

# CDL classes planned

## Hybrid course to be made available in Fall 2020 semester

Are you interested in a career that requires a commercial driver's license?

This fall, Luna Community College will again offer CDL training that prepares you for licensure within less than a year.

Due to COVID-19 restrictions and precautions, the CDL theory class will be offered as a hybrid course, enabling students to take much of the class online. The theory portion is four weeks in duration, with each class four hours a day three times a week. The lab portion of the program puts you behind the wheel for individualized instruction – time commitment varies – culminating in a driving test with a state tester.

To ensure safety, classes will limit attendance to four per room, with other social distancing measures in place.

All students will need to be able to log on remotely, either by phone or by computer, for the online class days.

enrolling in the CDL theory class, please e-mail [CDL@luna.edu](mailto:CDL@luna.edu) or call the Career & Technical Education Department at the numbers below.

Luna's Career & Technical Education Department will assist you with the registration process.

Luna's CDL program includes four weeks of theory class study preparing students, followed by four weeks of hands-on training and driving time. Students must be at least 18 years of age and possess a valid regular driver's license.

Among the careers open to those who possess a commercial

driver's license are shipping and delivery, hauling, transport and specialties such as hazardous materials, tanker, passenger and school bus transportation.

Admission to Luna Community College is required prior to enrollment in the CDL classes. Visit [luna.edu/admissions](http://luna.edu/admissions) for an application form. Cost of the CDL program is \$1,736 for the 2020-21 school year and includes tuition, registration, book, medical exam and urinalysis, lab fee and driving test.

# Staff senate adds new members

## Cordova, Ortiz, Vigil join advisory body

Three new members officially joined the Luna Community College Staff Advisory Senate with a swearing-in ceremony on July 23.

Matthew Cordova, Shannon Ortiz and Lawrence Vigil all took office for their first meeting with the senate after either election or appointment.

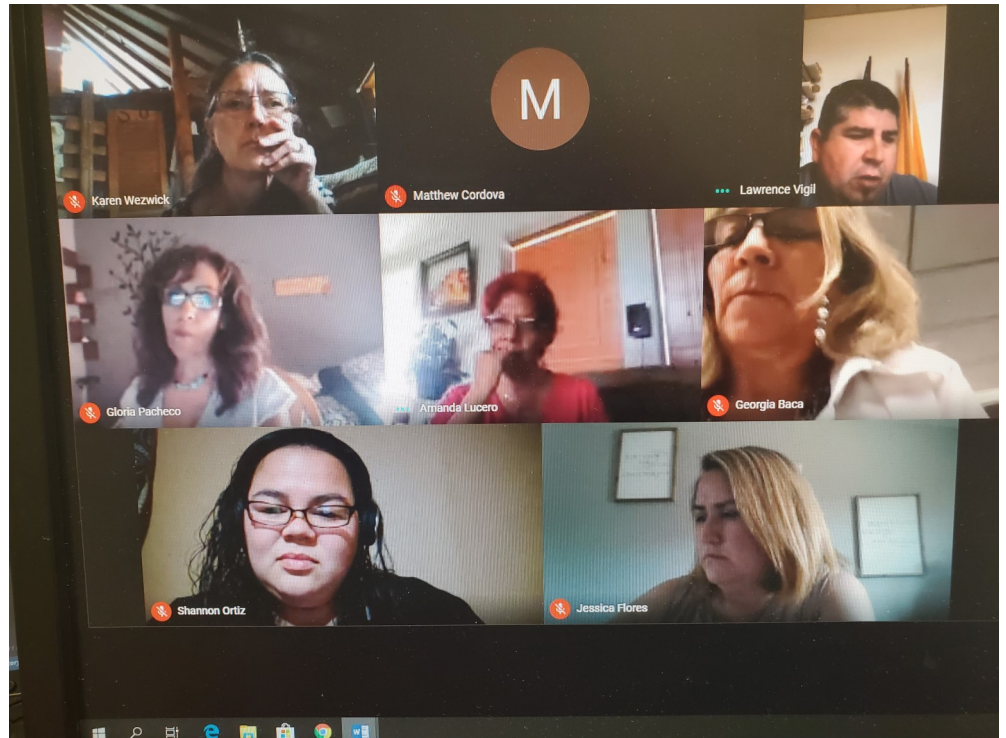
As with other meetings of the SAS and most other bodies and committees in the college, the meeting was conducted via online networking technology.

