C ommunity C ollege D epartment of N ursing P rogram is to prepare st udents t o p ractice as R egistered N urses. T he ed ucational p rogram will take place w ithin an en vironment t hat emphasizes life-long learning a nd i nquiry f or bot h instructors and t he c ommunity of s tudents. Our pr ogram will be r esponsive t o t he changing needs of our students within a changing health care system. It is our mission to prepare registered nurses to provide culturally competent, community-based care for our diverse p opulations in predominately ru ral, h ealth care s ettings in the s tate of N ew Mexico.

The nursing Program is a component of the larger system of Luna Community College. Nursing students are prepared to receive an Associate of Applied Science Degree with a Major in Nursing. This nursing Degree prepares students to take the National Licensing Exam to practice as registered nurses. Nursing students are allowed to exit and take a LPN Licensing Exam after completion of the first year of the Nursing Program.

The N ursing F aculty is profoundly c ommitted to the e ducation of nursing s tudents at Luna Community College. They believe that the nursing program of studies is designed to foster the cultivation of ongoing intellectual curiosity and beginning competency in the field of clinical nursing. The nursing faculty's objective is to educate nursing students in the healthcare field in accordance with the high standards of professional nursing.

The Nursing Faculty believes that the profession of nursing is both a science and an art. Scientific k nowledge and hu man values are c ombined to formulate an applied science and is reflected in the program of studies. The knowledge base for the nursing program is de signed to de velop a he alth c are p rofessional w ho w ill c ontinue t o d evelop competency in c ritical th inking/decision-making, and w ho c an f unction i n be ginning collaborative/interdisciplinary roles through the development of therapeutic, professional communication.

NURSING PROGRAM PHILOSOPHY

The following philosophical statements reflect the faculty's beliefs about the practice and discipline of nursing. This philosophy sets the foundation for the development of the core threads that drive the program's curriculum conceptual framework.

PERSON

Each person is a unique biological, psychological, socio-cultural and spiritual being that is a composite of dynamic, interrelated systems with individual, social, and universal

needs. The person has constantly changing roles that are determined by so cietal and individual values and perceptions, which are influenced as the person evolves developmentally throughout the life-span. The individual has rights of self-determination, dignity, respect and personal beliefs. This commitment to the dignity of the individual is manifested in behavior of the learner-student, teacher-faculty, and institution-administration. It is also reflected in the community at large as students are prepared in the health care system for their place of employment as health care workers, change agents, and client advocates.

SOCIAL-CULTURAL ENVIRONMENT

The social cultural environment is an open, interrelated system, which includes family, community, and society. The individual acquires cultural patterns, values and beliefs through this interaction. It is a dynamic, changing process in response to political, ethical, legal, socioeconomic, spiritual and religious interactions, with cultural diversity as a n important factor. When individuals a re unable to meet their needs within this changing environment, it becomes the responsibility of the family, extended family, and community to assist in meeting those needs. Nurses, who are part of the community, are educated t o assist individuals and their families to meet health-related needs, with cultural sensitivity to the diversity of the community.

HEALTH

Health is a complex and ever-changing state of physical and psychosocial well-being. Well-being is a state whereby the individual perceives a sense of self-contentment, happiness, peace and a high quality of life. The role of the nurse is to assist an individual to choose actions that educate, promote, maintain and restore health in a dynamic and changing health care system. The nurse provides culturally competent care by application of the knowledge of values, beliefs and cultural traditions within a variety of health care settings.

NURSING

Faculty view nursing as an art and a science. Art is the practice of caring, through the provision of nursing care in a respectful, ethically responsible, and culturally sensitive manner. Nursing science is the incorporation of current concepts, principles, standards, and theories from the humanities, physical, behavioral and social sciences in providing safe, competent and effective c are w ithin d iverse h ealth car e set tings. T herapeutic communication i s vi ewed by t he f aculty a s a f undamental c ore c ompetency w hen providing n ursing c are f or c lients di rected toward he alth pr omotion a nd i llness prevention.

TEACHING/LEARNING

Learning is viewed by faculty as a dynamic positive exchange of ideas between student and educators, facilitated by mutual respect that enhances the teaching-learning process. It is desired that the graduate will develop a c ommitment to life-long learning in the current ever changing, dynamic health care system.

The faculty believes that learning occurs best when presented from a simple to complex format that takes place in the cognitive, affective and psychomotor domains. The student is expected to assume an active role in the learning process through the development and demonstration of e ffective ve rbal a nd w ritten c ommunication s kills a nd p ersonal accountability in meeting his or her educational goals.

The nursing faculty strives to create a learning atmosphere of desire for knowledge. Faculty recognizes differences in learning styles, thereby, utilizing different teaching modalities in facilitating the teaching/learning process. In their facilitator and mentor role, faculty assists, support, guide, and evaluate the student learner. The faculty honors the self-learning that results from this interactive process with students.

IV. CONCEPTUAL FRAMEWORK

Keeping in mind the mission and philosophy, the Luna Community College Nursing program's curriculum conceptual framework represents a cross section of a sphere representing our nursing school environment. The outer framework of this sphere consists of five organizing threads, which are Knowledge Base for Nursing Care, Critical Thinking/Decision Making, Professional Behaviors, Cultural Competency and Communication. The threads provide specific direction on how the program is organized. The inner components of the sphere represent a "Living Entity Environment" which enables the learner to achieve the desired terminal program educational outcome of "RN Generalist holistic Nursing Practice." This environment consists of the following components which shape the student learning: student, prerequisite knowledge, desired student behavior, learning experience, setting, program objectives, methods, content, evaluation, and mentoring. Holistic nursing is defined, as the integration of biophysical, social-cultural, psychological, and spiritual needs of individuals and/or families in providing health care. (Please see Appendix: Curriculum Conceptual Framework)

The curriculum is further divided into courses, which specify desired student behaviors; content specified learning experiences leading toward achievement of desired competencies. As mentioned before, the faculty believes that learning occurs best when presented from simple to complex, emphasizing the cognitive, affective, and psychomotor domains. Therefore, multiple learning strategies are utilized in the classroom setting, and diverse settings are utilized for the delivery of clinical instruction.

