Luna, like most colleges across the nation, is teaching mostly online sprinkled in with a few classes on campus.



Luna closer to Law Enforcement Training Center Facility to offer state-of-art simulators

Improving crucial skills and expertise for law enforcement personnel is one major objective of a planned training center coming to the Luna Community College campus in 2021.

The center took another step closer toward becoming reality on Friday, Jan. 8, as Luna administrators signed contracts with VirTra, Inc., manufacturers of two state-of-theart simulators that will be key

components of the center. Luna will lease a firearms training simulator and purchase a driving simulator from the Arizona-based company. The college's Board of Trustees approved those investments in its Dec. 8 meeting.

The college expects to introduce both simulators — which will be housed within a wing of Luna's Law Enforcement Training Center — during the Spring 2021 semester. Initial training opportunities will be available during the Summer 2021 term, with full implementation by the Fall 2021 semester, said interim President Dr. Kenneth Patterson, although some will be introduced sooner — possibly in time for the second eight weeks of the coming spring semester.

Luna's Law Enforcement Training Center will be able to provide training to agencies and individuals throughout the southwest United States, leading to a better-trained workforce for various police and other first responders, Patterson said. The firearms simulator, for example, places participants in a 300-degree environment with multiple

training

"They can learn when to shoot, when not to shoot," Patterson said. "The idea is to develop better trained law enforcement officers so these situations are

handled as well as they can be."

This equipment also allows for a post-activity reconstruction of actual law enforcement incidents, such as those that took place Jan. 6 at the U.S. Capitol. The integration of extensive video footage will allow law enforcement training within a realistic simulation of the actual event, as it actually happened.

Such a center will dramatically improve accessibility to exceptional training for agencies and individuals across the region, Patterson said. He said Luna will be the only site in the nation offering these two simulators and training scenarios. The simulators additionally can be used as a component of Luna's growing Associate of Arts degree program in Criminal Justice and program coursework in the behavioral sciences. Patterson said the driving simulator may also provide opportunities for area partnerships in driver training.

Potential for federal funding exists, as the training center grows and develops.

All fired up

Digital tablets aiding online instruction at Luna

Instructors and students at Luna are both benefitting see the handwritten notes from the use of Kindle Fire digital writing tablets paid for through grant funding from the Regional Development Corporation and Los Alamos National Laboratory.

The Regional Development Corporation (RDC), a Taos-based 501c.3 non-profit organization, awarded a \$5,000 grant to Luna's STEM department in March 2020 that went toward the purchase of digital writing tablets for online instruction. With funds remaining from the original grant this semester, STEM Director Francisco Apodaca arranged for purchase of additional Fire tablets for full-time instructors across campus.

"We received a call from Mr. Val Alonso, Executive Director of RDC, last March telling us that the RDC had received funding from Los Alamos National Laboratory, to assist local entities with COVID-related disaster funding," Apodaca recalled. "I thought about how we could best utilize the funds and thought about our situation and having to go to an online format in teaching."

"I had watched a broadcast of a local school on the public television station, and I saw that the teacher stood in front of a white board and wrote out her lesson. You really had a hard time making out what they wrote on the board. So I had an idea about using a digital writing tablet in our online classes so that students would

on the screen."

Apodaca said that led to investing in the digital tablets, which were distributed to the department's instruc-

"It was a big hit," he said. "Our instructors used them to supplement their instruction, not only with writing their notes and lessons, but for formulas and working out mathematics problems (and for) editing their students' papers."


"At the end we had money remaining in the grant," Apodaca said, "so I

asked Mr. Alonso if we could use the remaining funds to purchase tablets for our full-time instructors and got his okay. We are hoping that our instructors can utilize the tablets, much in the same way they use the digital writing tablets -- that is, to supplement their classroom instruction."

The 55th Legislature's regular session began on Jan. 19 and will end at noon March 20. Deadline for introduction of legislation is Feb. 18. Due to COVID-19 precautions, access to the Roundhouse is limited this session while both chambers are employing both teleconferencing and social distancing to conduct business. Legislation of particular interest to Luna Community College, filed as of publication deadline:

House Bill 2 General Appropriations Act, introduced Jan. 19 by Patricia Lundstrom ... Among other appropriations, sets aside \$867 million from general fund, \$672,300 from other state funds, \$52.9 million from internal service funds and interagency transfers, and \$10.8 million from federal funds to higher education department for spending or allocation to higher education agencies in fiscal year 2022 ... Currently in House Appropriations & Finance Committee.

