Student senate leads Luna Cares drive

Dozens of boxes and bags filled with clothing, non-perishable foods and personal hygiene items were a holiday gift to The Samaritan House from the Luna Community College student senate.

Student senate members delivered donations — which are being distributed to community members in need — on Thursday, Dec. 9. It was the conclusion of this year's Luna Cares drive, a service initiative of the

student senate. Since the beginning of November, the senate had been collecting donations via boxes placed in several campus buildings.

"The senate wants to put people first, and this is a big part of that," said Angelica Montanez, president of the student senate, in a recent interview.

"We can only hope this will inspire greater participation in giving back to the community that we are in."

Spring session starts Jan. 18

Registration is now open for the Spring 2022 semester at Luna Community College.

Registration continues through the first week of the semester. (The campus will be closed Dec. 18 through Jan. 2.) Spring '22 classes begin Tuesday, Jan. 18.

The last day to add full-term courses is Tuesday, Jan. 25. However, early sign-up is highly encouraged. Eight week courses in certain programs are typically offered with registration available later in the semester.

Websites hail Luna quality, value



A pair of independent national websites have recently recognized Luna Community College in their most recent rankings of higher education institutions.

Intelligent.com ranked Luna's online associate degree in business administration No. 3 among all such programs reviewed for 2022. In addition to its national ranking for overall quality with a score of 96.25, Luna was found to be the most affordable among the 224 colleges reviewed by Intelligent.com.

The website also ranked Luna among the top 10 community colleges in New Mexico with a score of 86.98. The ranking additionally recognized Luna as being "Best for Early Childhood Education" among the schools reviewed.

Intelligent.com, based in Seattle, describes itself as a privately funded and editorially independent website. To calculate the scores used in its rankings, the Intelligent.com team said it evaluated each of them based on "reputation, cost, course strength and flexibility." Initial criteria were that

colleges were non-profit, accredited and offering flexible delivery of courses.

"Our picks are highly regarded, economical and equipped with the tools to teach their given degree," according to the site. "Luna Community College offers flexible distance learning that appeals to busy adults or hybrid models that include on-campus and online formats," stated a release from Intelligent.com. "Experts at Intelligent.com assessed programs that help students enhance and develop advanced skills for a variety of indemand positions."

"Studies show that obtaining a degree increases income substantially, degree holders earning 84 percent more than those with only high school diplomas or those without a completed GED. The percentage difference in earnings continues to grow with higher learning degrees such as master's, doctoral or professional degrees, with the unemployment rate decreasing to as much as 1.1 percent for those with a doctorate."

Another site, University HQ, has also rated Luna among its Best

Associate Degrees in New Mexico, ranking the college in the top 20 of schools reviewed for 2022.

"New Mexico's community colleges are an invaluable part of the state's economy," the announcement from University HQ noted. "They provide two-year associate degrees in a variety of subjects that launch careers in fields such as health care, accounting, engineering and business. In fact, some of the best colleges in the state of New Mexico are community colleges."

Based in Scottsdale, Ariz., University HQ reported that it used data collected primarily from government agency sites, considering the factors of tuition cost, admission rate, retention rate, graduation rate, graduates' salaries, total programs offered, online programs offered, loan default rate, diplomas awarded and percentage of students receiving financial aid.

Luna is currently enrolling students for the Spring 2022 semester, which begins Jan. 18. Last day to register is Jan. 25. For more information, please visit LUNA.edu.



Luna STEM Director Francisco Apodaca led the tour and discussed such topics as fossil formation (geology), chemical reactions (chemistry), programming of robots (robotics and computer science) and others. Students toured STEM classrooms and the new 3D printing lab, which will be available for use by Luna classes.

Recently, the STEM department also hosted students from Anton Chico Middle School as part of New Mexico MESA's Regional Roundup. Those students took part in an exercise that centered on binary coding in computer science. STEM faculty delivered instruction.

Legislature to convene Jan. 18

Luna Community College and the rest of the state are gearing up for the new year and with it another legislative session.

The 2022 session is set to open at noon on Tuesday, Jan. 18. As a 30-day session, it is devoted primarily to budgetary matters, although other types of legislation may be introduced.

Legislation may be prefiled Jan. 4-14. Deadline to introduce bills is Wednesday, Feb. 2.

The session ends at noon on Thursday, Feb. 17. Gov. Michelle Lujan Grisham has until March 9 to act on bills passed by the legislature; those not acted upon are pocket-vetoed. In most cases, legislation passed and signed by the governor goes into effect on May 18.

Trustees meet to conclude 2021

Stephanie Rodriguez, Secretary of the New Mexico Higher Education Department, conducted a training for the Luna Community College Board of Trustees as part of a busy Dec. 14 regular meeting.

The meeting, which is the last of the 2021 calendar year, was also the last for District 4 Trustee Maximiliano Tenorio. Tenorio, who opted against seeking re-election, will be succeeded by Rosalie Ortega in January.

In addition to approving negotiations for a financial aid consultant, the board formally accepted capital outlay funding for the new fiscal year. Among other reports, the board heard an update on establishment of the Luna Foundation and board. Trustees viewed two promotional videos recently produced by the college in conjunction with KOAT.



Phillip Martinez, the new chairman of the Luna Community College Foundation Board, spoke briefly at the Dec. 14 trustees meeting. Martinez said he attended Luna in the 1980s and looks forward to serving the college.



The college this past year acquired the simulators, manufactured by VirTra, Inc.

President Martinez discussed the advisory board and a partnership that involves area entities using the VirTra simulators, designed primarily to significantly improve critical judgments, skills and expertise for law enforcement personnel.

Among those in attendance were law enforcement officers, county commissioners from San Miguel, Mora and Guadalupe counties, Las Vegas Mayor Louie Trujillo and Fourth Judicial District Attorney Tom Clayton.

Trujillo thanked Martinez for having the foresight to bring entities together, calling it "a perfect example of collaboration."

Clayton also voiced support for the initiative, saying, "Smaller agencies need to have training."
