Ortiz returns to teaching at Luna

R obert Ortiz will be teaching furniture and cabinet making at Luna for the third time in his career. Ortiz is determined to make it his best.

"So many students have been asking me in town when I was coming back to Luna and teach," said Ortiz. "I came up here to Luna interested in taking a class in furniture and cabinet making myself and saw the shop was closed. After talking to Dr. John Thompson (CTE director), he asked me if I was

interested to teach it again and I said 'ves."

Ortiz will teach his furniture and cabinet making class as an eightweek course beginning on March 21. Thompson said that a similar course will be taught at the Springer satellite, also beginning March 21. An instructor is being recruited to teach the same class at the Santa Rosa satellite.

Ortiz started teaching at Luna in 1981 and retired 25 years later. He returned to teach part-time for six years but has not taught furniture and cabinet making since 2015.

"With my certifications, I can teach furniture and cabinet making

anywhere in America," said Ortiz. "My intention is to concentrate on safety instruction for the first two weeks of the course. Safety is a priority. After that, we will start working on projects."

Before his class begins, Ortiz has to make everything safe and complete.

"I won't feel right if someone got hurt," said Ortiz. "Once we get the safety instruction done, we will start with the cabinets and furniture."

Ortiz, who is 74, said he had a heart attack in 2018, but he said he is full of energy and feels better than ever.

"I am so happy to be coming back, and I am happy for the students," said Ortiz. "What you buy at the store is standard; what our students will make will be customized. Some students may start with a picture frame, and some may build an entertainment

center. I am happy to start building this program back. I think this will be good for the students and for the college."

Ortiz said that giving 100 percent in class is not enough for him.

"I intend to give it 150 percent for the students," said Ortiz. "Not only will I teach the students, but I will help the students. I ask the students to give me a sketch of what they want, and then we go from there.

Ortiz said this could be his last hurrah in teaching.

"I enjoyed my time here at Luna," says Ortiz. "It wasn't a job for me, because I enjoyed it so much. I missed teaching a lot, and I was sad to hear that no one was teaching cabinet and furniture classes. My hope is to teach one or two semesters and train someone to take it over. God willing, I can do well for the students."

Rough Riders open season on the road

S now and ice may still be part of the equation in Las Vegas and elsewhere, but it's nonetheless time for baseball and softball seasons to begin at Luna Community College.

The Rough Riders baseball team dropped four games to Eastern

Arizona College 6-1, 1-0, 1-0 and 2-1 over the weekend in Thatcher, Ariz.

The team, led by head coach T.C. Nusser and assistant Harry Estep, will travel to El Paso, Texas, for a series the following weekend, Feb. 4-5, at El Paso Community College.

Luna's softball team, now under the direction of coach Randall Krutsch, is preparing for its season opener. The Rough Riders are slated to play in a tournament in Odessa, Texas, starting Feb. 10.

Krutsch takes over as head coach by succeeding Steve Wallace, under whom he served as assistant coach in 2021.

Both teams are looking to make progress after playing last season with rosters loaded with young freshmen.

The baseball squad was competitive in conference play, going 12-18 and 13-25 overall. The campaign ended in a Region 9 playoff series at McCook (Neb.).

The softball team lost to Northeastern (Neb.) and Western Nebraska in the double-elimination postseason tourney held in Trinidad, Colo. That brought a close to a one-win season for a club that had just a couple of sophomores in the rotation.

Luna to host COVID vax clinic Feb. 10

In collaboration with the New Mexico
Department of Health and El Centro Family
Health Clinic, Luna Community College will be hosting
a COVID-19 vaccination clinic from 10 a.m. to 2 p.m.
on Thursday, Feb. 10, in the school's cafeteria.

"We will open it up to everyone," said Luna nursing instructor Joy Shrum. "Anyone who is eligible to receive a primary, secondary or booster can come to our clinic."

Shrum said eight of her nursing students will administer the vaccinations.

"It is a good opportunity for students to help out the community, and it's good for Luna to promote the vaccinations," said Shrum. "We must try to make sure that people are protected against COVID-19. We will provide information about the vaccinations at the clinic."

Shrum said that although the clinic is open for four hours, they would stay open past 2 p.m. if necessary. The Higher Education Department and the NMDOH have applauded Luna nursing students for their assistance in helping administer vaccinations. Luna nursing students have taken part in several vaccination clinics over the last two years.



Luna providing Covid tests for students, employees



The procedures are as follows.

- Scan the QR code that is posted on site to register.
- Select the test that you wish to take (nasal or saliva).
- Follow the easy steps posted.