VI. PROGRAM DESCRIPTION

PRACTICAL NURSING Certificate Minimum of 45 Credit Hours

A. First Level Students

The LCC Nursing Program is a career ladder program. The program offers a First Level certificate program for Practical Nursing and a Second Level program for the Associate Degree Nurse (RN).

Upon completion of the First Level Program, students who want to be licensed as a LPN may ap ply t o the N ew Mex ico S tate B oard o f N ursing t o take the P ractical N urse licensure examination. All program requirements and degree checks must be completed prior to initiating an application to the New Mexico State Board of Nursing.

1. Admission Requirements – Practical Nursing Program Level I

Applicants to the First Year (Level 1) must:

- 1. Be at least 18 years of age.
- 2. Meet L CC ad mission r equirements. A c omplete a pplication must be in file in office of admissions.
- 3. Meet L CC m inimum c ollege a dmission requirements f or m ath, r eading, a nd writing proficiency skills. Those interested in pursuing a Bachelor's degree after completion of the ADN nursing program are encouraged to complete additional courses such as Algebra, Statistics, Technical Writing and Pathophysiology I and II. Applicants are also encouraged to have basic computer literacy skills.
- 4. Complete prerequisites courses (BIO 100, B IO 102, B IO 103, PSYC 101, ENG 111) with GPA 2.7 or higher by the end of the spring semester prior to anticipated entry to the nursing program. NOTE: BIO 100 and BIO 102 must be completed within f ive (5) y ears p rior to a dmission. BIO210 a nd P SCH242 m ust be completed before fall entry.
- 5. Achieve a passing A djusted Individual S core on the A ssessment Technologies Institute (ATI) Test of Essential Academic Skills (TEAS) as determined by LCC Nursing Faculty. The exam must be taken by the end of May prior to anticipated entry to the program. Test dates, fee information, and registration, are available at the nur sing of fice. Applicants m ay take the test d uring the f all and s pring semester. Each test will be reviewed and the highest Adjusted Individual S core will be used t oward calculating a dmission points. The TEAS ex am score will comprise 36% of the total admission points.
- 6. Certified N ursing A ssistant C ertification re quired, with c ompetency of s elected basic skills upon admission. A pplicants who do not have CNA Certification are required to c omplete a state approved c ourse. L una Community College of fers

CNA course (CNA 100) as noted on the following page.

7. Submit a n ursing application by the f irst F riday in May, or as specified f or subsequent fall admission. P ackets will be mailed or will be available in the nursing department by mid March.

It is the student's responsibility to assure that all application documents are on file in the nursing department by the deadline outlined in the application packet. The application deadline is strictly adhered to.

Selection Criteria (Level 1-PN Program)

Applicants a re r ank o rdered ba sed on maximum poi nts e arned o n c umulative G PA for prerequisites co urse r equirements, Adjusted I ndividual Score of t he e ntrance e xamination (TEAS), and points earned for in-district, in-state residency. E ligibility requires a minimum GPA of 2.7 for prerequisite courses and achieve a passing Adjusted Individual Score on the ATI TEAS entrance examination as determined by LCC Nursing Faculty. Bonus points are issued for completion of BIO210 and PSYCH242. Bonus points are issued for related health experience. Applicants meeting all criteria receive preference in selection for 1st level classes if provisional students are admitted. A copy of the selection criteria form can be requested from the nursing department.

Selection of candidates takes place in June. All applicants receive notification by mail.

2. Admission Requirements Associate of Applied Science Program (Level II)

Space is limited and priority is given to returning students who completed level I in the previous year. Criteria for returning second level students include:

- 1. A letter of intent to continue in the program.
- 2. Completion of Level 1 courses with a 75% "C" or higher.
- 3. Current CPR certification
- 4. Current Immunizations (PPD's must be annual)

Admission requirements and curriculum are subject to change. Applicants are encouraged to seek advisement from the Nursing Department for specific program requirements. NOTE: Applicants already Practical Nurses may apply for advanced placement (See LCC school catalog)

Additional Program Requirement:

The Registered Nurse (RN) ATI Predictor Assessment Test is part of program completion. A passing score as determined by LCC's Nursing faculty is required in order to release the student's "Certification of Graduation" to the Board of Nursing for RN-NCLEX licensing. An RN graduate student has until the end of May to schedule their ATI comprehensive predictor. If they fail, a student must complete an approved NCLEX review course at their expense before retesting for their ATI predictor.

VII. ADMISSION CRITERIA

Luna Community College abides by all the rules and regulations, which provide for equal opportunity. T he i nstitution, therefore, i s c ommitted t o e qual opp ortunities i n e nrollment, employment, s ervice, a nd voc ational gr owth exclusive o f di stinction w ith re gard to age, ethnicity, r ace, s ex, r eligious pe rsuasion, or na tional or igin. S ome pr ovisions ne ed t o b e observed w ith r egard to s tudents w ith doc umented s pecial needs a nd/or m edical c ondition by certain he alth oc cupations pr ograms, i ncluding nur sing. It w ill b e d etermined if re asonable accommodations may need to be made in such cases.

Admission t o t he N ursing P rogram a t L CC pr ovides f or equal oppor tunities, rights, privileges, and responsibilities. However, it is important to recognize that as a nursing student, one m ust a lso a bide b y r equirements a nd accept r esponsibilities required by the nur sing profession. The faculty of the department has an established commitment to provide students with direction, instruction, and advisement. However, the student must make a commitment to contribute to his/her own learning process.