Cordova will represent Administrative Directors on the SAS. Ortiz will represent Technicians & Other. And Vigil will represent General Maintenance.

The SAS held its annual elections in June, soliciting nominations for the vacant positions in each category.

Also returning to the senate are Georgia Baca and Karen Wezwick, Professional; Gloria Pacheco, Administrative Other; Jessica Flores and Amanda Lucero, Administrative Assistants and Office Managers. Lucero is the current president of SAS, Baca the vice president and Wezwick the secretary.

After swearing in the new members on July 23, the senate went about discussing some initial goals for the year ahead.

Baca said a first goal should be revising the SAS constitution and bylaws. Lucero said another key objective should be communicating with one another as well as representing constituent groups. Cordova agreed, further saying that the SAS should develop a plan on how to accomplish these things. Pacheco said the senate should strive to follow its agenda and stick to a particular timeframe each meeting. Vigil concurred and said the senate should familiarize itself with Robert's Rules of Order to more efficiently conduct meetings. Wezwick recommended the senate

look for morale builders for employees. Lucero said another good goal would be working on the staff handbook, something that had been a previous objective.

Senators were to have opportunity to individually review the existing constitution and bylaws and provide feedback before picking up the discussion in a future meeting. Also to be reviewed will be the SAS election process and stipends; Cordova suggested addressing the latter earlier in the year instead of at the end of the year.

The SAS is slated to hold its next meeting on Aug. 6.

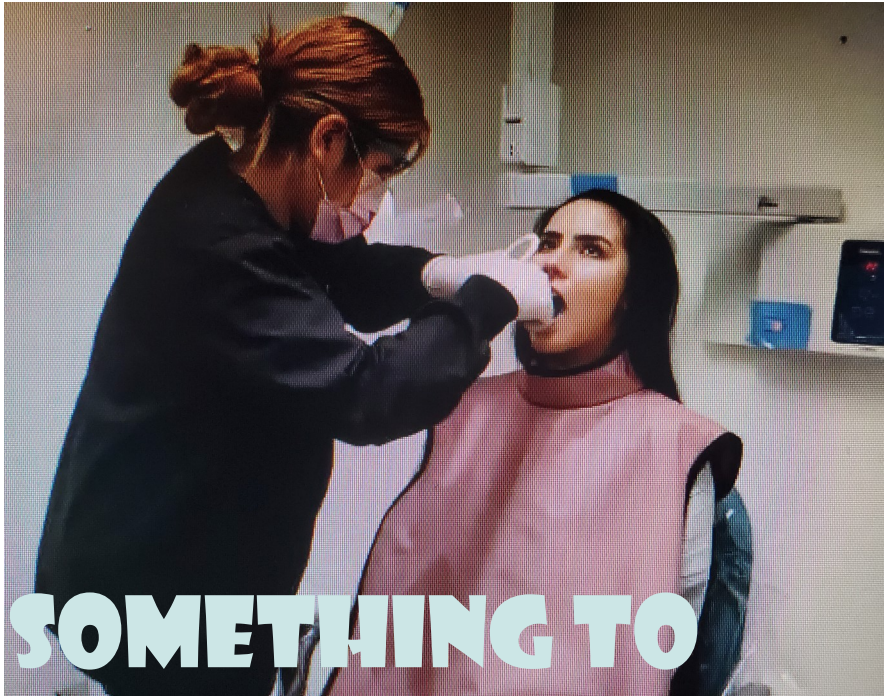

## Dental assisting class marks graduation

“At first it didn’t seem like today was going to happen,” recalled Latricia Sanchez, one of Luna Community College’s six dental assisting graduates. “But there is a will — and there is a way.”