Opportunity Scholarship Act introduced

Gov. Michelle Lujan Grisham on Friday (Jan. 21) announced legislation designed to expand the New Mexico Opportunity Scholarship, delivering tuition-free higher education "to every New Mexican who wishes to pursue higher education."


Senate Bill 140, sponsored by
Sen. Liz Stefanics and Rep. Joy
Garratt, the New Mexico
Opportunity Scholarship Act would
appropriate \$85.5 million from the
state general fund and allow for up
to an estimated 35,000 New
Mexicans to attend in-state public
colleges and universities tuitionfree. The act also would combine
four existing state scholarship funds
into a single fund, enabling
institutions to award one full
scholarship to cover full tuition and
fees for eligible students.

The Opportunity Scholarship would cover full tuition and fees for New Mexicans of any age pursuing certificate, associate and bachelor's degrees either part-time or full-time at any New Mexico public or tribal college or university. To qualify, students must be New Mexico residents and maintain a 2.5 GPA or higher while enrolled in college.

According to the New Mexico Higher Education Department, more than 18,000 students benefitted from the Opportunity and Lottery scholarships in Fall 2021, with unmet need reported for more than 15,500 students.

seeking legislative support for some new educational and service initiatives as well as equipment upgrades and replacement.

Among the projects for which Luna is seeking funding:

A new traveling lab for Allied Health Sciences that would provide education and training in rural communities.

Renovation and upgrades of classroom lab and conference room space and technology in the college's computer center and Information Technology areas.

Replacement and upgrades of equipment used in the dental assisting program.

Renovation and expansion of the STEM department's lab space and other facilities.

Creation of a STEAM makerspace that would be offered to the community, including space, equipment and materials.

Completion of the multipurpose Santa Rosa educational facility.

Replacement and upgrades of several vehicles.

Luna has already worked with the state Higher Education Department to secure allocations via Research and Public Service Projects funds. These include funding for athletics and the nursing program, among other items.

Deadline to introduce bills is Wednesday, Feb. 2.

COVID guidelines adjusted for spring

L una Community College
COVID-19 numbers, and the college
is adjusting its protocols accordingly
to begin the spring semester.

As has been the case, Luna advises students, employees and visitors to practice social distancing and respiratory etiquette, wear face masks in all buildings and classrooms, wash hands regularly, and self-assess for symptoms prior to entering the campus.

New this semester, those who test positive for COVID (regardless of vaccination status) are asked to stay home for at least five days. Those who have no symptoms after five days may leave home but should use masks for another five days. Those who have fever should stay home until the fever is gone for 24 hours. No additional PCR test is needed if at-home rapid test is positive. To prevent spread of COVID, those who test positive are asked to inform anyone with whom they have had recent contact. Those

close contacts should get tested, monitor for symptoms and reduce exposure to others.

For anyone who has been in close contact with someone who has COVID, guidelines differ depending on vaccination status. They are as follows:

* Those who are up to date on all COVID vaccines for which they are eligible should wear masks consistently around others for 10 days, testing on Day 5 if possible. Those who develop symptoms should get tested and stay home until results are available. Those who cannot get tested but have symptoms should assume they are positive and follow appropriate protocols.

* Those who are unvaccinated, not fully vaccinated or vaccinated without a booster (i.e. not up to date on all vaccinations for which they are eligible), should stay at home for five days, then wear a mask around others for another five days. They should test on Day 5 if possible.

Those who develop symptoms should get tested and stay home until results are available. Those who cannot get tested but have symptoms should assume they are positive and follow appropriate protocols.

Anyone who has symptoms of COVID-19, regardless of vaccination status, should get either an at-home rapid test or PCR test if possible and stay at home until results are known. Those who test positive are advised to follow guidelines for positive test results. Those who test negative but still have symptoms are advised to stay home and get tested if possible in one to two days. Those who are unable to be tested but still have symptoms should assume they are positive and follow guidelines for positive test results.

Employees who are not vaccinated should continue to test weekly and provide test results to the Office of Life Safety at Luna. A self-testing site is located at the Maria H. Administration Building.

The 55th Legislature's second regular session began on Jan. 18 and concludes on Feb. 17. Legislation not acted upon by the governor as of March 9 is pocket-vetoed. Legislation — other than general appropriation or bills carrying emergency clauses or other specified dates — goes into effect May 18.

Luna @ The Legislature, an initiative of the Luna Community College Office of Public Relations, provides a weekly update on the session to inform the campus community.

Legislation of particular interest to Luna Community College, filed as of publication:

House Bill 2 General Appropriations Act. Funds government operations, including \$1.01 billion from general fund, \$16.8 million from other state funds, \$43.1 million from internal service/interagency transfers, and \$10.5 million from federal funds to the higher education department for fiscal year 2023; introduced by Patricia Lundstrom. Currently in House Appropriations & Finance Committee.

