Ana Pacheco to speak at LCC graduation

She is the founder and publisher of La Herencia Magazine

A native of Santa Fe, Ana Pacheco, the founder and publisher of *La Herencia Magazine*, will be the guest speaker Luna Community College's graduation which will be held at 10 a.m. on Saturday, May 9.

She's the daughter of Jesús Pacheco and Natalie Ortiz. Both families have been in Santa Fe since at least the 17th century. Natalie Ortiz was a direct descendant of *don* Diego de Vargas. Don Gaspar Street in Santa Fe is named after Natalie's great-great grandfather, Don Gaspar Ortiz. The Ortiz Room at the Santa Fe Hilton Hotel and Ortiz Street located in the plaza area are named in honor of Eleanor and Beatrice Ortiz, Natalie's aunt and grandmother, respectively. The busy thoroughfare Pacheco Street is named after Ana's great-great grandfather Jose de la Cruz Pacheco.

Ana Pacheco began her publishing career in 1979 in New York. She has held various positions with entertainment, Hispanic and financial service publications. Ms. Pacheco returned to Santa Fe in 1991 after living in New York for sixteen years. Pacheco served

on the Board of Directors for the National Hispanic Cultural Center for the state of New Mexico for seven years. She hosted a weekly Hispanic radio show for Citadel for three years and is currently on the Wells Fargo Community Advisory Board. Pacheco writes the weekly column *A Wonderful Life* in the *Santa Fe New Mexican*.

On January 14, 2009 Pacheco received a Certificate of Appreciation from Santa Fe County for her work with the Hispanic and elderly communities in Santa Fe. Pacheco received the 2008 Heritage Preservation Award by the City of Santa Fe for Excellence in Community Traditions for her work with *La Herencia*. She is also a 2007 recipient of the New Mexico Community Foundation *Luminaria* award for her leadership and contribution to the state of New Mexico. In September 2006 in Denver, Pacheco was awarded two national awards by the National Association of Press Women. The first award, in the inspirational book category, as the author of *Saints & Seasons: A Guide to New Mexico's Most Popular Saints*. The

Mana del Norte scholarship application due June 30

MANA del Norte is accepting scholarship applications for the 2009 – 2010 academic year. Applicants must be a resident of one of the following northern New Mexico counties: Rio Arriba, Taos, Los Alamos, Mora, Santa Fe, or San Miguel. This year, 10 \$1,000 scholarships will be awarded to selected recipients.

The purpose of the MANA del Norte Scholarship is to assist Hispanic women from northern New Mexico in continuing and/or completing their post-secondary education. The philosophy of the founding members of MANA del Norte was to focus on the non-traditional student, such as single heads of household, re-entry women, and first-generation college bound. Although this criterion is not exclusive in awarding scholarships, MANA del Norte strongly endorses this philosophy. Scholarships are awarded based on financial need, strength of personal statement, and letters of recommendation.

The LCC SEED Program is for pre-college students who want to accomplish their educational goals, whether they are looking for college credit or just wanting to discover their passion. Who is eligible?

Public High School students who are classified as a Junior or Senior for the 2009-2010 academic school year.

How do I apply?

The **first step** in applying for the SEED Program is to fill out an application at the LCC Dual-Credit Office located within the Technologies Building in Room TE-144.

The **second step** is to complete the LCC COMPASS Assessment with the LCC ACCESS Center in the Student Services Building if COMPASS has not yet been completed or student has not taken the ACT.

The **third step** is to bring in a copy of your LCC COMPASS Assessment or recent copy of ACT scores and meet with LCC Dual-Credit staff to complete career cluster survey and advisement.

Each student who is accepted in the SEED Program will receive an Educational Care Package (ECP) that includes:

\$150 Stipend

Each student will be assigned to a College Success Mentor.

Summer extracurricular activities will also be available for students participating in the SEED Program.

Pacheco is also the 2004 recipient of the Governor's Award for outstanding women of New Mexico. She also received an award from PEN New Mexico in 2004 for her efforts to preserve Hispanic culture, history and language. PEN New Mexico is the state's affiliate of the largest international professional association of writers, editors, and translators.

To commemorate *La Herencia*'s Ten-Year anniversary in 2004, Pacheco published *Las Comidas de los Abuelos*. The cookbook contains 128 pages and features an index of the 490 authentic New Mexico recipes. In December 2004 Pacheco published *JConcha! The Authorized Biography of Concha Ortiz y Pino de Kleven, Matriarch of a Three Hundred Year Old New Mexico Legacy* written by Kathryn M. Córdova. In June 2005 Pacheco's company published *Albuquerque Feliz Cumpleaños: Three Centuries to Remember* written by Nasario García and Richard McCord, to commemorate Albuquerque's Tri-centennial. In November 2005

Pacheco wrote and published *Saints & Seasons: A Guide to New Mexico's Most Popular Saints*.

LA HERENCIA

La Herencia was founded by Santa Fe native, Ana Pacheco, in 1994 in response to the rapid decline of the Spanish language, Hispanic culture and history in New Mexico. The quarterly publication provides information on culture and history with articles written by local historians. The editorial consists of oral history, Spanish language and Southwestern literature, book reviews, poetry, recipes, myths and other forms of folklore retold with documentary photographs and illustrations. Current issues and trends are also covered. *La Herencia* is the only publication of its kind documenting the oral history of people in the New Mexico and throughout the Southwest. Shalena Bailey...

Bailey, 27, will be graduating this May as a registered nurse. She plans to pursue her bachelor's in nursing at the University of New Mexico and eventually attain a master's in nurse anesthesia.

"I am so proud and honored to represent Luna Community College," said Bailey. "I recommend students to participate in Phi Theta Kappa; you learn more of yourself than anything else."

As a finalist for international vice-president, Bailey gave a speech in front of 3,500 people where she talked about "affluenza." "Affluenza" is a portmanteau of *affluence* and *influenza*. This term is often used by critics of consumerism to describe the bloated, sluggish and unfulfilled feeling that

results from trying to keep up with the Joneses. It is also referred to as an epidemic of stress, overwork, waste and indebtedness caused by the pursuit of the "American Dream" as well as an unsustainable addiction to economic growth.

"It was amazing," said Bailey of talking in front of a capacity crowd. "It was an excellent opportunity; everyone has the same goal—and that is to better themselves and better society."

Bailey said that as a unit, Phi Theta Kappa raised over \$2 million for the American Cancer Association this past year.

"I want to thank Naomi, she was an integral part of my campaign team," said Bailey. "I also want to thank Cindy and Twila. They are the backbone of this organization. Thank you

LCC biology, chemistry and environmental science students tour Las Vegas National Wildlife Refuge

Luna Community College Students went to the Las Vegas National Wildlife Refuge on Tuesday, April 14. It consisted of a guided tour with information about native birds, animals and plant species. Also, the tour showed the students what nature looks like with little human intervention.

Students were allowed to take samples of plants and soil back to class. They will be able to learn the differences of the samples taken at the refuge and other samples around Las Vegas. With students learning the differences in the samples, it teaches the students what people really do to contaminate the environment.

The classes that went on this trip were Angie Manafy's Biology 110, Biology 105, Chemistry 105, and Environmental Science 102. These classes have also recently taken trips to the water treatment plant and the sewage treatment plant in order to learn what is done with our water and sewage.
