SBDC associate earns recognition

Luna's Small Business Development Center Associate Director Briana Montaño-Baca recently brought home two honors.

She received the SBDC State Star Counselor's Award for her exceptional work with clients and the communities she serves. She also represented New Mexico at the national America's Small Business Development Center Conference in Long Beach, Calif.

Since she began working with the SBDC three years ago, she has helped start 36 businesses and create 139 jobs.

"I love what I do," she says. "It's not only about helping clients; it's about people's livelihoods."

The mission of the SBDC is to develop skilled entrepreneurs and strong businesses. The New Mexico Small Business Development Center (NMSBDC) was established in 1989 through a partnership with the U.S. Small Business Administration, the State of New Mexico, the New Mexico Association of Community Colleges, and the New Mexico Association of Independent Community Colleges. The organization's offices are strategically located in 26 communities throughout New Mexico.

Luna board election Nov. 5

As October winds down, the election of Luna Community College Board of Trustees looms in the days ahead.

Election Day is Tuesday, Nov. 5. The LCC trustee positions for all seven community college districts are open contests on the ballot.

A place to stay

Samaritan House offers help with housing needs

Luna students who may be going through a rough time when it comes to housing, there is some good news — the local Samaritan House may be able to lend a hand.

The Samaritan House has a new Youth Homeless Demonstration Program grant that will provide housing for up to 24 months for qualifying youth between the ages of 18-24 years.

To qualify for this grant, an individual must be:

- 1. At least 18 years old, but not older than 24 years of age.
- 2. Literally homeless (sleeping outside, staying in car, staying in a shelter or institution). Sleeping anywhere not meant for human habitat or
- 3. At risk of being homeless (couch surfing or staying with family or friends but not on a permanent basis) or
- 4. Fleeing violence or domestic abuse or abuse from family.

An individual has to meet just one of the other criteria as long as they meet the age requirement.

"All information will remain confidential," said Samaritan House Youth Housing Specialist Patricia McRill.

"We will pay for their deposit, rent, electricity, gas, wood and water. We want to assist an individual to the point where they won't be burdened and will be able to focus on such things as earning an education and finding employment."





A team from Luna Community College was among those taking part in the Santa Rosa High School homecoming parade on an idyllic autumn afternoon Friday, Oct. 18.