HB 58 Creates adult online learner scholarship program for higher education; introduced by Joshua Hernandez. Currently in House Education Committee.

HB 73 Allows certain educational retirees to return to work without suspension of benefits; introduced by Joy Garratt. Amended version currently in House Labor, Veterans & Military Affairs Committee.

HB 98 General Appropriations Act, original filing. Currently in House Appropriations & Finance Committee. See HB 2 above.

HB 105 Allows public employees to return to work for affiliated public employers under certain conditions; introduced by William Rehm, Rachel Black, Phelps Anderson, Antoinette Sedillo Lopez, Dayan Hochman-Vigil. Currently in House Labor, Veterans & Military Affairs Committee.

HB 107 General Appropriation Act of 2022, funding amounts proposed include \$10,517,000 total for Luna Community College — \$7.3 million for instruction and general, \$1.87 million for other, \$483,800 for retention and completion, \$251,000 for mursing expansion, \$150,000 for Rough Rider student support services. Introduced by Nathan Small, Candie Sweetser and Patricia Lundstrom.

Currently in House Appropriations & Finance Committee. See SB 157.

HB 137 Requires public contracts provide for increased contractor and subcontractor wages in accordance with state minimum wage increases; introduced by Rebecca Dow and Miguel Garcia. Currently in House Rules Committee.

HB 143 General Creates five-year innovation accelerator pilot project for businesses, with centers at certain community colleges; introduced by Linda Serrato. Currently in House Commerce & Economic Development Committee.

HB 153 General Obligation Bonds, provides for potential funding of projects including academic libraries statewide and \$1.5 million for heating, ventilation and air conditioning at Luna Community College, with bond election to go before voters in November 2022. Introduced by Christine Chandler. Currently in House Taxation & Revenue Committee.

(156 House bills introduced to date)

Senate Bill 1 Increases starting salaries for licensed public school teachers — \$50,000 for Level 1, \$60,000 Level 2, \$70,000 Level 3; introduced by Mimi Stewart and Debra Sariñana. Currently in Senate Finance Committee.

SB 7 Sets minimum wage for state employees and employees of state contractors at \$15 an hour; introduced by Antoinette Sedillo Lopez, Peter Wirth, Linda Lopez. Currently in Senate Health & Public Affairs Committee. See alternate bill. SB 125.

SB 25 Creates a research grants closing fund and competitive process for higher educational institutions; introduced by William Soules. Currently in Senate Committees Committee.

SB 36 Increases certain contributions to educational retirement fund; introduced by Mimi Stewart. Currently in Senate Finance Committee.

SB 50 Funds expansion of nursing programs at public post-secondary institutions; introduced by Liz Stefanics. Currently in Senate Finance Committee.

SB 51 Creates public works commission to annually hear proposals on capital outlay-funded project; introduced by Bill Tallman. Currently in Senate Committees Committee.

SB 56 Provides for financial aid for nursing students and loan repayment assistance for nurses in advanced practice; introduced by Liz Stefanics. Currently in Senate Education Committee.

SB 114 Changes stipulations within the state procurement code; introduced by Bill Tallman. Currently in Senate Committees Committee.

SB 124 Changes eligibility requirements for the legislative lottery tuition scholarship and specifies summer session eligibility; introduced by George Muñoz, Mimi Stewart. Currently in Senate Committees Committee.

SB 125 Sets minimum wage for state employees at \$15 an hour; introduced by George Muñoz, Michael Padilla. Currently in Senate Health & Public Affairs Committee. See alternate bill, SB 7.

SB 131 Creates an educational loan-for-service program in career technical education; introduced by Cliff Pirtle. Currently in Senate Committees Committee.

SB 132 Increases minimum salary for licensed educational assistants who meet eligibility requirements to \$20,000 a year; introduced by Mimi Stewart. Currently in Senate Education Committee.

SB 140 Opportunity Scholarship Act. Appropriates \$85.5 million from general fund to establish Opportunity Scholarship to be awarded to qualified, eligible students covering up to 100 percent of tuition and fees after other state aid has been applied; introduced by Liz Stefanics, Joy Garratt. Currently in Senate Education Committee.

SB 146 Authorizes state agencies or local public bodies to join existing cooperative procurement agreements; introduced by Pete Campos. Currently in Senate Committees Committee.

SB 154 General Appropriation Act of 2022, funding amounts proposed include \$10,517,000 total for Luna Community College. Introduced by George Muñoz. Currently in Senate Finance Committee. See HB 107.

SB 172 Allows certain educational retirees to return to work without suspension of retirement benefits; introduced by George Munoz. Currently in Senate Committees Committee.