Upon c onfirmation of a dmission t o t he N ursing P rogram, t he student m ust pr ovide written documentation that she/he is protected against any communicable diseases, including, but not l imited to , M easles, R ubella, Varicella, Hepatitis B , D iphtheria, T dap, Polio, M umps, Tuberculosis (TB). Tuberculosis must be screened annually through a skin test or chest X-ray. A health history form is provided upon a dmission and m ust be signed by a licensed health c are practitioner prior to registration. C urrent immunization records a re required u pon a dmission. Upon e ntering t he N ursing P rogram, t he s tudent ne eds to unde rstand t hat i t i s a f ull-time commitment. It requires e xtensive tim e a way f rom t he c lassroom for s tudy a nd c linical preparation. It is recommended that employment should be kept to a maximum of no more than 16-hours weekly.

1. All New Applicants

Admission is dependent on s pace availability and program capacity. In the event that more students are applying than can be accommodated, applicants will be rank ordered based on total composite score.

Practicing L PN applicants must submit an application packet, have met all First L evel nursing r equirements, have a valid Practical N ursing license, and must t ake the A TI L PN Predicator e xamination as scheduled by t he department. T he applicant must pass the t est as determined by the LCC's Nursing Department admission to the program.

A student who intends to transfer to LCC from another institution of higher education must subscribe to the same admission requirements as all other students. An official transcript for all courses completed must be evaluated by the department director and director of student records. Only courses with a C or better will be accepted for transfer. If a student has already been a dmitted and received s uccessful grades in a nur sing pr ogram, the nur sing faculty will articulate classes on a case by case basis. Transfer students will be admitted to the program based

on space availability if their transcripts show a comparable curriculum.

C. Admission criteria for students with disabilities

Nursing is a profession in which members must be licensed to provide care for patients. Therefore, it is n ecessary t hat candidates f or s uch p rofessional licensure d emonstrate c ertain levels of academic knowledge and physical competency. A number of nursing activities require varying levels of physical stamina for handling and assisting clients. It is imperative that the safety of the clients and students be maintained.

It is necessary for a student with disabilities to submit a letter from a physician describing the disability in detail and attesting to the student ability to meet the objectives of the program and requirements of the profession, especially since these may be necessary in situations involving life-and-death situations. It is the student responsibility to request accommodation for individual learning needs. The department will make every attempt to make a reasonable accommodation to the student with documented disabilities processed through the ACCESS Center.

VIII. PROGRESSION

Progression is defined as a dvancing t hrough t he p rogram i n t he r equired sequence of curriculum, with the acquisition of knowledge, skills, and competency as outlined in your program of studies. (Refer to section XII, academic policies).

A Interruption of progression/Repeating (Definition)

Occasionally, a situation may arise in which a student may have to leave the program prior to completion of all requirements.

If the student fails to progress through the first semester of nur sing school they must reapply to the nur sing program. If the student successfully completes the first or subsequent semesters a signed **EXIT INTERVIEW** form is required if the student has to leave the program prior to completion or does not successfully complete a course. If the student does not complete the required document, the student will be ineligible for re-admission for the next academic year. Re-admission must be done within one year.

B. Repeating/Readmission (Policy)

- 1. The student cannot fail more than two nursing courses to be able to return to the nursing program.
- 2. In the event of unforeseen circumstances, provisions will be made for the student who had to leave the program for a doc umented e mergency, who was in good a cademic standing at the time he/she left the program.
- 3. A student who r eturns a fter one or two failures is r equired t o a udit or de monstrate proficiency in content in all nursing theory courses previously successfully completed in one of the following ways:
 - A. Theory mandatory c lass a ttendance w ith c ompletion of a ll hom ework, t ests, assignments a nd final e xamination with a 75% e quivalency. The s tudent w ill receive a g rade of "AU" upon c ompletion of the course audit. A student has an option of e lecting to c hange a udit s tatus to c redit with a limited time in w hich he/she can change to "credit". The student opting for credit will receive a l etter grade earned upon completion of the course. Refer to the LCC Catalog for further information regarding the policy for changing from the "Audit" to "Credit".
 - **B.** Take and pass a comprehensive exam chosen by nursing faculty the week before classes begin for each class previously passed. If the comprehensive exam is not passed with a 75% or above the student will be required to audit the class. If an ATI content area exam is used, the student must achieve a level 2 or 3 to pass.
 - **C.** Lab/Clinical-The s tudent w ho is a uditing a c ourse that h as an a ccompanying clinical will have an abbreviated clinical schedule of two clinical days per course. The s tudent w ill be s cheduled to demonstrate c ompetency w ith l ab s kills pertaining to t he c ourse. If the audit s tudent p refers to ta ke th e c linical component of the course, options will be discussed if approved by the Registrar.
 - **D.** If the above conditions are not met the student will no longer have an audit option and must take all remaining courses for a grade.
- 4. Withdrawal with a failing grade is considered a course failure unless personal extenuating

circumstances exist.

- 5. A student can be readmitted for academic failure two times.
- 6. After failing a third class, students will be terminated from the program. R eapplication will be considered after three y ears if student is in good s tanding as evidenced by no more than one clinical write up during the course of study. If a student is returning after three years, they will be allowed to repeat one time.
- 7. All students failing two classes must complete the following :
 - **A.** Students will c omplete a s elf-inventory a ssessment r egarding w hat p ersonal changes will be made to achieve success prior to returning to the program.

IX. TERMINATION

Termination from the program may be necessary if the student fails to meet the standards of the program either in the academic or clinical setting. The following are examples of cause that will lead to termination. The list is not exclusive. A student:

- 1. Failure to pass any core-nursing course after the third attempt.
- 2. Receives a notification Failure Warning the third time within the academic year.
- 3. Is unwilling to undergo evaluation and treatment for substance abuse, where evidence is suspected.
- 4. Exhibits unsafe practices in the clinical setting, as outlined in the clinical expectations section of this handbook.

The following is an example of cause that might lead to termination:

5. Lacks in tegrity in the academic a nd/or c linical s etting (i.e., Breach o f C onfidentiality, cheating on an exam, client abuse, falsifying student or client records, etc.)

X. GRADUATION REQUIREMENTS

All program requirements must be completed in order to be eligible for graduation. A grade of 75% or better is required for all nursing courses. Students are encouraged to meet with their ad visor each semester to a ssure that all requirements are being met. R efer to the LCC Catalog for additional graduation requirements.

