## Getting started at Luna CC

Getting started at a post-secondary institution can be quite intimidating, especially to first time students. However, here at Luna Community College we try to make sure that every student has the opportunity to succeed. In fact, it may be easier than what you may expect.

The following is a quick look and advice of what students need to do to start their college education on the right track.

The first thing is to apply for admission. The admissions staff consists of: Moses Marquez, Tom Herrera, Cindy Branch and Diane Vigil. They are located in room 119 at the Student Services Building. Students must complete an LCC application for admission and arrange to have an official transcript(s)/GED sent to LCC if they are pursuing a degree or certificate. This can include a high school, GED or college transcript. For more information on the admissions office, you may call 505/454-5311, 505/454-2541 or 505/454-5312 or 505/454-2550.

Keep in mind that a student is classified as a resident or non-resident for tuition purposes based on information provided on the completed application for admission.

After doing this, we suggest you meet with an educational advisor at the ACCESS Center which is located in

## Historical moment: the path to becoming premier

Dr. Pete Campos and the Luna Community College Board of Trustees approved an articulation agreement with the New Mexico Firefighters Training Academy. The agreement is historical by "extending the open door" for educational opportunities for firefighters and individuals seeking a career in the fire service.

The curriculum which follows national fire training standards will give LCC students the opportunity to earn college credit and specific course certificates from the New Mexico Firefighters Training Academy. Students now have the chance to seek specific course content or a degree in fire science with the support of the N.M. Fire Academy.

The degree is well-rounded, including a general education component, program requirements leading to a research capstone course, and electives that provide flexibility to student needs. The program also allows transferability of credits (course completions) between LCC and the N.M. Fire Academy with potential national certification for specific fire science courses. See program outline.

For the Spring 09 Semester, LCC offers FS220: Fire Service Instructor I and FS205: Firefighter Tactics and Strategies. In the summer, LCC plans to offer Fire Inspector I and Introduction to Firefighting. Additionally, other approved

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electives will be added to the fire science program. They include Pump Operations & Hydraulics, Basic Firefighter Emergency Medical Care, EMT-Basic, and Hazardous Materials Awareness & Operations. ## LCC students encouraged to voice concerns to legislators

In 1996 Governor Bill Richardson and the New Mexico State Legislature funded the College Affordability Act providing college and university students an additional incentive to go to college and complete their degrees. The College Affordability Fund provides scholarships of up to \$1,000 to eligible students each semester.

Under the leadership of previous Cabinet Secretary Beverly McClure, the New Mexico Higher Education Department championed the funding of the act to increase the availability of state funded need-based aid to New Mexicans, thus encouraging more students to attend college and complete their degrees. The funds are intended to assist the non-traditional student who may not have continued their education directly after receiving their high school diploma or GED, and who may be working while attending college.

You have to turn in your registration card at the Registrar's Office located in the northern section of the Student Service Building. Financial arrangements are required in order for a student to be financially cleared. Disenrollment will occur after the first Friday of classes and every Friday thereafter during the semester when a student does not make financial arrangements. It is a Higher Education Department requirement that every student does make a financial commitment in order to avoid disenrollment. There is an opportunity to re-enroll for the week following the first disenrollment.
