Luna students featured in promotional video

S everal Luna Community College students and employees took part in the recent production of a pair of promotional videos on campus.

The videos showcase Luna's people and programs and are designed to provide an introduction to what the Luna experience can do for a student. The production is a collaboration between the college's public relations office and KOAT-TV.

The video shoot took place Oct. 21, and several interior and exterior locations were selected as examples of Luna's academic and vocational programs as well as campus activity. The videos will also include other

images representing the college's array of offerings.

Two Luna students — Angelica Montanez and Garrett Parsons — agreed to appear in particularly prominent roles on camera. Each of them took a lead role in a separate video, appearing on screen to introduce Luna and then talking about the college in voiceovers to narrate a sequence of other visuals, both video and still images.

"Students, faculty and staff at Luna really stepped up to help produce these videos," said Jesse Gallegos, public relations coordinator. "We had great participation and cooperation from everyone involved, and we thank everyone for taking time out of their busy schedules to help us showcase Luna Community College."

The videos are expected to be completed within a couple of weeks. They will be made available to individual departments and the public and published on the Luna website and social media pages. The videos are part of ongoing efforts to make more people aware of the advantages of Luna education and workforce training.

In addition to the videos and advertising in print, radio, web and social media, Luna plans a billboard ad on Interstate 25 beginning in early December. Registration for Spring '22 begins Nov. 15.

HED calls for \$214.3M in infrastructure funds

Campus improvements at Luna Community College are among a list of a recommended \$214.3 million in infrastructure funding being called for by the New Mexico Higher Education Department.

The agency's recommendation includes 36 projects scored and ranked using the agency's prioritization metrics and includes funding for construction of new facilities, renovation of existing facilities, and infrastructure upgrades across 28 campuses statewide.

The list includes \$750,000 for heating, ventilation and air conditioning upgrades and work on parking lots, sidewalks and Americans with Disability Act compliance at Luna.

"The recommendation put forth by the (HED) represents hundreds of hours of collaboration and review on the part of the committee, my agency colleagues, and leaders representing college, university and special school campuses across New Mexico," said Secretary Stephanie Rodriguez. "This year's recommendation will help create jobs and keep New Mexico dollars in New Mexico while also improving and maintaining facilities for hundreds of thousands of students."

The recommendations follow an extensive review process led by the agency to evaluate and prioritize projects by highest area of need and quality of the proposal Recommended projects demonstrated support of key metrics, including an emphasis on

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student enrollment and retention, workforce development, job creation opportunities, asset protection, and economic stimulus to areas around the state most impacted by the COVID-19 pandemic.

"This funding recommendation will invigorate the economy and provide infrastructure at higher education institutions to support safe and state-of-the-art learning environments for New Mexico college students," said Gerald Hoehne, HED Capital Projects director.

The New Mexico Higher Education Capital Outlay Committee reviewed more than 52 capital outlay funding requests from public higher education institutions across the state, said Gerald Burke, HED Capital Outlay Committee chairman.

The agency is also recommending an additional \$5.7 million to fund the demolition of campus facilities that are no longer in use and present a safety liability and require high upkeep and maintenance costs to keep them secured.

The HED is requesting these projects be funded via general fund


or severance tax bonds, which are repaid using revenue from taxes on oil, gas, coal, and natural resources. A total of \$196.3 million in project funding will go before voters in November 2022 as part of a general obligation bond, and the remaining funding will go before the legislature for final approval prior to being included in the FY23 budget. In addition to providing need repairs and upgrades to campus facilities, construction projects employ local workforce, support local businesses, and contribute to local and regional tax revenue.

LANL scholarship available

Luna Community College students are encouraged to apply for a Career Pathways Scholarship, sponsored by the Los Alamos National Laboratory. The scholarship award of up to \$3,000 is for students earning an associate degree or certificate or pursuing a trade.

According to LANL, many scholarship recipients are nontraditional students returning to or entering higher education for the first time. Some are adults returning to school to make a career change, and others needing financial support to complete a semester or two before earning their associate degree.

There is no minimum grade point average requirement, and full -time enrollment is not required. Since 2011, this scholarship has been offered twice per year (fall and spring). Beginning this year, the Career Pathways Scholarship will only be open in the spring, with funding available for the following fall. The scholarship will open Jan. 3 and close April 18.