A C omprehensive P redictor E xamination *pass* is required p rior to b eing eligible for release of p aperwork from the Registrar's to the New M exico S tate Board of N ursing and to receive completion of s tudies from the P ractical N ursing (PN) and A ssociate D egree (ADN) program. T he examination date and required p assing s core are determined by t he department and will be announced verbally and in writing.

The student who does not meet the minimum passing score will be required to meet with his/her a dvisor to in itiate a s elf-study pl an a nd s chedule a r e-test d ate. U pon m eeting t he required score, the Registrar's Office will receive written notification. The Registrar will then confirm the C ertificate or D egree and will is sue the required d ocumentation to the B oard of Nursing for student eligibility to take the NCLEX licensure examination.

XI. GENERAL POLICIES

A. Health, Immunization, and Liability Requirements

1. Health Insurance

Luna Community College does not provide Health Insurance for students. It is highly recommended that the student obtain a Health Insurance Policy while enrolled in a H ealth O ccupations Program at L CC, due to the potentially h azardous na ture of health care. LCC does not assume any liability for health expenses incurred due to participation in the program.

2. Health History/Physical Form & Immunization

A. Students are responsible for having the Health History/Physical Form completed and returned to the departmental office by the designated date. When change of health status oc curs, an updated medical health form must be submitted to the nursing of fice. S tudents must then not ify the instructor i mmediately of a ny illness, change in health status, pregnancy, or any other condition that may affect students health or direct client care during a clinical rotation.

Completion of the following immunizations is required:

- 1. Positive MMR (measles/mumps/rubella)
 - Two (2) doses required and provider signature; or
 - If born prior to 1957, proof of 1 MMR or
 - Blood titer for each
 - 2. Tdap as an adult and a Tetanus within the past 10 years
 - 3. Polio
 - Childhood series of four completed; or
 - Adult Booster
 - 4. Annual PPD or form of positive PPD history
 - 5. Hepatitis B Vaccine
 - Proof of Completion of three dose series; or
 - Post completion titer
 - 6. Varicella
 - MD/Provider documentation of disease; or
 - Varicella Vaccine two (2) doses are required.

3. Liability Insurance

Upon a dmission t o t he pr ogram, t he s tudent w ill be r equired to purchase Professional Liability Insurance on a yearly basis. This insurance is obtained through the school and protects students in cases of malpractice lawsuits. L iability insurance in the amount of \$1,000,000--\$3,000,000 is necessary for participation in c linical experience. This insurance is purchased annually prior to registration for the Fall semester. (Refer to the "program estimated costs form" available in the nursing office for fees).

B. Basic life support certification

The s tudent i s r equired t o be certified i n c ardiopulmonary r esuscitation, (American Heart Association Basic Life Support Provider or equivalent). If the student has su ccessfully completed a Basic L ife S upport co urse and h as cu rrent ce rtification, submit a copy of the certification card to the nursing office by the designated date on the letter of acceptance. The Department of Nursing will provide a certification course for students who are not certified.

C. Exposure prevention/control

1. Accidental exposure

Accidental exposure is defined as accidentally being exposed to blood/body fluids through ne edle s tick, or s kin lesions/non-intact m ucosal m embrane o f a c lient. Accidental exposure of a faculty member or student while in a clinical agency is treated similarly to any type of accident occurring within the agency.

Transmission-based precautions are the recommendation of the National Centers for Disease Control (CDC). The terms Universal Precautions and Standard Precautions are used interchangeably. Universal/Standard Precautions are a safeguard for the client as well as for the student. As recommended by the CDC, Universal/Standard Precautions are to be used with Contact, Airborne or Droplet Categories. The student must abide by these precautions in the simulation lab and clinical agencies.

2. <u>Management of an exposure incident</u>

In the event that a student has an accidental exposure, the following steps are initiated:

- 1. The student **immediately** reports the incident to the clinical instructor.
- 2. The incident is reported to the clinical facility nursing supervisor or other appropriate pe rsonnel. T he c linical a gency w ill us ually r equire the completion of an incident report and may ask permission from the client to test for HIV antibody or Hepatitis. The student or faculty exposed will be encouraged to have testing done. The decision to have the testing done is the choice of the individual exposed.
- 3. The individual exposed must review and abide with the exposure policy at the institution or agency where such exposure took place.
- 4. The individual exposed is responsible for any medical bills incurred as a result of exposure, i.e., lab work, vaccines, physician charges, etc.
- 5. The c linical a gency may r equire d emographic da ta f rom t he e xposed individual for any follow-up that may be necessary.
- 7. The clinical instructor will notify the director of the Nursing Program when a student has been accidentally exposed.

3. Confidentiality

Within t he C ode o f Federal R egulations are st atements t o p rotect medical information and the privacy of the individual when there is no overriding need for the public to know.

To mandate that a person infected with a blood-borne or any other communicable disease be required or r equested to not ify i nstitutional or a gency a uthorities, where exposure oc curred, is difficult to enforce. H owever, individuals involved with he alth, care-giving services and who know they are infected with a communicable disease are ethically and legally obligated to conduct themselves responsibly in accordance with the following protective behaviors:

- 1. Seek medical advice;
- 2. Follow the Institute's guidelines when involved in direct client care, be knowledgeable about, and practice, measures to prevent transmission of the disease.

D. Guidelines for a student who has a documented blood-borne, pathogen derived illness, including but not limited to HIV-AIDS, Hepatitis or other communicable disease.

The student with any documented blood-borne, pathogen derived infection, who is asymptomatic, need not be restricted from clinical experience unless she/he has some other illness for which any health care worker would be restricted. The student should be advised that certain infections may cause immuno-suppression and therefore increase the student's or client susceptibility to infections acquired from client-student interaction.

