LCC's Kathy Maes No. 1 in state *Jaramillo and Trambley take second in nail competition*

The streak continues. For the last seven years Luna Community College students have either brought home a championship or placed at the state SkillsUSA competition.

And LCC cosmetology students Kathy Maes, Ashley Jaramillo and Julie Trambley continued the tradition.

The trio took first and second place respectively in Saturday's state competition in Albuquerque.

Maes, a native of Las Vegas, took first place in the hair competition. Maes, last year, took third in this category.

Jaramillo, a native of Las Vegas and Trambley a native of Mora, took second in the nail technology category.

"First of all, I want to thank my fellow students here at Luna Community College," said Maes. "They are absolutely great to be with everyday. Secondly, I want to thank my instructors; they have done an extremely good job teaching us from the first day we got here. It is an honor to continue the great tradition here at Luna Community College."

SkillsUSA is a national nonprofit organization serving teachers along with high school and college students who are preparing for careers in trade, technical and skilled service occupations including health occupations.

"This makes my day," said LCC President Dr. Pete Campos. "I'm extremely proud of our students; this speaks well for the program and for the future careers of our students."

All three will participate at the SkillsUSA Nationals in Kansas City, Mo. in June.

"From what I observed, all of our students were confident in their skills and articulated themselves very professionally," said LCC SkillsUSA Advisor Anthony Baca who helped judge the collision repair category. "Luna Community College has a very good reputation in this competition and this year's group didn't disappoint. This shows the rest

of the state that Luna Community College students can compete against the best in the state."

Baca says that all three national qualifiers will be fund-raising during the next couple of months.

A year ago, Laura Hurtado and Trambley took first-place in the nail technology category. They went on to finish 11th in the national competition. Johnny Garcia, also a LCC student, took first-place in the state competition and finished 14th in the automotive refinishing category at the national level. In 2007, Rebecca Padilla, an LCC student, took a silver medal in the hair competition.

Students placed on financial assistance probation will receive financial assistance for their next period of enrollment on a "probationary status." However, students placed on financial aid suspension will be denied further financial assistance until an appeal is reviewed and approved by the Financial Assistance Appeal Committee.


Dr. Vidal Martinez, vice president for academics, believes Montoya is setting the example for advance training in fire science.