Sanchez, who spoke on behalf of the 2020 graduating class in a special online ceremony July 29, said it wasn’t easy to overcome the disruption caused by COVID-19 this past spring semester.

But with the support of loved ones and Luna’s faculty and staff, she and her classmates persevered.

“As a class we were able to persist and continue in the program,” Sanchez said. “And I couldn’t be prouder of us.”

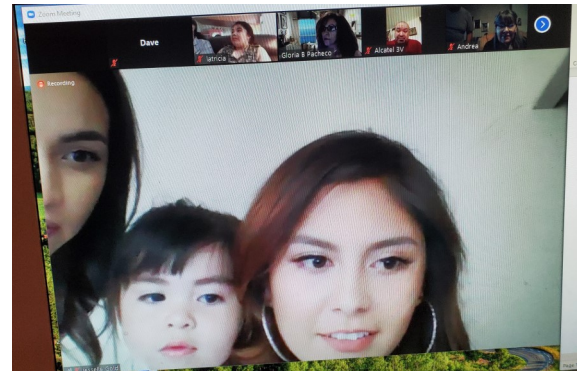
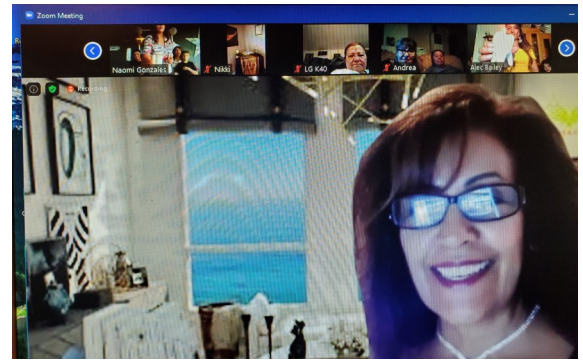
The lingering impact of COVID was evident as the ceremony was held virtually — with each of the dental assisting graduates, instructors and a few others participating via their desktop computers or cell phones. Still, this group marked the occasion with a candle lighting, reciting of the dental assistants’ pledge and pinning of each graduate. Those in attendance then watched a 15-minute video commemorating their collective journey in the program.

“Tonight’s event is extra special,” said Gloria Pacheco, who doubles as an instructor and program administrator for dental assisting. “It is a little bit different ... I can’t express how deeply grateful I am to

see so many faces. The students all hung in there through COVID-19 ... six students (each of whom) I consider a hero in so many ways.”

“You have a different perspective on life than any other graduating class at Luna,” interim Vice President Maxine Hughes told the graduates. “Your ability to adapt, that you’ve shown, will really help and carry you through.”

“You guys are troopers,” said Pastor Nicole Lopez, who serenaded those gathered with the national anthem and an additional song, also providing an opening prayer and words of encouragement. “Through all of this, you have remained strong ... You were able to lean on family, your teachers and staff, and God.”

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Registration for Fall 2020 at Luna Community College is now under way.

This fall, classes and support services will be offered and delivered remotely unless otherwise specified. Approximately 160 classes are on the schedule, which is