1. Policy & procedure for students with Hepatitis B, HIV, or other communicable disease.

A student with documented Hepatitis B, HIV, or another communicable disease will be assigned to care for clients only when he/she has received a physician statement, which clears the student for a return to clinical experience. The following precautions must be initiated by the student during clinical assignments:

- 1. The s tudent must practice good hand w ashing and w ear gloves when providing direct client care. This is critical when in direct contact with blood, mucosal surfaces, or other fluids.
- 2. In the event that the student develops exudative lesions or other weeping lesions, client care will be prohibited, until a statement is received by the physician confirming return to clinical duties.
- 3. The student with any of the above mentioned conditions will not, under any circumstances, be assigned to a renal dialysis unit or to any client who is immuno-compromised.
- 4. Due to the chronicity or potential for exacerbation of such conditions, the student must be receiving ongoing medical observation and treatment.
- 5. The student will not be allowed to work in any clinical area when there is potential for infectious transmission to clients or coworkers.

E. 1. <u>Fire emergency escape plan (Complying with the LCC Campus Security Act,</u> 1990)

- 1. Refer to LCC policy regarding fire emergency policy/procedures.
- 2. Exit building at a nearest exit; on the student way out, pull fire alarm.
- 3. Check exiting door for heat, go to if safe, *First Choice*: ICP Parking lot, *Second Choice*: Tennis court; notify a LCC staff member, they will call the fire department.
- 4. A staff member will notify security and/or administration.

- 8. Code Blue
 - 1. Follow notifications of instructor:
 - 2. Turn off light
 - 3. Lock door
 - 4. Go to area of safety

F. Use of supplies/equipment

Many m aterials that the s tudent will u se in the N ursing P rogram are v ery expensive and difficult to replace. The student will be required to demonstrate a common sense, and personal ownership approach in regard to the use and care of supplies and equipment. Clinical lab areas must be left clean and orderly. In case of abuse / neglect of any supplies or e quipment, the s tudent will be he ld f inancially r esponsible f or the replacement of those damaged items.

G. Children or others in the classroom/ clinical setting

Under no circumstances is the student allowed to bring children or visitors to class or clinical areas. Prior arrangements must be made for adequate childcare. L CC offers day care services for students' children. Information about the services is available at the Student Services Department.

H. Transportation

Most nur sing c ourses i nclude c linical learning e xperiences. T he student is responsible for her/his own transportation to and from clinical sites. D epending on the program, clinical sites may be local, regional, or statewide.

I. Telephone calls, Smoking, Food

Only emergency calls are permitted while a student is in the classroom or clinical setting. Cell phones must be turned off while in the classroom or clinical setting. No cell phone calls or cell phone texting are allowed in the classroom.

Smoking is prohibited in all buildings on campus or in clinical sites. Smoking is discouraged prior to clinical or during clinical breaks as ci garette o dor may remain on clothing and may be offensive to the client.

Eating or drinking beverages is prohibited in the client room, hallway, or nurse's station during clinical rotations.

J. Program Fees & Associated costs

The student will incur a number of fees and associated costs while enrolled in the Nursing Program. Please see Appendix.

XII. ACADEMIC POLICIES

A. Classroom Guidelines

The following guidelines have been established to assist the student in obtaining the greatest benefit of learning experiences provided through the curriculum. It is the intent of the learning environment to prepare the student to adopt to the type of conduct that is expected in the nursing workplace.

1. Classroom attendance/tardiness

Punctual and consistent classroom attendance is expected to be **mandatory** for all class se ssions, as material p resented i n cl ass is g enerally sequential. T herefore, an y absence from a class may impact on student learning.

- (1) The student is responsible for acquiring all information, handouts, and announcements for classes not attended.
- (2) For students absent from their scheduled exam, five (5) points will be deducted from their exam score and alternate exams will be given. If a student i s tardy f or a ny c omponent of t he pr ogram (including computerized t esting), occurrence report f orms will be generated. (Please n ote that ex tenuating c ircumstances will always be r eviewed by faculty on a case by case basis.)

2. Grading/evaluation

A grade of 75% or higher is required for all nursing courses. A "S" (Satisfactory) grade is required to pass clinical for courses containing a clinical component. If the student does not receive a passing grade in either theory or the clinical component, he/she must re-take both c omponents. Faculty will c ollect d ata on a c linical e valuation tool on a re gular basis.

The grading system listed below is designated for all students attending the LCC nursing program (except for NRSG100 Math/dosage Calculations-please see below).

The department director or faculty will generate a Failure Warning Form when the student is performing below minimum clinical/classroom requirements, inappropriate student c onduct as de fined in the LCC C atalog (pg. 5) or if the student is practicing unsafely in the clinical setting. P ertinent d ata is recorded in the student's file. The Failure Warning F orm may be written a fter a single in cidence or following p ersistent behavior that warrants the report.

The student is encouraged to seek assistance from faculty and peer tutors and can request an academic status report throughout the semester. If the student is performing below 75% in nursing courses, the student will be referred to student services through the Early Alert System established at LCC. The student will receive a letter recommending a meeting with the instructor. The student should **immediately** arrange a meeting with the instructor.

3. Dosage Calculation policies:

Math skills for calculation of medication dosage are a major component in the safe preparation and administration of medication. A high level of expertise is required of the individual nurse responsible for giving the medication. The Nursing Program will require 100% on D rug Calculation exams at the beginning of semester 2, 3 and 4 with three (3) attempts allowed. The drug calculation test must be successfully passed within two weeks of first attempt.

Drug calculation skills will be taught in the Nrsg 100 course. Though faculty may assist with tutoring in subsequent courses, it is the student primary responsibility to maintain dr ug c alculation s kills. A n i ntegrated e xamination will be gi ven a t t he beginning of each course listed above. The student must pass Drug Calculation exam in order to continue in their course of study.

XII. CLINICAL POLICIES

A. Lab/Clinical Guidelines

The f ollowing gui delines have be ene stablished to a ssist the student with obtaining the greatest benefit of learning experiences provided through the curriculum and prepare s tudents to a dopt the type of c onduct that is expected in the n ursing workplace.

