Cosmetology program to celebrate 20 years on Oct. 31

Luna Community College's cosmetology program is celebrating 20 years of bringing quality education to its students. They will be having a formal event beginning at 9 a.m. that will run through 4 p.m. on Monday, Oct. 31 (Halloween day) at the cosmetology clinic on the main campus. Everyone is invited.

The 20-year celebration was originally scheduled for May 5, but because of the fire danger at the time, it had to be postponed.

The theme for the event, scheduled on Halloween, is to celebrate a "Spooktacular milestone." As part of the event, there will be drawings for free haircuts and Luna souvenirs.

facials, manicures and pedicures, salon management and retail sales.

As part of the programs, students practice skills in the college's salon lab and in professional settings as preparation for state board examinations.

"I have always believed that education is freedom and it's easy to teach motivated people," said Sandoval. "Our students want to learn."

- The grant award can be used for any purpose, including but not limited to reimbursement for additional costs incurred such as housing, meals, transportation, utilities, repairs of damage caused by the fire(s) and subsequent flood damage as a result of the fires, insurance deductibles, lost wages, medical expenses, or other unreimbursed losses or costs.

The following is a one-on-one interview with Rough Rider Mentorship and College Readiness Program Director Sherry Goodyear.

Name: Sherry Goodyear

Position: Rough Rider Mentorship and College Readiness Program Director

What year did you start working for Luna? 2001 - I started as an adjunct instructor teaching basic reading, English, and math at the Springer Satellite.

What do you like most about Luna and why? What I like most about Luna is the amazing opportunity it gives students who might not otherwise go to college. Luna is a bridge for so many; a way to attain a degree many wouldn't otherwise attain.

What does your job entail; what does a day at Luna look like for you? Since becoming the Mentorship Program Director in June 2022, my days are filled with imagining possible opportunities for our area middle and high schools and figuring out how to make those possible opportunities a reality. In September, we began visiting with students in Springer, Maxwell, West Las Vegas, and Robertson with visits to other schools in the works. We have already presented to roughly 200 students, with those numbers continuing to grow. In the mentorship program, we aim to make student's lives better by showing them the possibilities. Through the mentorship program, the goal is for students to feel supported by LCC and for them to have a better chance at their best lives.

Favorite food and why? Tacos because they are quick, delicious, and versatile.

Favorite TV show and why? Right now I am watching the Netflix series *Brigerton*. With all the beautiful sets and period clothing, it is like

eye candy.

Where would you like to see yourself in five years? I hope to be retiring from Luna's very successful Mentorship and College-Readiness Program.

What is your greatest strength? My creativity, my compassion for others, and my love of teaching and meeting students where they are. For me, there is little more enjoyable than watching the light come on in students' eyes as I get them to think

about things in a way they didn't before.

What would you consider your biggest accomplishment in life and why? On a professional level, I have worked for Luna for 21-years and for me, that is a big accomplishment as I have seen administrations and "new plans" come and go, but what I do has always been about the students and what I can teach them. On a more personal note, I have been blessed with a husband and daughter who are the real reasons I get out of bed in the morning.

What do you consider a good day in your life? A good day is one where I feel accomplished in my work and personal life. It is sometimes hard to strike a balance and not become completely absorbed by work, so if I can feel like I am doing a good job both professionally and personally, it is a good day.

What do you enjoy doing outside of working at Luna? I like to spend time with my family, read, write, garden, learn about new things, do crafts, shop, take walks, enjoy the company of my pets, cook, and talk to my friends. I have so many interests, I generally don't have time to do them all as much as I would like to do them.

This is the third consecutive year that Luna is participating in the CROP Hunger Walk. Luna begins its walk at the Maria H. Paiz Admin-

istration Building and circles the picturesque campus.

CROP Hunger Walks are community-based walk events held in cities and towns across the nation, raising funds to support the global mission of Church World Service, a faith-based organization that responds to hunger, poverty, displacement and disaster around the world.

Locally, 25 percent of all donations will go to support local entities: Comedor de San Pascual Soup Kitchen, Las Vegas Community Soup Kitchen and the Samaritan House.

"I'm very pleased that Luna will be participating again this year in such a worthwhile cause," said Linder. "We've already had commitment from the Rough Rider softball and baseball teams and the student senate and hope to involve more groups and individuals."

Luna is one of several entities from around the community that have joined the worthy cause. This is the 22nd vear for Las Vegas' CROP Hunger Walk, The CROP Project was organized in 1947 when farmers were asked to donate food and seed crops in post-World War II Europe and Asia. In 1969, the first walk events were organized

in Bismarck, N.D., and York, Pa., to raise money. Since then, CROP Hunger Walk events have been held in communities all over the United States, raising millions of dollars in an effort to eradicate hunger and poverty.

"Please consider joining us in our goals to end hunger in our community and the world by walking and/or giving," said Linder. "We will provide more information on this year's CROP walk through our college's social media and local radio."




Luna students show their talents



Many people attend food pantry grand opening