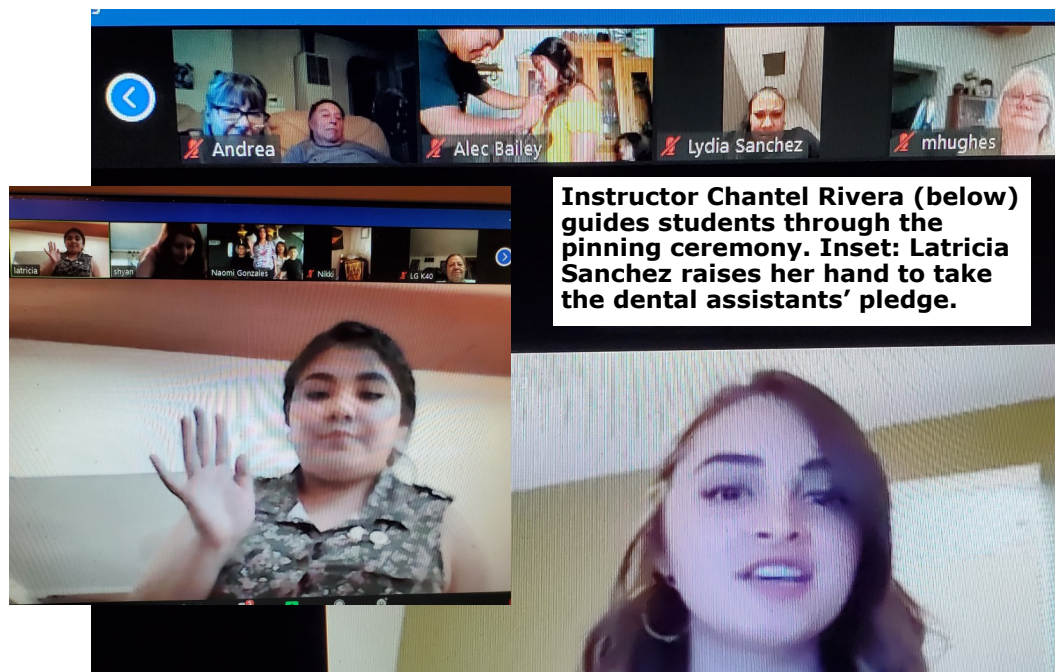
currently posted on the college website at [luna.edu/schedule](http://luna.edu/schedule). Registration instructions are also on that webpage.

Fall classes will begin on Monday, Aug. 17.

Registration for Fall 2020 will continue through the end of the business day Monday, Aug. 24.

Those who are new to Luna, including high school graduates and transfer students, should first complete the admissions process, then meet with advisors to set up their course schedules.

Returning students may register online using the Luna web portal. Advisors for each department will be available to help with proper course selection.



“The students have demonstrated sincere dedication, strength, efficiency, self discipline and cooperativeness through this tough time,” Pacheco told the Luna Light.

The six grads included Jesselle Gold, Naomi Gonzales, Shyan Maddux, Jennifer Romero, Latricia Sanchez and Alec Vigil.

Luna instructor Chantel Rivera recognized each of the grads and their unique contributions this past school year, noting their growth as individuals. For example, she said, Sanchez proved highly inquisitive — a quality that led to learning for the entire group.

“I didn’t realize how much work went into dental assisting,” Sanchez said. “It’s sometimes overlooked. (I learned) there is a lot more to dentistry.”

Then she turned her remarks to her fellow grads: “(Dental assistants) are the backbone of an office. Never let anyone belittle us. We are as important as a dentist.”

Luna’s dental assisting program differs from most of the college’s other programs in that it requires a commitment of three consecutive semesters within a school year, combining theory and classroom learning with practical, hands-on experience.

“Earning a certificate in dental assisting provides the individual the opportunity to work effectively in all aspects in the dental office,” Pacheco said, “working alongside the dentist or independently as some procedures allow. They are more proficient in the laboratory procedures, with a better understanding of dental radiology. Becoming a certified dental assistant thus going through proper training will provide them with the knowledge and skills to move into a higher level in dentistry such as doctor of dental science and/or dental hygiene.”