1. Clinical/Lab Attendance:

Attendance at all lab/clinical assignments is mandatory. Clinicals are graded on "S "(Satisfactory) o r "U" (Unsatisfactory) b asis. F ailure to c omplete the required objectives will constitute an unsatisfactory grade f or the clinical c omponent. The student must pass both the theory and clinical sections to receive a passing grade for the course.

The student is required to report to clinical 15 m inutes prior to the scheduled clinical start time. In the event of an illness or death in the immediate family, the student is responsible for contacting the clinical instructor no later than one hour prior to the time he/she is scheduled to be at the clinical ag ency. In the event of an accident or o ther justifiable e mergency, students are responsible for contacting the clinical instructor as soon as possible.

The student is encouraged to allow extra travel time for unforeseen circumstances. If the student arrives after the designated time, the student may be sent home and may receive an absence for the day, and a written occurrence report. Other behaviors which may result in being sent home include: lack of preparation for the day, failure to meet the dress code regulations, and/or disruptive conduct. The clinical day must be made up and will be arranged by the instructor. At the instructor's discretion an additional assignment may be given instead of sending the student home.

A clinical may be canceled by the instructor due to an emergency or inclement weather. The student will be notified of the cancellation and rescheduling by the clinical instructor. B ecause t he ser vice area is w idespread d ue t o t he rural n ature of t he communities served by the college, conditions may vary within those areas. The student is e neouraged t o m ake i ndividual judgment de cisions r egarding travel. U se extreme caution and do not travel if conditions are serious. If the instructor determines that the student cannot travel to clinical, follow the steps outlined below:

- The instructor may choose to arrange for the student to go in later, if appropriate, or will arrange to reschedule a make-up clinical for inclement weather.
- Stay informed c oncerning weather conditions. L ocal r adio and t elevision s tations

announce weather forecasts, road conditions, and school closures. When a snow day is declared by Luna, the policy is that classes and all clinicals are cancelled. If a two hour delay is announced the policy is that clinicals will start with a 2-hour delay.

2. Clinical expectations:

- 1. The student is required to obtain a schedule of his/her clinical assignment the day prior t o clinical ex perience. S pecial c ircumstances will b e d etailed b y co urse instructor for out-of-town clinical. Adequate preparation is e ssential, including but n ot lim ited to : re view of c lient d ata f or formulation of n ursing c are p lan (diagnosis, medications, procedures, family dynamics, etc). Specific requirements will be outlined in each course syllabus.
 - 2. The student must be prepared to administer medications at the same standard as licensed personnel
 - 3. The student must maintain strict confidentiality in handling client information. Only initials are to be documented on the student notebook, journal and care plan.
 - 4. T he s tudent m ust de monstrate a **professional demeanor**: This i ncludes no chewing gum, no l oud c onversation at the nur se's de sk, respect for the s tudent fellow classmates, staff, and **always be willing to help** where needed.
- 5 The student is required to dress in student nurse uniform with proper identification when obtaining clinical schedule and reviewing client charts prior to clinical date. Each s tudent i s i ndividually r esponsible f or o btaining his/her assigned patient information prior to clinical. A ny presence in a hospital setting requires a professional appearance and valid student identification.
- 6. The student must not leave a clinical setting without first directly notifying the instructor or clinical preceptor.
- 7. The student is required to wear an approved nursing uniform during each clinical rotation. L CC s tudent i dentification i s r equired a nd o ther e ssential c linical supplies must be on hand.
- 8. If the s tudent is unprepared, l acks p rofessional ap pearance, o r d emonstrates unsafe p ractice m aybe d ismissed f rom t he clinical and m arked ab sent f or t hat clinical. This may also constitute a clinical failure. A Failure Warning Form will be generated and filed in the student record. A Failure W arning F orm will be completed with corrective actions required for the student to take.
- 9. If the s tudent is ill, s he/he m ust n otify the in structor to determine whether a potential risk to the client exists. A student who becomes ill during the clinical day may be sent home at the discretion of the instructor.

- 10. The student will not be a llowed to take phone or verbal physician orders for medications, treatments and procedures. All physician orders must be taken and noted by a primary nurse in the clinical setting before the student can carry out those or ders. T hose or ders will then be c arried out und er the di rection and supervision of the clinical instructor.
- 11. As a First year student, the student will not be allowed to act as a legal witness to a consent form or permit. As a second year student, the student may serve as a secondary witness with permission and supervision of the clinical instructor, or per facility policy.
- 12. Clinical courses, which require care plans or other written assignments, must have a plan in itiated *prior* to the clinical date, and the plan is to be completed and submitted as directed by the instructor.
- 13. Certain clinical areas pose a r isk o f ex posure t o communicable diseases. Students who are in their first trimester of pregnancy are required to obtain a physician's written statement of release before being assigned to that clinical area.

3. Clinical Performance

A clinical is defined as a faculty-assigned activity taking place in and during clinical/laboratory settings and times. These may include campus laboratory, observational sites, hospital settings, community agencies, and clients' homes. The student is prohibited from practicing or carrying out activities or specialized skills which the student has not practiced with a passing score in the practice lab, and those activities which are beyond the scope of practice for a nurse in the respective level for which the student is presently training. The student must abide by this policy with utmost responsibility. The student is required to complete all scheduled clinical hours. The student must follow the nursing process when documenting and writing care plans, and pursue universal precautions with all clients. Students are responsible for being familiar with and administering all care required by their client during clinical. **PN students can only do client care at their level of skills in program.**

4. Clinical appearance

Proper c linical a ttire, personal h ygiene, an d cleanliness are required. T he instructor has the right to place a student on "off duty" status when these conditions are deficient a nd r ecord a n a bsence f or t hat c linical da y. A dditional regulations m ay be required i n some cl inical se ttings such as su rgery, o bstetrics, pediatrics, a nd m ental health.

