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Dr. Carol Linder brings a lot of experience to her new role as interim president at Luna

Dr. Carol Linder became Luna Community College's Interim President in June 2024. As a scientist, Dr. Linder understands success requires collaboration with those having skills and talents that complement her own. As an educator, she modeled to her students the necessity of teamwork, of critical thinking, consulting experts, and cooperating to solve problems.

Raised in Española, Dr. Linder earned her bachelor of science degree from UNM and went to graduate school at UT Austin, and received her postdoctoral training at Washington State University and Oregon State University.

Her employment at a mouse genetics

research facility in Maine further shaped her outlook. She returned to northern New Mexico in 1997. Dr. Linder joined the NMHU biology faculty in 2004; following a successful career of teaching and research, she served as Highlands's interim associate provost and provost from 2016 – 2018.

An ordained Elder in the Presbyterian Church, she also chairs the San Miguel Family & Community Health Council, and is an active member of both Rotary Club and the American Association of University Women.

An enthusiastic life-long learner, Dr. Linder seeks out challenges. She completed an MBA in Finance at NMHU. In 2021 she joined Luna as an academic director. She became Vice President of Finance and Administration in 2023. Her greatest passion remains the creation of opportunities for others.

Luna gets two CDL and five heavy equipment simulators

Luna Community College's Contract Education Department has purchased two CDL and five heavy equipment simulators. The simulators' value is over \$500,000.

Luna CDL administrator Tracy Morales says that the funding for the simulators came from state appropriations and the Wildfire Resiliency Training Center USDA grant.

The CDL simulators consist of Class A, Class B and passenger training modules with the heavy equipment simulators having modules to teach excavator, skid steer, backhoe,

grader, dozer, forwarder, harvester and wheel loader.

"I think this puts Luna on the map for training cutting edge technology in CDL and heavy equipment driving training," says Morales.

Morales has been at Luna for nearly three years.

"We continue to graduate good quality people," says Morales. "We have hired Tayari Pacheco full-time and he has a good background in both areas." With the anticipated en-

rollment increase, the college looks to adding several instructors."

Morales says that the simulators will be used to train local communities.

"We will use it to train people in preparation, mitigation and restoration for those affected by the wildfire," says Morales. "Our goal with this department is to provide the latest in technology training. In general, these simulators are going to be a huge boost for this area. Luna has never offered something like this before." An open house has been tentatively



Springer students working on projects in a classroom.


Luna's Summer Bridge Program, better known to students as STEAHM Camp, is fast approaching its fourth and final week of the summer. This program was geared to 6th -10th grade students from Las Vegas; as well as, all of our area locations including the Springer and Santa Rosa Satellites, and the Mora Site. Using distance education technology, Luna teachers including Rachael Lucero, Billie Mathews, Nichole Collins, and Savannah Scarborough transmitted by OWL cameras to the sites where local facilitators and student assistants helped students with a variety of scientific experiments, writing assignments, historical research, and basic computer programming lessons.

The idea was to utilize the expertise of Luna instructors in a way that allowed us to provide four weeks of camp at all four sites instead of just one week of camp per site as was done last summer; hence this model was born. At each of the sites was a group of facilitators who were there to assist students with kits/lessons/ experiments, the materials for which were all sent to the various locations prior to the start of week 1. Some topics covered included "Isolating the DNA of a strawberry," "Making slime," "Writing Haikus," "Creating comic strips," "Creating a historical topic for a podcast," and "Making bracelets using binary code," to name a few of the many topics covered over the first three weeks of camp.

The last week of camp which will happen July 22-25 will be a culmination event where all the students at the satel-

lites will be bused to Luna's Main Campus for a series of campus tours as well as field trips to Fort Union, Rio Mora, Historic Las Vegas, and the Pecos National Historic Park. The final week will allow the students to meet each other face to face as well as get some hands-on field experience, plus put to use the many things they learned during the first three weeks of camp.

Not only did the instructors, facilita-

tors, student assistants, and students give their time and energy to help make this camp successful, we were also fortunate enough to have a catered lunch every day at each site. Auntie's Tiendita (Las Vegas), Aaron's Food Truck (Mora), The Sweet and Salty Cow (Springer), and Dairy Queen of Santa Rosa and Mr. Bee's Coffee and Teas (Santa Rosa) all provided fresh, hot meals for the students and staff at each site location..

As STEAHM Camp 2024 draws to a close, Program Director, Sherry Goodyear is grateful for all the help she received that made this camp successful.

"Here's looking forward to an even better camp next summer," says Goodyear. "And thanks to all who participated in this one. We could not have done it without you."



Luna Community College's Education Department Creates a Unique Learning Experience for Students

Through a grant from PNM. Luna Community College's Department of Education has purchased items and is in the process of designing a model classroom where LCC education students can gain experience with classroom design, technology use, and curriculum design.

The theme of the classroom is specific to New Mexico and its various landscapes and biomes.

The classroom area where students will be learning is designed to be an early elementary classroom space, utilizing collaborative learning desks, flexible seating, and a 75 inch interactive digital Vibe whiteboard which will be used to enrich early literacy curriculum and inspire teachers to add movement to their lessons.

In addition, the classroom will contain age-appropriate centers featuring natural loose parts for exploration and learning. Teacher prep students will get hands-on experience with curriculum development and classroom design using concepts, ideas, and the environment around them.

The LCC Education Department will have the classroom prepared for use with area youth who will be on campus at the end of July. These students will be the first to experience the model classroom and engage in activities.