HB 25 LESC Study of Public & Postsecondary Education, introduced Jan. 4 by G. Andres Romero ... Tasks Legislative Education Study Committee to study issues pertaining to public schools and public postsecondary education in

New Mexico. Currently in House State Government, Elections & Indian Affairs Committee.

HB 43 Black Education Act, introduced Jan. 5 by Sheryl Williams Stapleton ... Requires development of racial sensitivity and anti-racism training for public education and higher education. Currently in House Appropriations & Finance Committee.

HB 83 Change Graduation Requirements, introduced Jan. 13 by G. Andres Romero ... Calls for high school students receiving opportunity to prepare next-step plans to include curricular and course options such as dual credit, career pathways, college prep. Currently in House State Government, Elections & Indian Affairs Committee.

HB 87 Yazzie Lawsuit Higher Ed Funding, introduced Jan. 14 by Derrick Lente ... Makes appropriations to state institutions of higher education and tribal colleges to comply with the Martinez & Yazzie v. New Mexico lawsuit by improving educational outcomes for certain students and families. Currently in House Education Committee.

HB 100 College & Career Readiness Systems, introduced Jan. 15 by Raymundo Lara ... Funds \$3 million for college and career readiness systems statewide and sets requirements to receive funding. Amended version currently in House

Appropriations & Finance Committee. (See also SB 107.)

HB 101 New Mexico Lottery Educational Assistance Act, introduced Jan. 15 by Raymundo Lara, Phelps Anderson, Randall Pettigrew, Steven Neville ... Adds certain other types of gaming as potential revenue sources for state lottery educational assistance program. Currently in House Education Committee.


HB 117 General Appropriations Act of 2021, introduced Jan. 19 by Patricia Lundstrom and Nathan Small ... Among other appropriations, funds \$6,984,200 for instruction and general purposes, \$1,866,600 other and \$453,200 athletics, along with \$483,800 student retention and completion, \$251,000 nurse expansion at Luna Community College. Currently in House Appropriations & Finance Committee. (See also SB 176.)

HB 131 Assistant Secretary of Hispanic Education, introduced Jan. 19 by Christine Trujillo ... Creates position of assistant secretary of Hispanic education in the Higher Education Department. Currently in House Education Committee.

HB 133 College Hunger Reduction Pilot Program, introduced Jan. 19 by Joanne Ferrary, Karen Bash, Melanie Stansbury ... Appropriates \$100,000 to Higher Education Department for pilot program. Currently in House Agriculture & Water Resources Committee.



HB 218 Student Loan Bill of Rights Act, introduced Feb. 2 by Patricia Roybal Caballero and Katy Duhigg... Enacts regulations over student loan servicers. Currently in House Commerce & Economic Development Committee. (See also SB 164.)

Senate Bill 21 Retiree Health Care Act, introduced Jan. 19 by Roberto Gonzales and Natalie Figueroa ... Changes retiree health care act to conform to federal patient protection and Affordable Care Act. Amended version currently in Senate Finance Committee.

SB 39 Names of Finalists for Executive Positions, introduced Jan. 19 by Bill Tallman ... Exempts records for certain appointive executive position applicants from public inspection pursuant to the Inspection of Public Records Act. Currently in Senate Judiciary Committee.

SB 42 Increase to Educational Retirement Contributions, introduced Jan. 19 by Mimi Stewart ... Increases certain contributions to the educational retirement fund. Currently in Senate Finance Committee.

SB 77 Two Plus Two Pilot Program, introduced Jan. 19 by Gay Kernan ... Creates regional Two Plus Two pilot project to establish seamless transition from community college to university and measure student and institutional outcomes. Currently in Senate Finance Committee.

SB 94 Student Athlete Endorsement Act,

and Antonio Maestas ... Changes limitations against student athletes earning compensation through use of their name, image or likeness. Currently in Senate Education Committee.

SB 107 Career Readiness Systems Statewide, introduced Jan. 19 by Roberto Gonzales ... Funds \$3 million for college and career readiness systems statewide and sets requirements to receive funding. Currently in Senate Education Committee. (See also HB 100).

SB 135 Opportunity Scholarship Act, introduced Jan. 31, by Bill O'Neill and Joy Garratt ... Creates Opportunity Scholarship fund for two-year and four-year colleges and universities. Currently in Senate Education Committee.

SB 148 Diversity Commission, introduced Jan. 31 by Mimi Stewart ... Creates Commission on Diversity, Equity and Excellence in Education. Currently in Senate Education Committee.

... 