(a) **Uniform:** The LCC Student Nurse's uniform is a white top, and teal green pants. Uniforms c an be pur chased t hrough t he L CC boo kstore store. L CC student identification is required to be embroidered on s crub tops for use in clinical facilities. Exceptions to clinical

dress are made as dictated by clinical site. Only white shoes will be permitted (no sandals or open shoes). Shoe-strings must be white and clean. The official LCC ID badge must also be worn.

- (b.) **Fingernails:** Natural nails must be clean, trimmed, smooth and neat and not interfere with safe client care. Clear nail polish is permitted. Artificial nails are prohibited due to danger of transmitted infection.
- (c.) **Jewelry: NO** jewelry is permitted other than a medical alert bracelet during clinical rotations, except for a nursing watch. Accessory jewelry for body piercing such as nose, tongue, lip and eyebrow rings is not permitted. You will be asked remove all types of jewelry prior to starting your clinical experience
- (d.) **Hair:** Hair must be shoulder length or tied back. Plain accessories may be used to clip hair back.
- (e.) **Make-Up:** Facial makeup must be kept simple. Use of perfumes/cologne is discouraged, as they may be offensive to clients.
- (f) **Tattoo** Any tattoos that are visible should be covered during clinical experience.
- (g.) **Equipment:** A stethoscope, bandage scissors, black pen (not erasable), watch with second hand, and pen light are required.

5. Clinical grading/ evaluation

Clinical performance is graded on a "S" (Satisfactory) or "U" (Unsatisfactory) basis. The student must pass both the theory and clinical component to receive a passing grade for the course.

Clinical evaluation gui delines a re u sed t o d ocument c linical performance. T he student is expected to give c are according to these gui delines and the ANA s tandards. Specific clinical objectives will be provided for each clinical course.

XIV. STUDENT CONDUCT

A. Disruptive Conduct:

Disruptive conduct will not be tolerated in the classroom, lab, or clinical area. If the student is involved in such behaviors, the student will be asked to leave and must then submit a written request to be allowed to return for the next session. R effer to the LCC catalog a nd L CC s tudent ha ndbook f or pol icy c oncerning di sruptive c onduct. The department will f ollow t he policy a nd procedure a sout lined in the LCC Student Handbook.

B. Policy for student suspected of impairment:

The Nursing Program has adopted the following policy statement and procedures for dealing with situations of actual or suspected student chemical impairment.

Policy statement:

Although LCC enforces policy concerning substance use on campus, the Nursing Department r equires a dditional pol icies, due t o the s erious na ture of the c ourses a nd clinical expectations. To fulfill the provision of safe, effective, and supportive care, the student must be free of any substance (regardless of whether the use of the substance is legal o r i llegal), w hich may i mpair the s tudent's a bility to make s ound j udgment decisions, whether in the clinical, lab, or classroom. Impairment, or possible impairment, of clinical judgment places the safety of clients, students, faculty, and the general public at unacceptable risk.

The nursing faculty defines a chemically impaired student as a person who, while in t he a cademic or c linical s etting, i s unde r t he i nfluence of, or ha s a bused, e ither separately or i n c ombination: a lcohol, ove r the c ounter medication, i llegal dr ugs, prescribed medications, inhalants, or synthetic designer drugs. A buse of the substances includes episodic misuse or chronic use that has produced psychological and/or physical symptomology.

Procedures:

1. Legally prescribed medication.

If the student is on a doctor's prescribed substance, which may impair the student judgment, the student must submit a letter from the physician verifying that the substance has be en pr escribed. T he medical r eason f or t he pr escription doe s not ha ve t o be disclosed. The student will not be allowed to participate in any activity requiring clinical judgment while using legal substances under the direction of a physician.

Reasonable accommodations t o c ope with t his s ituation will be m ade by t he department. However, the student is responsible for completing all course requirements.

2. <u>Substance Abuse:</u>

In the event that an instructor suspects that a student is under the influence of a substance that impairs or could impair clinical judgment, the instructor will implement the following steps:

3. <u>Procedures for faculty intervention:</u>

- (a.) Remove the student immediately from the lab, clinical, or classroom to a private area.
- (b.) Inform the student of the observed behavior or signs and allow the student to provide a brief explanation for the observed behavior. The student is not required to provide an explanation; however, if the student indicates that he/she is on a substance under the supervision of a physician, the procedure outlined above must be initiated immediately.
- (c.) Observed behavior may include but not be limited to the following signs: disheveled appearance, blood shot eyes, inappropriate language/behavior. A Suspicious Behavior Form (*see attached form*) must be signed. If the student refuses or is unable to sign the form, the instructor will document the reason given by the student f or not c ompleting the form. T he instructor will sign the form.
- (d.) Document any witnesses to the behavior and actions initiated and request a witness signature on the form.
- (e.) As soon as possible, contact the Director of the Nursing Program of the situation and actions taken.
- (f.) Due to the serious nature of the program, the student will be placed on academic and clinical probation until the situation is resolved.
- (g.) The student must have a drug screen performed as soon as documentation on the behavior status has be en completed. A forensic type blood and urine drug screening with proper laboratory identification and procedure by a lic ensed m edical or scientific laboratory to complete this type of testing must be conducted. The student must arrange to have someone transport him/ her to the laboratory facility and home. Such arrangements may be done through LCC security.

The instructor will provide the student with the required referral form for the specific blood or urine drug screening with proper chain of custody. If the results are positive, the student may request a retest of the same sample at another properly licensed laboratory. Results of the test and contents of the suspicious behavior form will remain confidential unless required by law. If the results of the test are positive, the fee for testing will be the responsibility of the student. The program will pay for the results if the test is negative.

