Graduates finish strong despite a challenging spring

Luna Community College is proud to announce the graduation of its Class of 2020.

"You did it," said Luna President Dr. Rolando Rael. "Nothing can stop you when you are truly determined to make your dreams a reality — and put in the hard work, commitment and perseverance required. Completing your graduation is evidence of that."

While the originally scheduled commencement ceremony was cancelled due to the COVID-19 pandemic, there is a possibility of a ceremony on a later date, provided that it's feasible.

This year's graduating class, at Luna and across the globe, has had to endure adversity unimagined when the school year began. The global pandemic of COVID-19 forced public and private entities to take up unprecedented social distancing measures in the effort to mitigate the impact of the virus. Luna faced the possibility of shutting down but — thanks to a cohesive effort from students, faculty and staff, with support from trustees — instead made a largely successful transition

to a virtual campus with online course delivery.

The adjustment wasn't easy for everyone. Making the switch to distance and online teaching and learning has been a challenge at times, for a variety of reasons. Luna invested in expanded tutoring hours and availability, embedding a number of tutors from its Academic

Center for Excellence in many online courses to offer additional help. Essential student services were transitioned to remote availability over e-mail and telephone. While some classes — those that require traditional face-to-face delivery and hands-on experience —were not able

Summer registration starts June 1

It's almost time to register for Summer 2020 at Luna Community College.

Summer registration will be conducted via telephone beginning Monday, June 1. Classes begin the week of Monday, June 8, and the last day to register or add classes is Friday, June 12.

All classes will be held online or via distance education. The transition to online and distance has been made to help ensure the health and safety of all in the Luna community.

If you are looking to sign up for Summer 2020 classes, please call your program advisor or the Luna Student Success Center for assistance. (See list of contacts accompanying this story.) If you have not been admitted to the college, you'll first need to complete an application form, available online at luna.edu/admissions.

Full course schedules for Summer 2020 are also available online at

luna.edu/schedule and at area post offices. Approximately 60 classes are being planned for the summer session. You should review the classes you would like to take and then call the appropriate advisor beginning June 1 to set up your schedule.

to be moved online, others fared well in the transition.

Francisco Apodaca, director of STEM and interim director of Allied Health Sciences, said Luna actually outperformed many peer institutions in making the switch. That, he said, is a credit to the college's students, faculty and staff.

With uncertainty clouding the forecast in terms of reopening public and private sectors in the months ahead, the college is cautiously optimistic about moving forward. Summer session will continue with Luna's online-only delivery, and with few exceptions the campus grounds will remain closed to the public while the college's services remain intact. 

Former Luna president dies

Leroy 'Huero' Sanchez was longtime educator

Leroy "Huero" Sanchez, a former Las Vegas mayor who served two tenures as president of Luna Community College, has died.

Sanchez died Thursday, May 7. He was 74 years old.

Sanchez was hired as Luna president in 2001 and held the position through 2006, going on to a job as Mora's public school superintendent.

Sanchez returned to the college as interim president in June 2015. He was appointed president in July of that year, and he served through March 2017.

In addition to his two terms as

president, Sanchez also served Luna as a lobbyist for the 2008 New Mexico State Legislature and as a grants consultant in 2012.

A graduate of West Las Vegas, Sanchez served in the U.S. military during the Vietnam War.

He attained his bachelor's and master's degrees in education from New Mexico Highlands University. He worked as a teacher in the West Las Vegas Schools district, eventually serving as principal at Valley Elementary and Middle School.

After representing citizens as a city councilor, he was elected mayor of the City of Las Vegas and served in the 1980s.

He also was an entrepreneur and operated his own Sanchez Sports business in town for a number of years.

Staff senate election planned

The Luna Community College Staff Advisory Senate will be conducting its annual election of officers in June.

SAS President Amanda Lucero announced the election on May 15.

All full-time staff members, except for the administrative directors of the seven academic and vocational departments, are eligible to seek election. Nominations for each of the six open positions on the staff senate should be submitted via e-mail to Dave Kavanaugh, dkavanaugh@luna.edu, through the deadline of 5 p.m. June 5.

A ballot will be e-mailed to staff after June 5, with the voting period to take place from June 8-19. Carolyn Chavez will be collecting the completed e-mail ballots. Results will be posted on June 22.

Based on the SAS constitution and bylaws, each staff position is assigned to a membership group that has one or representatives based on the number of employees within the group. Staff members may vote within their designated membership group.

Nominees who wish to campaign are back to work next semester. must abide by Luna policies

regarding advertisements or postings. Nominees must also abide by campaigning and voting policies in the SAS bylaws in order to avoid disqualification.

College's work continues online

A ctivity remains vibrant for Luna Community College students, faculty, staff and board members — even though the campus grounds may be temporarily closed to most foot traffic due to COVID-19 concerns.

Along with the transitioning of classes to online and distance education during the now-concluded Spring 2020 semester, other types of gatherings and meetings have also been moved into a virtual environment.

In the time since campuses were shuttered statewide in March, the LCC Board of Trustees has met several times for discussion and action on various items, careful to abide by Open Meetings Act laws while observing state-mandated social distancing rules. Those meetings have been live-streamed over the college's YouTube channel, with video recordings stored there as usual. Trustees have made use of teleconferencing technology, wearing protective facemasks and maintaining the 6-feet-apart spacing prescribed by experts.

The new way of meeting was tested recently when the board of trustees called for department heads and managers to provide progress reports. Each individual delivered their report over the online connection, each from their respective home offices.

Likewise, other shared governance bodies and committees have also been meeting online, using either Zoom or Google Meetings to connect on a regular basis.

Department gatherings of 2020 graduates, as with nursing, and extracurricular events, such as the recent Wolves Den showcase, have all been held online, ensuring health and safety while keeping things running. A staff senate election this June will be conducted using e-mail.

As Luna plans for more of the same in the coming semesters (or, as conditions permit, a staged reopening of campus sites), the institution appears poised for either eventuality.

Every 10 years, the United States counts everyone living in the country, including college students like you. Your response to the 2020 Census will help make sure communities across the nation are accurately funded and represented for the next decade.

Responding is easy.

- If you live in off-campus housing that is not owned, leased, or managed by your college or university, such as a private house that you share with other students or a privately owned apartment, you can respond online, by phone, or by mail beginning in mid-March 2020. You should count yourself at your off-campus address, even if you spend time somewhere else during school breaks.
- If you live in on-campus student housing like residence halls, off-campus residence halls, or other student housing facilities that are owned, leased, or managed by your college or university, U.S. Census Bureau employees will work with representatives from your building to ensure that you are counted. 