# Planning on attending Luna this fall?

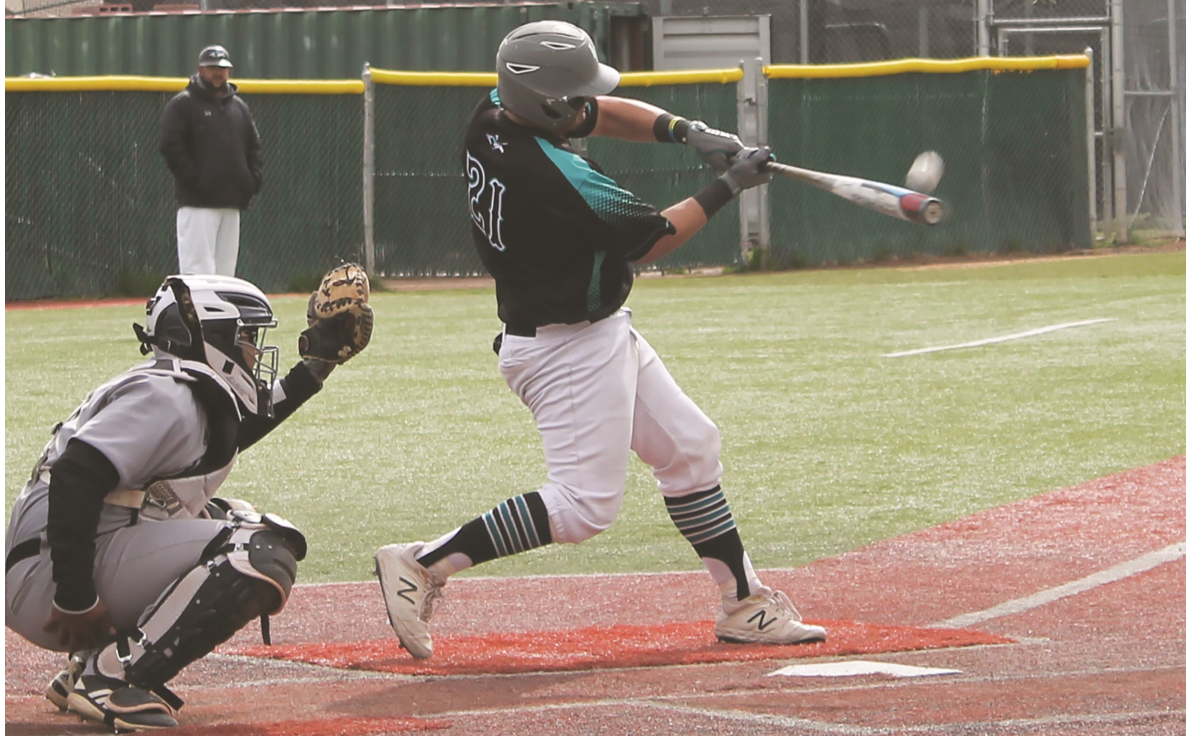
If you plan to attend Luna Community College in the Fall 2020 semester, now is the time to take the

The exam will help provide useful information about skills in math, English and reading and assist in determining ideal course selections.

### Progression shows development within Luna program

Six Luna Community College baseball players are continuing their academic and athletic careers at four-year institutions this coming school year.

It's a positive sign for Luna's student-athletes and the program as a whole, said head baseball coach T.C. Nusser.

"Our goal at Luna Community College is to have all our players

academically and athletically able to complete at the next level," he said.

Trent Dewyer will be attending Kansas Wesleyan University in the fall. Trent is from Atrisco Heritage Academy in Albuquerque; he was a starting center fielder and one of the starting pitchers. Over his career at Luna, Trent appeared in 67 games; his best game on the mound last spring came against Ottawa University JV when he went five innings allowing zero earned runs and striking out 11.

Dylan Begay will also be attending Kansas Wesleyan University. Dylan is from Shiprock High School in Shiprock, and was

one of the Riders' standout relief pitchers. Over his career at Luna, Dylan appeared in 25 games; his best game on the mound last spring came against Ottawa JV when he went 3.2 innings allowing no earned runs and striking out seven.

Adrian Munoz will be attending Sul Ross State University. Adrian is from Americas High School in El Paso, Texas, and was a starting third baseman this past spring. Over his career at Luna, Adrian appeared in 60 games; his best game last spring came against Midland College when he went 2 for 3 with a home run and 3 RBIs.