- (h.) When chemical influence has been confirmed, the student must enter into a "A Student Wellness C ontract" f or t he purpose of pr ofessional evaluation of chemical dependency status and determination of a treatment plan. The terms of the contract and academic consequences resulting from chemical d ependency are d iscussed. T he st udent will t hen s ign the contract, a greeing to the terms and a cknowledging understanding of the contract and academic consequences resulting thereof.
- (i.) The A cademic c onsequences r esulting f rom t he i mplementation of t he Student Wellness Contract is t hat p articipation in c linical n ursing courses will not be permitted until the terms of the contract are fulfilled. A se mester g rade o f a n "I" (Incomplete), "W" (Withdrawal) o r "F" (Failing) may be assigned, depending on f actors s uch a mount of c ourse work c ompleted to d ate, a bility o f th e s tudent to c omplete th e requirements, and deadline for withdrawing from a course.
- (j.) Upon written recommendation by the chemical evaluator, indicating that the student does not require treatment or is actively participating in an out client chemical dependency program, the student may return to all courses in pr ogress a nd c omplete c ourse requirements. I n the event that t he student is u nable t o complete t he requirements w hile t he co urse i s in progress as a result of in-client treatment, the student must petition for reentry to the Nursing Program.
- (k.) If s ubsequent c hemical i mpairment oc curs f ollowing t hese pr ocedures, nursing f aculty m ay r ecommend a dministrative d ismissal, o r f inal termination, from the Luna Community College Nursing Program.

9. Prior criminal record:

Fingerprinting/Criminal ba ckground c hecks t hrough t he Department of H ealth (DOH) are now necessary throughout the state for clinical placement. The cost is the s tudent r esponsibility. T he B oard of N ursing i s r equiring t hose s tudents seeking in itial licensure in N ew M exico to be fingerprinted prior to licensure. Certain felonies may lead to ineligibility toward nursing licensure by the State of New M exico B oard of N ursing. S tudents will be ke pt i nformed r egarding criminal b ackground c heck r equirements as p olicies a t clinical ag encies a re instituted.

D. Breach of confidentiality:

Any information relative to all clients must be held strictly confidential, unless instituted r equired by l aw to divulge a ny information. F ailure to do s o will r esult in termination from the program.

E. Honesty:

The student is required to maintain honesty and integrity in all course work and the clinical aspects of the program. H onesty is crucial in the nursing profession. Any observed cheating will be documented, and the student will receive a zero on the material being tested. In addition, this behavior may be grounds for dismissal from the program.

F. Plagiarism:

The pr ogram r equires t hat t he s tudent a dhere t o t he L CC pol icy r egarding plagiarism. R efer to the L CC Catalog. I f the student submits w ork, which has been plagiarized, the student will receive a zero on the work submitted in addition to possible termination from the program.

XV. APPEALS

LCC has established procedures for i nitiating a g rievance p rocess, w hich i s available in the LCC student handbook (pgs. 61-62). A complaint or grievance must be handled in the following sequence:

- The nurse provides services with respect for human dignity and the uniqueness of the client unrestricted by consideration of social or economic status, personal attributes, or the nature of health problems.
- The nurse safeguards the client's right to privacy by judiciously protecting information of a confidential nature.
- The nurse acts of safeguard the client and the public when health care and safety are affected by the incompetent, unethical, or illegal practice of any person.
- The nurse assumes responsibility and accountability for individual nursing judgments and actions. The nurse maintains competence in nursing.
- The nurse exercises informed judgment and uses individual competence and qualifications as criteria in seeking consultation, accepting responsibilities, and delegating nursing activities to others.
- The nurse participates in activities that contribute to the ongoing development of the profession's body of knowledge.
- The nurse participates in the profession's efforts to implement and improve standards of nursing.
- The nurse participates in the profession's efforts to establish and maintain conditions of employment conductive to high quality nursing care.
- The nurse participates in the profession's efforts to establish and maintain conditions of employment conducive to high-quality nursing care.
- The nurse participates in the profession's efforts to protect the public from misinformation and misrepresentation and to maintain the integrity of nursing.
- The nurse collaborates with members of the health professions and other citizens in promoting community and national efforts to meet the health needs of the public.

If a student fails to progress through the first semester of nursing school they must reapply to the nursing program. If a student successfully completes the first or subsequent semesters a signed **EXIT INTERVIEW** form is required from any student who leaves the program prior to completion of the program or does not successfully complete a course. A student who does not complete the required document will be ineligible for re-admission for the next academic year. Re-admission must be done within *one year*.

A student can be readmitted for academic failure two (2) times. Any student failing one or two classes is required to audit or demonstrate proficiency in content in all nursing theory classes previously successfully completed in one of the following ways: 1) Auditing the theory class (see handbook) with an abbreviated clinical schedule consisting of two clinical days or 2) Take and pass a comprehensive exam chosen by nursing faculty the week before classes begin.

After failing a third class, students will be terminated from the program. Re-application will be considered after three years if student is in good-standing as evidenced by no more than one clinical write up during the course of study. All students failing two classes must complete the following:

A. Students will complete a self-inventory assessment regarding what personal changes will be made to achieve success prior to returning to the program.

American Nurses Association Code of Ethics for Nurses

- 1. The nurse, in all professional relationships, practices with compassion and respect for the inherent dignity, worth and uniqueness of every individual, unrestricted by considerations of social or economic status, personal attributes, or the nature of health problems.
- 2. The nurse's primary commitment is to the patient, whether an individual, family, group, or community.
- 3. The nurse promotes, advocates for, and strives to protect the health, safety, and rights of the patient.
- 4. The nurse is responsible and accountable for individual nursing practice and determines the appropriate delegation of tasks consistent with the nurse's obligation to provide optimum patient care.
- 5. The nurse owes the same duties to self as to others, including the responsibility to preserve integrity and safety, to maintain competence, and to continue personal and professional growth.
- 6. The nurse participates in establishing, maintaining, and improving healthcare environments and conditions of employment conducive to the provision of quality health care and consistent with the values of the profession through individual and collective action.
- 7. The nurse participates in the advancement of the profession through contributions to practice, education, administration, and knowledge development.
- 8. The nurse collaborates with other health professionals and the public in promoting community, national, and international efforts to meet health needs.
- The profession of nursing, as represented by associations and their members, is responsible for articulating nursing values, for maintaining the integrity of the profession and its practice, and for shaping social policy.


